St Paul of the Cross

Born January 3rd, 1694, he was an Italian Catholic mystic, and founder of the Passionists. Paul was the 2nd of 16 children, six of whom survived infancy, and learned at an early age the reality of death and the uncertainty of life. He received his early education from a priest who kept a school for boys in Cremolino. He made great progress and at the age of 15 he left school and returned to his hometown of Castellazzo where he taught catechism in churches near his home.

At 19, Paul experienced a conversion to a life of prayer. In 1715, Paul left his work helping his father to join a crusade against the Turks who were threatening the Venetian Republic but soon realized that life of a soldier was not his calling.

When he was 26, Paul had a series of prayer experiences which made it clear to him that God was inviting him to form a community who would live an evangelical life and promote the Love of God revealed in the Passion of Jesus. The first name Paul received for his community was “the poor of Jesus”, later they came to be known as the Congregation of the Passion of Jesus Christ, or the Passionists.

He died on 18 October 1775, at the Retreat of Saints John and Paul. By the time of his death the Congregation had grown to one hundred eighty fathers and brother living in 12 Retreats, mostly in the Papal States. There was also a monastery of contemplative nuns in Corneto founded by Paul a few years before his death.

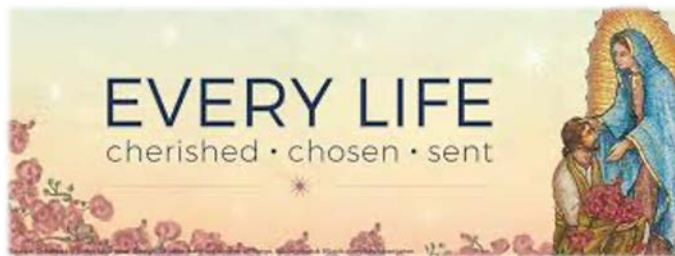

The Crown of Victory: Month of the Holy Rosary

October is the month of the Rosary. The one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church sets this season aside to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary and to awaken in her children a deeper devotion to the prayer that has conquered armies, converted sinners, and sanctified saints. On October 7 we celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, a feast born not in sentiment but in battle.

In 1571, Christian forces, outnumbered and outmatched, faced the Ottoman fleet at the Battle of Lepanto. Before a single cannon was fired, Pope St. Pius V had already summoned Christendom to its knees, urging the faithful to take up the Rosary and storm heaven with prayer. When victory came, it was not the admiral's genius or the soldier's strength that the pope proclaimed, but the intercession of Mary, who had turned beads into weapons and prayers into triumph. From that hour, October became Mary's month of victory, a time when the faithful are reminded that the Rosary is not ornament but armor, not ritual but rescue.

The Rosary is the Gospel gathered into beads, a chain of grace linking heaven to earth. Each Hail Mary is a rose offered to the Queen of Heaven, but also a hammer that shatters the works of darkness. Each decade is both song and sword, drawing us into the mysteries of salvation until Christ Himself becomes the pulse of our prayer.

The Joyful Mysteries carry us to Nazareth, where the Word became flesh and sanctified the ordinary. The Sorrowful Mysteries lead us to Gethsemane and Calvary, where love was measured not in words but in wounds. The Glorious Mysteries fling open the empty tomb and lift our eyes to the resurrection and the reign of Christ. The Luminous Mysteries shine with the public ministry of Jesus, the Eternal Light who broke into history to call sinners home. To pray these mysteries is to let the Gospel shape the soul, bead by bead, until our lives echo the life of Christ.

Why October? Because the Church, in her wisdom, knows that every generation must face its own Lepanto.

The enemies may not always sail with banners and steel, but they come with ideologies that corrupt, with lies that enslave, with voices that call good evil and evil good. The Rosary is the answer of heaven to every age of darkness. It is the prayer of the humble that topples the proud. It is the prayer of families that fortifies nations. It is the prayer of saints and soldiers, of widows and children, of every soul that dares to hope.

In the nineteenth century, Pope Leo XIII, the Rosary Pope, renewed this devotion, commanding the daily Rosary throughout October. He knew what our age has forgotten, that a nation on its knees with Rosaries in hand is stronger than an empire armed with weapons. The Rosary is our heritage, our inheritance, our hope.

So let this October not pass like another page on the calendar. Let it be a summons. Take the beads into your hands and do not let them go. Pray them in the silence of the morning, in the company of your family, in the heart of your parish. Pray them for the conversion of sinners, for the defense of the Church, for the triumph of truth in a world that has lost its compass.

And to my brother Knights: this is our month to lead. Let us be the men who take up the Rosary as our weapon and our shield. Let us gather our councils and our families in public witness, praying the Rosary in our parishes, in our homes, and even in the streets. Let us distribute Rosaries to those who do not have them and teach those who have forgotten how to pray them. Let us, like the soldiers of Lepanto, stand shoulder to shoulder, holding not swords but beads, proclaiming to the world that Mary still intercedes, and that Christ still reigns.

The Rosary is victory. It is the chain that binds us to Christ, the crown that honors His Mother, the prayer that builds saints. This October, let it also be our pledge. As Knights, let us live as men of the Rosary, so that our council may shine as a beacon of faith and our families may be guarded by Mary's mantle.

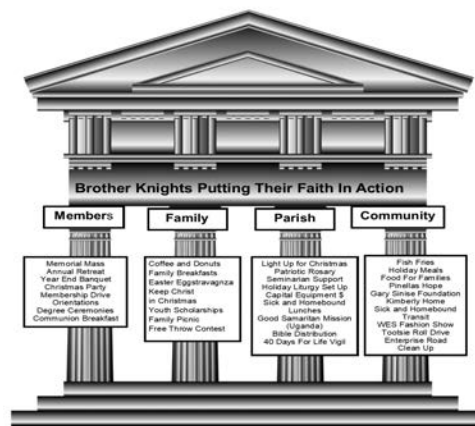

Pray For Our Country!

The past month or so has been a very difficult time for our country and beyond. Several events occurred that threaten our freedoms of speech, religion, and the Creator-given right to life itself.

These actions are related to both the mental health crisis we have in society, as well as the deep political divisions. This call for prayer is in no way a political statement but a spiritual wake-up call.

On August 27, a gunman opened fire on grade school attendees at morning Mass being said at the Annunciation Catholic Church outside Minneapolis, Minnesota. Two children died in the shooting, and 21 others were wounded. The shooter was a former student and graduate of the Annunciation School who had turned transgender. He committed suicide at the scene. Written messages were found on his guns and magazines. These included antisemitic, anti-Catholic, and racist phrases, "kill Donald Trump", and "6 million wasn't enough".

On August 26, also in Minneapolis at Cristo del Rey High School, another mass shooting occurred, killing one and injuring six. The culprit has not been caught, so the motive is unknown. In June, Vance Luther Boelter, an "evangelical Christian", killed two and wounded two. The targets were Minnesota lawmakers and their families. Mental health and division are not particular.

In response, Governor Tim Walz offered a prayer for the victims but added that prayer was not effective or enough. Former Biden press secretary Jen Psaki went considerably further with comments including "prayer is not freaking enough" and "enough with thoughts and prayers". While there may be some measure of validity to these observations relative to direct impact, they do reflect an attitude that diminishes the value of prayer.

That brings us to September 10 and the assassination of Charlie Kirk at Utah Valley University in Orem, Utah. Charlie was 31 years old, married, and the father of two. I knew of him but not much about him before the assassination. The reactions to his death, like our society, have been very divided and reflect the not-so-subtle attacks on God, prayer, and the division in our country. Charlie was clearly a man of strong Christian faith. His mission was to dialogue with younger individuals, roughly 15 to 30 years of age, on matters of faith and our God-given rights as Americans. His assassin referenced fascism and had other like memes inscribed on his weapons. Many openly applauded his assassination. Surprisingly, the detractors included professionals in the medical industry and numerous other sectors.

Sadly, a goodly number of our elected members in Congress not only refused to offer a prayer for Charlie Kirk and his family but openly jeered, booed, and reportedly used foul language denigrating our Creator. Ilhan Omar has been especially direct and vulgar on this issue.

There is little doubt about the political divide in our country. These incidents now reflect an open and growing spiritual divide in our country with Christianity and Catholicism as growing focal points. Seren Kierkegaard observed, "When a tyrant dies, his reign is ended; when a martyr dies, his reign begins. Charlie Kirk's global impact and his call for our return to ethics, morals, and values have been global. Pray for him, his widow, and children. Pray for our country. Pray for our religious freedoms. Prove that we believe God listens and responds to our prayer.

An Antidote to Isolation

*Through Christ-centered friendship and fraternity,
men discover who they are called to be*

To be human is to experience loneliness. It's a part of our human condition and has been since the dawn of history. Yet today, for many, the experience of loneliness has grown acute. In 2023, the U.S. surgeon general released an advisory report on what he called "[Our Epidemic of Loneliness and Isolation](#)," detailing the threat that social disconnection poses to the health of individuals and society.

The epidemic has hit young men especially hard - with many struggling more than ever to form healthy relationships. A 2020 study found that 28% of men under 30 say they have no close friends. Meanwhile, young men now account for three out of every four "deaths of despair" from suicide or overdose, which have reached historic levels.

This epidemic also seems to be fueling a troubling rise in the use of "AI companions." These sophisticated chatbots are, simply put, the modern version of an imaginary friend. They are designed to simulate empathetic and supportive conversations, as if you were talking to a real person. Powered by artificial intelligence, they tailor their responses to the user's emotional needs - offering comfort, support and validation. A 2024 Pew study found that 67% of adults under 35 have interacted with an AI companion, and 23% say they prefer these digital relationships to human ones.

Last month, Pope Leo XIV held a prayer vigil outside Rome with 1 million young people during the Jubilee for Youth. At the vigil, a young woman told the Holy Father that she was concerned that her generation's overreliance on technology was leaving them empty and disillusioned. She then asked, "How can we find true friendship and genuine love?"

Pope Leo told her - and the 1 million young people listening - that technology is a poor substitute for real friendship. Algorithms and digital platforms, he warned, can become tools that control us, making us "a commodity on the market and, in turn, a piece of merchandise." Only genuine relationships and stable connections, he said, can build good lives.

Isolation and loneliness can lead to dark places - to depression and addiction to alcohol, drugs, pornography, and now, it seems, to AI companions.

Yet, deep down, every man wants to protect and provide - and to serve a cause greater than himself. This is the journey of the spiritual life, and it's the greatest adventure any man can undertake. It is a life that demands heroism and courage. It's a life that matters.

This is what the Knights of Columbus offers. We give men the chance to live that life of courage, to be part of something much greater than themselves - and to do that while connecting with like-minded men.

We can be there for the young man struggling in the darkness, the young man who is having a hard time connecting to others. We can empower him to leave behind what holds him back and become who God created him to be: a man made for mission, a man made to serve others.

In his response at the vigil, Pope Leo said that friendship with Christ - in whom we find "a love capable of giving hope" - is how we can find and build authentic friendships with others. This friendship is the foundation of our fraternity and the goal of our [Cor initiative](#). Cor brings men together in an atmosphere of trust so they can strengthen their relationship with Christ and form genuine friendships in him.

More than 140 years ago, Father Michael McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus through a culture of invitation. He invited the struggling men of his parish to come together and serve a greater cause. Let's do the same for the men of our generation - and do our part to fight the epidemic of loneliness and isolation.

Life

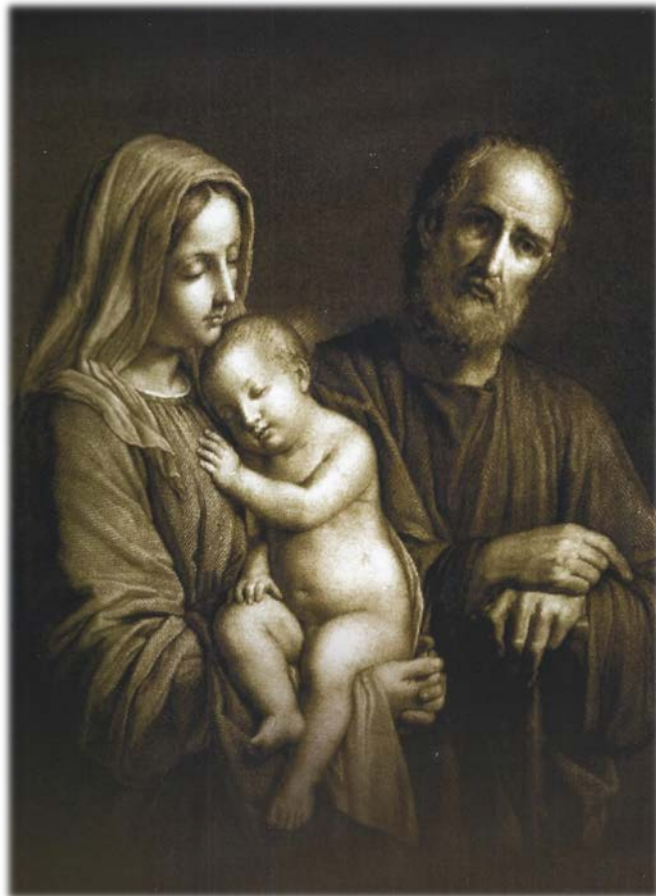

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.

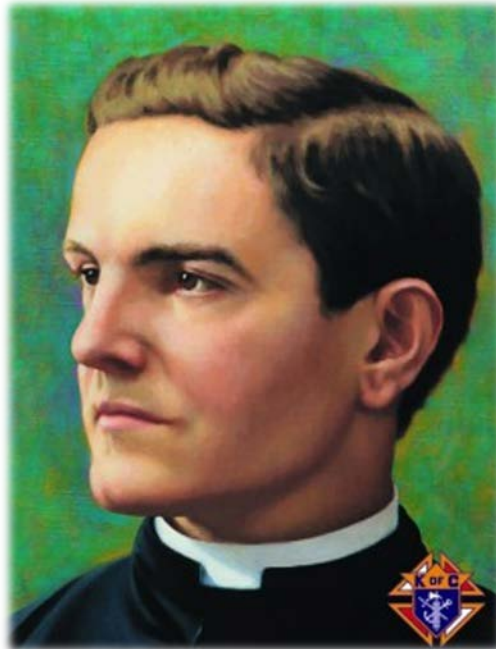
In our daily life and work,

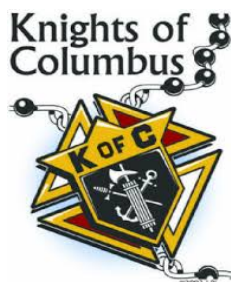
