

# Chaplain's Corner

#### "Who Will Replace Father? There is No One!"

In the past half-year, we have lost two priests -Monsignor Cummings to emotional burnout and Father Richard Rosin to cancer. The presumption is that there is a good number of priests available. Not true. Celibate American priests are getting older and not being replaced by young seminarians. Bishop Parkes ordained one priest two years ago and the next ordination of one priest is in 3-4 years. Some dioceses either assign the parish of the priest who died as an additional assignment to a nearby pastor who is already overworked, or the parish is closed or amalgamated with another local parish. dioceses go looking for foreign priests whose English cannot be understood and/or their sense of American culture and the American Catholic Church are very different, if not incompatible. For example, the very active presence of women in active ministry in American parishes, including our own.

This ongoing reduction of healthy and dynamic potential ministers/clergy has to stop or Catholicism in the States will surely die. Who will hear Confessions or anoint the sick? We have several Permanent Deacons, but they cannot take over because they are married! The model of church has to change. Ideology of protecting the past has to give way to pastoral needs of our American Church. In the past celibacy was the ideal and the holiness of marriage was highly discounted.

Vatican II encourages us to "read the signs of the times." Today many qualified and spiritual women and men are around. Church leadership as well as ordinary Catholic laity need to call for change now and not "wait" for church leadership to finally listen to the Spirit and respond to the "signs of the times." The past is over.


Why did I write this very provocative piece? I am trying to articulate the current situation in our Church and to suggest that the past is past. We need to understand and move forward together. Both Vatican II and the recent two sessions of the Synod remind us that we are in this together and the Church is no longer in the hands of those at the top. We are Church! We need not resist or fear change and perhaps begin to recognize the work of the Holy Spirit and the new Pentecost 2025.

#### St Matthias, Apostle, May 14

St Matthias was not one of the original 12 Apostles but was chosen to replace Judas Iscariot after his betrayal of Jesus. He is recognized as one of the twelve apostles and is believed to have been with Jesus from his Baptism to the Ascension. The name Matthias means "gift of Yahweh" and he is considered the patron saint of alcoholics and those with addictions. According to tradition, Mattias was selected by the apostles through prayer and casting lots. All information concerning the ministry and death of Matthias is vague and contradictory. It is stated that he preached in different cities in Italy, while others say that he preached in different cities in Greece. Some documents state that he was stoned to death, while others stated that he died of old age.

# Faithful Navigator's

#### **An invitation To Something Higher**

What is a sin? Is it a sin to not go to church on Sunday? Is it a sin to cheat on your taxes? Is it a sin to get drunk? Is holding a grudge a sin? Is masturbation a sin? Is infidelity in marriage a sin?

For too long preachers, catechists, Sunday school teachers, church hierarchy, and moral theologians have been too focused on sin. Well, indeed there is sin around, but that should hardly be our focus in terms of understanding what it means to live a moral Christian life. Here we should take our cue from Jesus.

In his Sermon on the Mount (Mattew 5-7) Jesus says, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law and the prophets; I have come to fulfill them." What he is saying here is basically this: I have not come to do away with the Ten Commandments; I have come to invite you to something higher.

Unfortunately, we tend to think of living a moral life mostly in terms of keeping the Commandments and avoiding sin. What we call "moral theology" has classically been focused on ethical issues, what's right and what's wrong? But that's not what we hear from Jesus as a moral teacher. His Sermon on the Mount (perhaps the greatest moral code ever written) focuses instead on an invitation to do what's higher. It assumes we are already living the elementary essentials of morality, the Commandments, and instead invites us to something beyond those essentials, namely, to be the adult in the room who helps the world carry its tension.

Jesus doesn't offer us moral theology in its classical or popular form. Rather he invites us into an ever-deepening discipleship (which is what moral theology, proper catechesis, and Sunday school are meant to do).

Here's an example of an invitation that lies at the very heart of the Sermon on the Mount. At one point, Jesus invites us to a "virtue that goes deeper than that of the scribes and the Pharisees." It's easy to miss the point here because, almost without exception, we tend to think that Jesus is referring to the hypocrisy of some of the scribes and Pharisees. He isn't. Most of the scribes and Pharisees were good, honest, sincere people who practiced a high virtue. For them, living a good moral and religious life meant keeping the Ten Commandments (all

of them!) and being a man or woman who was scrupulously fair to everyone. It meant being a just person.

So, what's lacking here? If I am a person who keeps all the Commandments and am fair and just in all my dealings with others, what is lacking in me morally? Why isn't that enough?

Jesus' answer to that takes us further than the Ten Commandments and the demands of justice. He invites us to something beyond.

He points out that the demands of justice still permit us to hate our enemies, to curse those who curse us, and to execute murderers (an eye for an eye). He invites us to something beyond that, namely, to love those who hate us, to bless those who curse us, and to forgive those who kill us. That is the essence of moral theology. And note that it comes to us as an invitation, inviting us always to something higher. It's not concerned about what's a sin and what isn't (thou shalt not). Rather, it's a positive invitation beckoning us to reach higher, to transcend our natural impulses, to be more than someone who just keeps the commandments and avoids sin.

Imagine a mother coaxing a toddler to walk.

Squatting on the floor in front of the child, an arm's length away, her fingertips just inches away from the fingertips of the child, she gently coaxes the child to risk taking a step forward; then when the child takes that step, she moves her fingertips back a few inches, and again gently tries to coax the child into risking another step. And so, all the way across the floor.

That's the image we need for Christian discipleship and moral theology. Our first concern should not be, is this a sin or not? Is it a sin to not go to church on Sunday? Is it a sin to entertain lustful thoughts? Is it sin to hold a grudge?

The question with which we need to challenge ourselves is rather, what am I being invited into? Where do I need to stretch myself toward something higher? Am I loving beyond my natural impulses? And more specifically: Am I loving those who hate me? Am I blessing those who curse me? Am I forgiving murderers?



#### Crown of Roses, Crown of Thorns

There is something about the month of May that calls the heart to attention. The earth, fresh from the long silence of winter, seems to rise in solemn procession—dressed again in green vestments, crowned in blossoms, robed in light. The fields sway like altars, the flowers open like hands in prayer. There is life here. There is hope here. And yet, beneath the gentle warmth of spring beats the steady, aching drum of remembrance.

For May, in the life of the Church, belongs to the Blessed Virgin Mary—the pure and humble handmaid of the Lord, crowned with roses by the love and prayers of the faithful. It is the month of mothers. The month of devotion. The month of yes. And at the same time, in the life of this nation, May becomes something more. It becomes the month of sacrifice. The month of honor. The month of the cross.

It is no coincidence. No accident of the calendar. Providence weaves these threads together.

Because no one understands sacrifice - no one understands what it means to give everything, to hold nothing back - more than the Mother who once cradled the body of her crucified Son. No one knows the weight of duty more than the woman who whispered her fiat into the silence of Nazareth, unaware that it would one day lead her to the foot of the Cross.

"Be it done unto me according to thy word" (Luke 1:38). These words—quiet, obedient, unwavering—are the heartbeat of all true service. They are the soldier's creed before the first step marches forward. They are the sailor's prayer beneath the waves. They are the Marine's resolve amid the smoke and the gunfire. They are the airman's oath soaring into the unknown. They are the echo of every defender who has stood watch while others slept.

Because to serve is to say yes.

Yes – to the burden of the uniform, stitched with sacrifice, lined with courage.

Yes – to standing between danger and the defenseless.

Yes – to holding the line, even when it breaks.

Yes – to loving a people, a nation, an ideal, enough to die for it.

Yes – to being the offering demanded on the altar of freedom.

It is the yes of Isaiah: "Here am I, send me" (Isaiah 6:8). And it is the yes of Mary, spoken in the language of the heart.

This is the mystery of May: it is a month of crowns. Crowns of roses, crowns of thorns.

The Crown of Roses, braided in beauty, placed upon the brow of the Queen of Heaven, offered with devotion by the hands of her children. And the Crown of Thorns, driven into the flesh of the Son she bore, the thorns of betrayal, of agony, of sacrifice.

Two crowns. One love.

The love that gives. The love that suffers. The love that endures.

And here, in this convergence of glory and grief, of motherhood and mourning, we begin to see what Memorial Day truly means.

It is not a day for shallow speeches. Not a day for empty gestures. It is not the opening of summer - it is the closing of ranks around the memory of the fallen.

It is not simply a holiday. It is a holy day - a consecration of grief into gratitude, of death into dignity.

It is the day we remember.

We remember the ones who fell not for conquest, but for conviction. Not for empire, but for the hope that children might play in safety beneath skies free of fear. We remember those who stepped forward so that others could stand free.

We remember the battlefield's silence after the gunfire stops, the lonely tapping of rain on helmets, the prayers (...continued on page 13...)

whispered into the dirt, the last words gasped between bloodied lips - not curses, but calls for mother, for home, for God.

We remember the empty boots standing where a man once stood. The dog tags hanging still in the morning breeze. The rifles planted into the earth like crosses on Calvary's hill.

We remember the child who will never again feel his father's embrace. The widow who stands at the grave, her fingers tracing the engraved name as though her touch might call him back.

We remember the mother - always the mother - who holds the picture in shaking hands, whose prayers rise like incense from the foot of another cross.

Because sacrifice does not come from faceless heroes. Sacrifice has a face. A name. A story. A smile once bright and warm, now etched forever into memory. Sacrifice has fingerprints, laughter, dreams unfinished.

Sacrifice is not theoretical. It is flesh and bone and spirit and soul.

It is real. It is holy.

"No greater love hath any man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). These words are not metaphor. They are blood and truth. They are the theology of Memorial Day.

The soldier who falls does not fall alone. He falls into the arms of history. Into the prayers of the faithful. Into the hands of the Mother who understands.

And yet the world will tempt us to forget. To move on. To numb ourselves with distraction and comfort, with cynicism and ease. To trade the solemnity of sacrifice for the cheap price of convenience.

But we are not a people who forget. We are a people who remember.

Because memory is a sacred act. Memory is the defense against indifference. Memory is the covenant we keep with those who cannot speak for themselves.

"The memory of the righteous is a blessing" (Proverbs 10:7).

We remember by teaching our children not only the names of the fallen, but the meaning of their lives. We remember by lifting high the flag not as ornament, but as testament. We remember by standing, unashamed, against the tide of those who mock patriotism as naïve, who scorn sacrifice as waste, who would dare to call gratitude outdated.

We remember by living lives worthy of the price that was paid.

And in this Month of Mary, we place these memories where they belong - into the hands of the Mother who once watched her Son breathe His last, who knows the tears of every Gold Star mother, who holds the sorrow of every grieving wife, who catches the whispered prayers of every orphaned child.

We lay these memories at her feet, beneath her crown of roses, beside her Son's crown of thorns.

And we pray.

We pray because we believe this is not the end.

"I am the resurrection and the life," said the Lord. "He who believes in Me, though he may die, yet shall he live" (John 11:25).

This is the promise that redeems the pain. This is the hope that steadies the trembling heart. This is the truth that gives meaning to Memorial Day.

The fallen are not forgotten.

The fallen are not lost.

The fallen live - before the throne of the Almighty, beneath the gaze of the Mother who intercedes for them, within the heart of a grateful nation.

And so we say their names. We bow our heads. We lift our eyes. We honor their memory.

And we vow this:

We will remember.

We will honor.

We will pray.

We will live lives worthy of their sacrifice.

May their souls, and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace.

Amen.

# In Memoriam

### **Pope Francis**

(born Jorge Mario Bergoglio) December 17, 1936 – April 21, 2025







The first Jesuit pope and the first non-European pope in over a millennium. He was elected after Pope Benedict XVI resigned. Known for his humility, his focus on the poor, and his commitment to dialogue. He chose the name Francis to honor St Francis of Assisi, a patron saint of the poor. He made several statements that suggested an openness to different perspectives on Catholic doctrine, particularly regarding social issues. He spoke sympathetically about women's rights and some LGBTQ rights. He called for action on climate change and economic inequality. He was known for his simple lifestyle and his willingness to break some traditional papal practices. His pontificate was marked by a focus on social justice, environmentalism and dialogue with those outside the church.

- 1936 | December 17: Born in Buenos Aires, Argentina, to Italian immigrant parents.
- 1957 | At age 21, falls gravely ill; eventually severe pneumonia is diagnosed, right lung partially removed
- 1958 | March 11: Enters novitiate of the Society of Jesus.
- 1960 | March 12: Takes first vows as Jesuit.
- 1961 | Begins studying philosophy at San Miguel Seminary, Buenos Aires.
- 1964-1965 | Teaches high school literature and psychology at Jesuit secondary school in Santa Fe.
- 1966 | Teaches at prestigious Colegio del Salvador secondary school in Buenos Aires.
- 1967-1970 | Studies theology at San Miguel seminary.
- 1969 | December 13: Ordained a priest.
- 1970-1971 | Spends "tertianship," or Third Probation period of Jesuit formation, in Spain.
- 1971-1973 | Serves as master of novices and vice chancellor, San Miguel seminary.
- 1973 | Takes perpetual profession as Jesuit.
- 1973-1979 | Serves as superior of Jesuit province of Argentina and Uruguay.
- 1979-1985 | Serves as rector of Colegio Maximo and theology teacher.
- 1986 | Goes to Germany to finish doctoral thesis.
- 1992 | June 27: Ordained auxiliary bishop of Buenos Aires.
- 1997 | June 03: named coadjutor archbishop of Buenos Aires.
- 1998 | February 28: Installed as archbishop of Buenos Aires.
- 2001 | Co-presides over Synod of Bishops.
- 2001 | February 21: Elevated to the College of Cardinals.
- 2005-2011 | Serves as president of the Argentine Bishops Conference.
- 2013 | March 13: Elected in conclave to be 265th successor to Saint Peter.
- 2015 | September 22-27: Apostolic Journey to the United States.
- 2025 | April 21: Died at the age of 88, in Vatican City on Monday of the Octave of Easter.



#### **The Prayer Cycle**

As we give thanks for our salvation and await the coming of the Holy Spirit, it's a good time to reflect on our prayer life. First, a plug for the phone app Hallow. This app has numerous great options both free and by subscription in some cases. You can pray the rosary with several leaders including Bishop Robert Barron who gives excellent insight into each of the 20 mysteries we pray. You can pray the Stations of the Cross, tune into various reflections and meditations and even follow the Bible In A Year or Catechism In A Year with Father Mike Schmitz who provides outstanding insight into both topics. Highly recommended!

In this case, Father Schmitz mentioned what he described the four elements of our prayer life based primarily on the life of David. David, although one of Israel's greatest Kings and very dedicated to God also had his issues. His story is well captured in various Scriptures, and he was a prolific author of Psalms writing between 73 and 88 of the 150 chapters in the Book of Psalms. It is from these Psalms which Father Schmitz derives what he describes as the four pillars of prayer: petition, thanks, praise and repentance.

When asked for the "perfect" prayer, Jesus revealed to us the Our Father. Let's take a quick peek into that. Our Father who art in heaven hallowed be thy name reflects both our recognition of God as well as our praise. He is hallowed. Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven, here we petition God to bring His kingdom to us while recognizing His supremacy over all the universe. Give us this day our daily bread is a direct petition to God. Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us speaks to our recognition of our brokenness as sinners, takes accountability for our transgressions and offers our forgiveness and compassion to others. Lead us not into temptation

but deliver us from evil is another petition to strengthen us in our journey while recognizing that the existence of evil is a constant in our lives. AMEN! The ultimate expression of our thanks and praise.

Now you know why the Our Father is the perfect prayer. Let's conclude with a Scriptural perspective of these four elements.

**Petition.** Psalm 55:22 Cast your burden on the Lord, and he will sustain you; he will never permit the righteous to be moved.

**Thanks.** Philippians 4:4-7 Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

**Praise**. Psalm 100:1-5 Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth! Serve the Lord with gladness! Come into his presence with singing! Know that the Lord, he is God! It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture. Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name! For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations.

**Repentance.** Matthew 11:28:30 Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.

# From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

### **Our Patriotic Duty**

As Catholics and Knights, we have a responsibility to foster love of country in a spirit of gratitude to God and in service to all

The recent celebration of the 125th anniversary of the Fourth Degree on Feb. 22 gave us an opportunity to reflect upon what patriotism really means to us as Catholics and as Knights. For us, it's a question as old as the Order itself.

When Father Michael J. McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in the late 19th century, many Americans questioned whether a Catholic could be a good citizen. Yet, from the beginning, Knights knew there was no conflict between our faith and commitment to one's country. And over the years, we've proven that, time and again, by serving proudly in uniform — fighting and dying alongside Protestants, Jews and nonbelievers.

Knights have also distinguished themselves in public service, serving loyally at every level of government, promoting human dignity and the common good. And throughout society, we have transformed entire institutions for the better — from schools to charitable organizations to hospitals.

In our own day and age, many question whether anyone *should* be a patriot. Cultural elites tell us that patriotism means the same thing as blind nationalism — and that it tends toward arrogance, aggression and advancing one country's interest at the expense of others. They insist that patriotism is an outdated ideal that should be put aside for the sake of so-called progress. And they tell us that our love of country is misplaced because our country is not worthy of our love.

The Church teaches us that patriotism is not and never has been about national supremacy. Nor is it an excuse to exclude or vilify the foreigner or the immigrant. It's not a weapon to be used against other nations or people. Rather, patriotism is a duty that flows from a sense of gratitude.

St. John Paul II saw gratitude as the starting point for faith and hope. In his apostolic letter <u>Novo Millennio Ineunte</u> at the close of the Jubilee Year 2000, he urged us "to remember the past with gratitude, to live the present with enthusiasm and to look forward to the future with confidence."

Twenty-five years later, his words remain wise and timely counsel, and they reflect the spirit of true patriotism. Gratitude and hope lead to love of country and service to neighbor, and they are an antidote to the nihilism and meaninglessness that have a stranglehold on so many people today.

Patriotism is not only a virtue, but also an obligation for us all — especially Knights. And just as patriotism calls us to defend our country, we have a duty to remind our fellow citizens that our nation isn't defined by its failures, past or present. Nations, just like people, are so much more than the sum of their mistakes. We have inherited something precious, which we must treasure, even if our nation will always be a work in progress. And we must teach future generations to do the same.

Pope Benedict XVI observed that each successive generation faces anew the challenge to build a just and virtuous society — a perennial yet ever urgent task.

"Freedom," he wrote, "must constantly be won over for the cause of good" (<u>Spe Salvi</u>, 24). During the welcoming ceremony for his visit to the United States several months later, in April 2008, he further reflected, "Freedom is not only a gift, but also a summons to personal responsibility. ... The preservation of freedom calls for the cultivation of virtue, self-discipline, and sacrificing for the common good and a sense of responsibility towards the less fortunate. It also demands courage to engage in civic life and to bring one's deepest beliefs and values to reasoned public debate."

Patriotism matters — and it's our duty, a duty of gratitude to God that we must instill in our children and our grandchildren.

#### **Shooting For the Stars**

As I write this, we have entered Holy Catholic faith. I hope and pray that your journey this week, and throughout the Easter season, brings you joy and spiritual renewal, particularly in this Jubilee Year of Hope.

The last quarter of the Fraternal Year is upon us. This is the time to finish your Council's Star Council requirements - membership, fraternal benefits events, programs, safe environment compliance, and critical forms. The good news is that as of April 11, 208 Councils have met over 50% of their membership goals, and all of those have a really good chance to meeting those goals by June 30.

The not-so-good news is that many of those Councils are behind in achieving other requirements for Star Council recognition. For example, of the 112 Councils that have already recruited at least 100% of their membership goal for the Fraternal Year, half of those still have not completed their FBE requirements; about 25% have not completed Safe Environment compliance requirements; and a few still have not completed their Forms 365 and 1728.

The Florida State Council succeeds only when the local Councils succeed, and my goal has been, since the beginning of the Fraternal Year, to see 200 Councils achieve the Star Council requirements.

I encourage all of you to bring a renewed energy to your Council and meet these goals! And don't forget to submit your Form SP7 to document your programs – although it is not due until June 30, it is MUCH better to submit this as early as possible, in case Supreme rejects the form and you must resubmit. Our State Convention is almost upon us. This will be a time, I hope, of

fraternity between Knights from different parts of the State and a celebration of your council's achievements. It is also an important time to elect new State Officers and Delegates to the Supreme Convention. But time is running out for registration and booking hotel rooms.

I hope to see you in Jacksonville at the end of May!



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,
