This past month has been full of Holy Moments where God's grace broke into our ordinary efforts and turned them into something extraordinary.

One of the greatest blessings was our participation in the Espiritu Santo Catholic Church Ministry Fair on August 17th. Though our table was tucked away against the flow of foot traffic, God still provided fruit. We came away with two solid candidates who have filed their Form 100s, and we engaged in three meaningful conversations with parishioners who are now prayerfully discerning membership.

Special thanks to Brothers **Bill Galant and Tom Stanko**, who faithfully manned the recruitment tables and shared the mission of the Knights. Their presence and joyful witness turned what could have been "just a booth" into a real opportunity for evangelization.

But the blessings did not stop there. When the fair was over, we had leftover food and thanks to our Faithful Admiral **Wally Vazquez** for joining me, we took that food, along with 100 pounds of gently used women's clothing, to Pinellas Hope. When we arrived, the site manager's eyes filled with tears. Told us, "God must have heard our prayers, as we prayed for food today as we had none to feed these folks. He brought you to us."

That moment was not by chance it was a Holy Moment, a powerful reminder that the **Holy Spirit is alive** in our work.

Another highlight was one especially moving Exemplification Ceremony. Please join me in welcoming our newest Brother Knight, **James McCarthy**. James is a proud Espiritu Santo Catholic School and Jesuit High School graduate, and just this year graduated from USF with a BA in History. His exemplification was intimate and powerful, almost as if God had set it apart just for him.

The story grows richer: James' father, Michael McCarthy, is already a brother Knight, and his grandfather, James J. McCarthy, was a Knight in the early 1950s. The elder James served honorably as a US Army Sergeant in WWII and later retired after 20 years with the NYC Transit Police. This is a family of **three generations** of Knights of Columbus. A beautiful testimony of faith passed down from father to son, across generations. Truly, this is what building Catholic men of faith looks like.

Brothers, all these blessings the new prospects, the service to Pinellas Hope, the family legacy of the McCarthys, are Holy Moments that remind us why we serve, and why we recruit. But let us also be mindful of our mission: our Council's goal this fraternal year is to welcome **15** new members. As of now, we have **one**. We have work to do.

# Chaplain's Corner

#### Holy Hour to Honor the Sacred Heart of Jesus

On Friday, September 19<sup>th</sup>, at 7pm our Council will host a Holy Hour to celebrate the Lord's unceasing love for each of us in the Icon of the Sacred Heart. Sponsored by the Supreme leadership and locally coordinated by Wally Vazquez. This Holy Hour is open to all parishioners and friends (Invite them!). Based on Presentation Sister Saint Margaret 'Alaeque spiritual visions from the Lord were supported by her Jesuit spiritual director, Blessed Claude de la Columbiere, in Paray Le Monial France in the sixteenth century.

Captured in the image of the Heart as the symbol of Jesus unconditional love for each of us, this devotion comes as a needed reaction to the Heresy of Jansenism. Jansenism proclaimed an angry, vengeful, and punitive image of our Loving Creator God. This abomination was meant to scare and terrify people and some of the effects four centuries later are still felt. For example, some people basically act out of fear of God and of being punished. The human person is basically described as a sinner and truly bad!

This image of the human being goes contrary to authentic Catholic biblical theology:

- ~ "The human person is made in God's image and likeness." Genesis 1 (We are not a mistake, and God does not make junk!)
- ~ "See I am wondrously made." Psalm 130
- ~ "I am God's work of art in Christ Jesus." Ephesians 2

We always need some reassurance and clarification of God's Love for us, so come to the Holy Hour and bring some friends.

#### St John Chrysostom – Memorial

Born in Antioch in 347, he was baptized in 368 and tonsured as a reader (one of the minor orders of the Church). He eventually became a lawyer. As he grew older, he became more deeply committed to Christianity and went on to study theology. John lived in extreme asceticism, a lifestyle of self-discipline and abstinence. He became a hermit in about 375, spending the next two years routinely standing, scarcely sleeping and committing to the Bible to memory.

Moving back to Antioch, he gained popularity because of the eloquence of his public speaking, especially his insightful expositions of the Bible passages and moral teachings. In 397 he was appointed archbishop of Constantinople. He founded a number of hospitals in Constantinople. Around 405, John began to lend moral and financial support to Christian monks who were enforcing the emperor's anti-pagan laws. He was later exiled (causes were not clear), where a few years late in September 407 he passed away. His last words were said to have been "Glory to God for all things."

#### **The Seven Sorrows**

Our Lady of Sorrows is a Catholic devotional title for the Virgin Mary, referencing her intense suffering and grief as the mother of Jesus. This devotion, centered on Mary's "Seven Sorrows," is a popular religious theme involving a mournful Mary, often depicted with a pierced heart. Celebrated on September 15, the feast of Our Lady of Sorrows commemorates her unique participation in Christ's Passion and serves as a model for confronting personal suffering and growing in virtue.

The seven sorrows are a series of events in Mary's life that caused her great grief and pain:

- Simeon's prophecy: (Luke 2:35): The prophet Simeon foretells that Mary's soul will be pierced by a sword.
- 2. **The flight into Egypt**: Mary and Joseph flee to Egypt with the infant Jesus to escape King Herod.
- 3. **Jesus is lost in the Temple**: Mary and Joseph spend three days searching for Jesus in the Temple in Jerusalem.
- 4. Mary meets Jesus on the way to Calvary: Mary witnesses her Son carrying the cross on the way to his crucifixion.
- 5. **Jesus dies on the cross**: Mary stands at the foot of the cross as her Son is crucified.
- 6. **Mary receives the body of Jesus**: Mary holds the body of her Son after He is taken down from the cross.
- 7. **Jesus is buried**: Mary is present for the burial of Jesus.

#### The Devotion

#### Symbolism:

In art, Our Lady of Sorrows is often portrayed with seven swords piercing her heart, symbolizing the seven sorrows she endured.

#### Feast Day:

The Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows is celebrated annually on September 15.

#### • Spiritual significance:

Devotion to Our Lady of Sorrows encourages meditation on Christ's Passion through Mary's suffering heart and fosters spiritual growth, virtue, and a greater desire to live a life that does not cause Christ further suffering.


#### Patronage:

#### The Mother's Sword: Our Lady of Sorrows

There is a heart that bleeds. A heart pierced, not by sin, but by love so fierce that it consented to be wounded for the salvation of the world. It is the heart of Mary, Our Lady of Sorrows, whose feast the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church commemorates on September 15. In August, the Immaculate Heart blazed as a furnace of reparation. In September, that same heart weeps as a chalice of compassion. Her tears are not weakness. They are water and blood, joined to the Passion of Christ, flowing as grace upon the earth.

This is no passing sentiment. This is a summons. For in Mary's sorrows we behold the mirror of Calvary, and in her silence, we hear the thunder of divine love. She is the Mother who stood when others fled. She is the Woman of prophecy, whose soul was pierced by the sword foretold by Simeon, that the thoughts of many hearts might be revealed. In her we discover that sorrow, borne with faith, is not destruction but redemption.

The one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church, in her wisdom, gathers us each September to kneel at the foot of the Cross beside Mary. The Seven Sorrows are not relics of a distant past. They are the map of every Christian life. They are sacraments of fidelity. They teach us that true faith does not flee when the night falls but waits with hope for the dawn.

First sorrow. The prophecy of Simeon, and a sword promised for your soul, that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed (Luke 2:35). Steel enters the story, yet you do not step back. You open your heart to the blade, and the blade opens the world to its truth. Faith is not a charm against pain. Faith is the courage to let light divide bone from marrow.

Second sorrow. The flight into Egypt, a cradle lifted into exile under a moon that knows every refugee by name

(Matthew 2:13 to 15). You move through desert silence with the Child who made the desert and the jackals He tamed. You learn the grammar of danger and the syntax of trust. In your footsteps, every homeless mother finds a map.

Third sorrow. The loss of the Child in the Temple, three days of absence that feel like a lifetime condensed into a single unanswered question (Luke 2:41 to 50). You search the streets where joy once skipped, you search the corners where memory hides, you search your own heart until you find Him in the Father's house. Not all losses are punishments. Some losses are lessons that ripen into awe.

Fourth sorrow. You meet your Son on the road to Calvary, and in that gaze two oceans recognize each other's salt (John 19:25). The world calls this defeat. Heaven calls it the hour. Your eyes do not bargain with what must be. You stand and consent to love's terrible arithmetic where one life will buy the many.

Fifth sorrow. The Crucifixion, the Lamb lifted up as the serpent once was, so that the bitten may look and live (John 19:25 to 30). You stand near the Cross, priestly and pure, offering the only offering that equals the altar. Your yes at Nazareth matures here, beneath a darkened noon, into a yes large enough to shelter every sinner who dares to come home.

Sixth sorrow. The body taken down, the Pietà formed by grief's gentle hands (John 19:31 to 37). You cradle the Beauty that made all beauty, now bruised and still. The world has exhausted its violence. You answer with reverence. In your lap mortality rests like a tired bird, and you do not let it fall.

Seventh sorrow. The burial, stone and silence, garden and seed (John 19:38 to 42). You accompany Him to the place of beginnings. You do not pry at the door God has closed. You keep vigil with the earth, a mother

keeping watch with Mother Earth, until the garden remembers how to rise.

Our Lady of Sorrows is no passive figure. She is not resignation but resistance. She takes upon herself the pain of the world and offers it to God as intercession and plea. She is the Mother who does not turn her eyes from suffering, but enters into it, so that her children may learn how to suffer with purpose. In her seven wounds we see the wounds of every mother who buries her child, every exile who flees under darkness, every parent who searches in anguish, every faithful soul who bears injustice. She makes their grief her own and carries it to Christ.

To honor her is not to drape her image with flowers alone. To honor her is to walk her path. To pray the Rosary of the Seven Sorrows, bead by bead, as if climbing Calvary at her side. To consecrate our families, our sorrows, and our nation into her keeping. To kneel in silence and let her school of sorrow teach us that even tears can become prayer, and that sacrifice borne with love becomes seed for redemption.

September is no ordinary month. It is a call to the Cross. It is the voice of the Mother saying, "Stand with me." It is the voice of heaven urging us to transform sorrow into sacrifice, grief into grace, tears into triumph. The world today hides from pain and flees from sacrifice. But Mary shows us another way. She teaches us to face the sword, to embrace the silence, and to stand beneath the Cross unafraid, because already within the tomb stirs the promise of resurrection.

Let September be our school of fidelity. Let it teach us that holiness is not for the faint but for the steadfast. Let us pray with Mary, fast with Mary, and weep with Mary, until our lives themselves become her litany. In her tears the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church is reborn. In her sorrows the faithful are forged. In her pierced yet radiant heart, we behold the victory of her Son.

O Mother of Sorrows, make us your companions. Teach us to stand, to love, and to endure. Until every sorrow is gathered into joy, every wound is healed in Christ, and every tear is wiped away by the hand of God.

This September let us not remain passive. Let us consecrate our homes, our council, and our parish under the mantle of Our Lady of Sorrows. Let us take up the Rosary of her Seven Sorrows as our weapon, our shield, and our school of courage. Let us stand where Mary stood, beside the Cross, so that our order may become a living banner of fidelity and strength for Christ and His Church.



Hope to see all of you ladies and share what our summer adventures/projects were. Until then, God's blessings to you and yours.





#### Pope Leo XIV Woodstock Jubilee

Every 25 years, the Catholic Church celebrates a Jubilee Year. Pope Boniface VIII started the tradition in 1300, as pilgrimages to Rome dramatically increased on Christmas 1299 with sojourners seeking forgiveness. This was based on Jewish tradition. Initially, they were set for every hundred years. That was later reduced to 50 years, then 25. The theme this year is "Pilgrims of Hope". Pope Leo XIV definitely showed his intent as our Pontiff in focusing on hope with his recent "Woodstock Jubilee" on

August 3 that attracted over a million young Catholics from 146 countries. The youth pilgrimage came about three months after the start of Leo's papacy and 25 years after John Paul II organized the last such gathering in Rome. It was announced by Pope Francis on World Youth Day in Lisbon in 2023. The church planned a series of events for the young pilgrims over the course of the week, including turning the Circus Maximus – where chariot races were held in ancient Rome – into an open-air confessional.

On Saturday, August 2, a twilight vigil was held in a vast open space east of Rome. The crowd was estimated at over 800,000. Leo was greeted with deafening screams and applause after his arrival by helicopter and as he toured the grounds in his popemobile, with many people running to catch a better glimpse of the new pope. Most of them spent the night in tents, in sleeping bags, or on mats in anticipation of Sunday's mass.

The Vatican has sought to highlight the fact that pilgrims travelled to Rome from war-torn regions, and Leo said in his Angelus prayer: "We are closer than ever to young people who suffer the most serious evils which are caused by other human beings." "We are with the young people of Gaza. We are with the young people of Ukraine, with those of every land bloodied by war," the pontiff said. "My young brothers and sisters,

you are the sign that a different world is possible, a world of fraternity and friendship where conflicts are not resolved with weapons but with dialogue."

On Sunday, the Mass was accompanied by music from a choir and about 450 bishops and 700 priests all dressed in green robes. A towering cross dominated the golden arch covering the stage where the pope led mass. Pope Leo XIV core message was, "Aspire to great things, to holiness, wherever you are. Do not settle for less." A perfect theme for this month's Domestic Church focus to Build the Common Good. We have been led by Good Shepherds and Pope Leo XIV is just starting.

Video Message of His Holiness Pope Leo XIV
for the 143rd Supreme Convention of the Knights of Columbus

August 5, 2025

#### Dear friends,

I am pleased to greet all of you gathered in Washington, D.C., for the 143rd Supreme Convention of the Knights of Columbus. I also greet those who are participating virtually in these opening ceremonies.

You are meeting during the Jubilee Year of Hope, which encourages the Universal Church, and indeed the entire world, to reflect on this essential virtue, which Pope Francis described as "the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring" (*Spes Non Confundit*, 1). I'd like to reflect briefly with you on this important virtue.

As Catholics, we know that the source of our hope is Jesus Christ and he has sent his followers in every age to bring the good news of his saving Paschal Mystery to the entire world. The Church has always been called to be a sign of hope through the proclamation of the Gospel in words as well as in actions. In a particular way during this Holy Year, we are called to be tangible signs of hope for those of our brothers and sisters who experience hardships of any kind.

Your founder, Blessed Michael McGivney, understood this well. He saw the many needs of immigrant Catholics and sought to bring relief to the poor and suffering through his faithful celebration of the sacraments as well as through fraternal assistance, fraternal assistance which continues on to this day.

This year's Convention has the timely theme of "Heralds of Hope," reminding all Knights of Columbus of the invitation to be signs of hope in your local communities, parishes, and families. In this regard, I commend your efforts to bring together men in your communities for prayer, formation, and fraternity, as well as the many charitable efforts of your local Councils throughout the world. In particular, your generous service to vulnerable populations, including the unborn, pregnant mothers, children, those who are less fortunate, and those affected by the scourge of war, brings hope and healing to many and continues the noble legacy of your founder.

With these brief words, I offer my good wishes for the work of the Supreme Convention, which I entrust to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church, and to the intercession of Blessed Michael McGivney. And may the blessing of Almighty God, the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit, come down on you and remain with you for ever.



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,
