Message from Faithful Navigator Joe Castrigno




Veterans Day is Monday, November 11th. We have offered high-quality American flags for \$25 previously, but the price has increased now to about \$30 per flag. We may be able to negotiate a deal because the manufacturer is having a sale. If we can get flags at a reasonable price and on time for Veterans Day, then

we can move forward with a sale. While selling flags is not a major fund raiser, it is one of the few we have. When we can schedule a sale, a request for volunteers will go out via email. We will need a minimum of two Knights at each Mass to assist.

Council 14222 will hold the Annual Knights Memorial Mass on November 14th starting at 5:00 PM. Assembly 3296 members are welcome to attend the Memorial. There will be a dinner after Mass, and I expect tickets to be \$10 per person. I haven't heard any planning details yet, but I expect the Color Corps to be requested. Again, keep posted for further information; in the meantime, save the date. Sir Knight Dennis McMullin began looking into an Assembly Christmas Party. Last year, we held a gathering at the Havana Country Club attended by about seventeen Sir Knights, their wives and guests. The party was in early January (Epiphany) because it usually is easier to get reservations after the New Year. Let Dennis know of your interest and any thoughts you may have about a party. Remaining meetings in 2024 are October 23rd, November 20th and December 18th. The Church booking requests will be accepted on October 16th for 2025. In Honor of Our Veterans



SKt Mario Acevedo and his wife Debbie were dedicated to honoring and assisting veterans in several ways. Mario and Debbie collected gently used clothing and small Christmas

gifts for veterans, they ordered American flags to be sold at appropriate holidays, they collected worn and tattered flags for proper disposal, and they prepared Stars for Our Troops.

Stars for Our Troops programs originated about fifteen years ago. Several volunteer organizations carefully cut out embroidered stars from tattered, faded or torn U.S. flags. Each star is placed in a small plastic bag with a note that reads:

"I am part of our American flag that has flown over the U.S.A. I can no longer fly. The sun and winds have caused me to become tattered and torn. Please carry me as a reminder that You are not forgotten."



Only the blue portion of the flag with the stars is cut and every scrap is disposed of properly,

The easiest way to cut individual stars is to cut along the


diagonals and then separate each star from the others.



Each star is then cut out, making a pentagon shape from star point to star point, leaving a little room so as not to cut into the white thread making up the embroidered star.



To complete the package, the notes are cut from a larger sheet to fit within small zip-lock bags together with the star. The notes are two-sided; the second side indicates that these stars honoring our veterans were prepared by the Knights of Columbus, Assembly 3296.

Lecturer's Reflection (Deacon Kevin Mukri): How to Follow the Two Great Commandments St. Francis—A Saint for Today

On October 4, we celebrate the Feast Day of the great Saint Francis of Assisi. Saint Francis is saint needed now more than ever. Although he lived 800 years ago, his example has great importance for us today.

Born around 1181 in Italy, he was first a solider before dedicating himself totally to Almighty God. In a disagreement with his father, Saint Francis stripped naked and returned all his clothes and possessions to his father. Naked in front of the Bishop of Assisi and his father, Saint Francis said, "Until now I have called you my

father on earth. But henceforth I can truly say: Our Father who art in heaven." The astonished bishop gave him a cloak, and Saint Francis went off to the woods. Saint Francis renounced all worldly goods from that point on.

There are many myths about Saint Francis. Saint Francis is thought to have said, "Preach the Gospel at all times, use words if necessary." But he never said that. In addition, the "Peace Prayer of Saint Francis" was not written by him but was actually a prayer during World War I that was put on the back of holy cards bearing the image of Saint Francis.

What is true about Saint Francis is that he founded the Franciscan Order, was given the Stigmata because of his holiness that caused him great physical suffering, and preached the authentic Gospel where ever he traveled. Even traveling to Egypt to go to a Muslim camp and preach the Gospel to the sultan.

Saint Francis always practiced the principle of equality in his dialogue with members of other faiths, which refers to the equal personal dignity of all people, not to equality in doctrinal content, nor even less the truths Jesus Christ.

More importantly, today, when 70% of Catholics don't believe in the Real Presence, Saint Francis provides us vital example.

Saint Francis of Assisi being the founder of the Franciscans, is commonly thought to have been a priest. However, he never was, and was ordained as a deacon. St. Francis was certainly qualified to be ordained a priest, however, he felt himself unworthy to bring about the miracle of the Holy Eucharist.

Throughout Francis' life he had a great reverence for priests.

Francis frequently kissed the hands of priests he met, honoring the special consecration they received on their hands on the day of their ordination. Francis had a special devotion to the Holy Eucharist and highly revered those hands that daily touched the Sacred Host.

Saint Francis said, "If I saw an Angel and a priest, I would bend my knee first to the priest and then to the Angel."

Regardless of their moral character, Francis held priests in high esteem as he knew they were setapart by Almighty God for a special purpose.

Let us ask Saint Francis' powerful intercession, to increase our respect for the priesthood and our belief in the Holy Eucharist. Saint Francis of Assisi, pray for us.
