

From the Faith Director



St Charles Borromeo, Bishop 1538-1584

Born in the Castle of Arona, into an influential noble family. It was common for the first son to inherit most of the family wealth and titles. It was common for the other sons to pursue careers within the Church, often becoming Bishops or abbots of renowned monasteries.

At 12 years old, Charles received the tonsure, propelling him toward an ecclesiastical vocation. Simultaneously, an uncle gave him the title of titular Abbot of Saints Gratinian and Felin to begin his humanities studies.

Charles earned his doctorate in civil and canon law in December of 1559. Fresh out of school his life was about to change. Charles's uncle, Cardinal Medici, was unanimously elected as Supreme Pontiff on Christmas Day 1559, taking the name Pope Pius IV. Within a month the Pope called Charles to Rome and made him a Cardinal, even though he was ordained a priest.

Over the next four years, Cardinal Borromeo worked hard, exercising his new responsibilities. In November 1562 tragedy struck the Borromeo family when his brother suddenly died childless. He and Charles were the only living brothers bearing the Borromeo name. Without an heir, the family name would end, and the titles and inheritance would go to other noble families. For this reason, many in the family encouraged Charles to abandon his church career and return home to marry and have an heir. Even his uncle Pope Pius IV supported this idea.

Charles, however, decided to pursue his vocation, so he secretly arranged to be ordained a priest. Not even his uncle, the Pope, knew. After his ordination, Charles celebrated his first Mass at the tomb of Saints Peter and Paul.

Later he was ordained a Bishop in the Sistine Chapel, and five months later was appointed Archbishop of Milan at age 25. He devoted his career enforcing the decrees of the Council of Trent, igniting a Catholic reawakening within his vast Archdiocese that resonated throughout the Church. He adopted a simple lifestyle, engaged in fasting and prayer, donated most of his wealth to the needy and immersed himself deeply in the pastoral responsibilities. He made a significant impact, especially in Milan.

St Charles responded to God's grace and abided by the reforms of the Council of Trent. The people of Milan, who had largely abandoned the practice of faith, responded to his fatherly presence and renewal began in hast.



The Great Cloud of Witnesses: Month of All Saints and All Souls

November arrives draped in mist, with leaves falling like prayers for the dead, and the air heavy with both memory and promise. It is the month of the Holy Souls, the month when the veil between time and eternity seems thin, when the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church bends low to gather all her children into a single embrace of love.

On November 1, bells ring for the Feast of All Saints, the vision of the Church Triumphant unveiled. We lift our eyes to a great multitude beyond counting, clothed in white robes and crowned with palms of victory. They are not strangers to us. They are mothers and martyrs, laborers and kings, hidden servants and confessors. Their blood has watered the earth, their tears have sown eternity, and their crowns are proof that holiness is not reserved for a few but offered to all who dare to be faithful. Their stories echo not as relics of the past but as summons for the present, urging us to live with the same courage, fidelity, and flame.

On November 2, the Church bends her head in mourning and hope for the souls who wait in purgatory, clothed not yet in white, but wrapped in the refining fire of mercy. If All Saints is the trumpet of triumph, All Souls is the whisper of yearning. Love does not end at the grave. Memory does not end at death. Charity stretches beyond the veil, and our prayers become rivers of light flowing into the shadows of purification. Each Mass offered, each Rosary prayed, each indulgence gained is a torch carried into their night, guiding them closer to the dawn of heaven.

November is therefore no ordinary month. It is the liturgy of memory written on the calendar of the Church. Cemeteries become sanctuaries, tombstones become altars, tears become offerings, and the Eucharist becomes a ladder between worlds. In this holy exchange, the Church Triumphant, the Church Suffering, and the Church Militant beat together with one heart in Christ. Heaven intercedes. Earth labors. Purgatory pleads. And in the mystery of communion, love triumphs over the silence of death.

To live November well is to walk among the saints and kneel beside the souls. It is to let the heroes of heaven teach us that sanctity is possible in kitchens as much as in cathedrals, in hidden patience as much as in martyrdom. It is to let the souls in purgatory remind us that every sin leaves its scar and every scar must be healed in the furnace of mercy. It is to let our own mortality awaken us to the truth that time is not endless, and that eternity presses upon every choice.

So, what must we do? We must choose holiness, not as an abstraction but as a daily path. Choose a saint this November, study their life, and let their courage become your own. Pray for the forgotten dead, for the nameless buried in unmarked graves, for the souls no one remembers but heaven. Write the names of your beloved departed and place them near your altar, so that every prayer of yours carries their memory into God's presence. Visit cemeteries and bless them with holy water, turning silence into intercession. Offer Masses, Rosaries, indulgenced prayers, not as burdens but as gifts of love.

And to my brother Knights: November is the month that calls us to stand as guardians of memory and champions of hope. Let us gather our families and councils in prayer for the dead, visit the resting places of veterans and parishioners, and lift our voices in Rosaries and Masses that storm heaven on their behalf. Let us live as men who do not fear death, but who look it in the eye with the courage of saints and the charity of brothers. Let our works of mercy this month become bridges for souls and let our fidelity to prayer become a banner of light in a world that has forgotten eternity.

The bells of November toll like prophets, reminding us that time is short and eternity vast. The saints shine like constellations in the night sky, guiding us toward heaven's shore. The souls in purgatory cry out like children in the dark, begging for our prayers to carry them into the arms of God. Let us not be deaf to the bells, blind to the stars, or cold to the voices that plead.

Let us answer with courage. Let us answer with fidelity. Let us answer with love.



Seven New Saints For All Saints Day

On October 19, World Mission Sunday, Pope Leo XIV consecrated seven individuals as Saints of the Catholic Church. These included Ignatius Choukrallah Maloyan, Peter To Rot, Vincenza Maria Poloni, Maria del Monte Carmelo Rendiles Martínez, Maria Troncatti, José Gregorio Hernández Cisneros, and Bartolo Longo.

I did not research all the new saints, but they can easily be found if you choose. Here is information on Ignatius Maloyan. He was a bishop who perished in June of 1915 in the Metz Yeghern - the Great Evil - in which grave persecutions were perpetrated against Armenian Christians at the beginning of the 20th century. He endured evil, accepted martyrdom, and triumphed over malevolence.

In his homily, the Holy Father reflected on Jesus' question about whether the Son of Man would find faith on earth when He comes again. This is the focal point of this editorial. A timely topic given the division in our society today.

The Lord's question, said the Pope, reveals that faith is the precious bond of love between God and His people. He said the great "material, cultural, scientific, and artistic treasures" of our world are not to be undervalued but noted that their true meaning is lost without faith.

Pope Leo continued, "A world without faith would be filled with children without a Father, who would have no desire for life since there would be no hope left in their hearts for salvation. For this reason, Jesus invites us to pray always, so that our bond of love with God may be sustained and our hearts may welcome His salvation. Just as breathing sustains the life of the body, so prayer sustains the life of the soul," he said. "Faith, in fact, is expressed in prayer, and authentic prayer lives on faith."

He observed that Christians often face two temptations when we pray. One temptation is to let the scandal of evil overcome us and lead us to think that God does not care for our plight. At other times, we are tempted to treat prayer as a command to God, as we seek to make Him act justly according to our interpretation of reality. He added, "Jesus frees us from both temptations through His prayer on the Cross asking that God's will be done. When we are 'crucified' by pain and violence, by hatred and war, Christ is already there, on the cross for us and with us," he said. "There is no cry that God does not console; there is no tear that is far from His heart."

In closing, Pope Leo XIV invited Christians to embrace faith in every aspect of life, since faith sustains our commitment to justice and our desire for God's love to save the world. "Faith on earth," he said, "thus sustains the hope for heaven."

Interestingly, the readings for October 19 speak to this topic. In Exodus 17 we learn of Amalek's battle against Israel and Moses holding his staff aloft to support the Israelites. But his arms grew weary, and he needed help from Aaron and Hur to sustain his prayerful support. In Luke 18, Jesus told his disciples a parable about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary.

As Knights, there are two lessons:

- James 2 tells us, "Faith without works is dead."
- St. Frances of Assisi reminds us to "Pray incessantly, use words only when necessary.

It's good to be back in Washington, D.C. Our history in this city stretches back nearly to our founding. Our first council here was established in 1897 - and ever since, we have served both God and country.

I think of our long-running partnership with The Catholic University of America - especially in the founding of the Columbus School of Law. I think of how we helped construct the bell tower of the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. I think of our strong support for the Pontifical John Paul II Institute for Studies on Marriage and Family. And in a special way, I think of our landmark pastoral initiative in our nation's capital - the Saint John Paul II National Shrine. In this city, we have worked hard to serve the Church and strengthen the faith.

We've also put our faith into action as Catholic citizens. Here in Washington, we have defended religious freedom for more than a century. We've marched for life for more than 50 years. And throughout our history, we have proudly stood with those who serve in the Armed Forces of the United States.

When I was state deputy of the District of Columbia, I had a front-row seat to so much of this work. And it gave me an even deeper appreciation for all our work around the world. The Knights of Columbus does amazing things. And thanks to you, my brother Knights, last year was one of our best years yet. You helped us advance in charity, unity, fraternity and patriotism. And you gave witness to the hope that comes from Jesus Christ.

This is our mission - to be heralds of hope. To give hope to others through our service and sacrifice. We lift up the family and the faith. We lift up the vulnerable and the persecuted. And today, in a special way, we lift up our voices in thanksgiving. Our Lord has given us a new Holy Father to shepherd his Church. And the Knights of Columbus - each of us - are proud to stand with His Holiness Pope Leo XIV!

Our patriotism brings hope to all our nations. The same is true of our charity, unity and fraternity. And as we look to the rest of this great Jubilee Year, our witness is only beginning.

The Lord is at the center of all we do. And after 143 years, he continues to guide the Knights of Columbus. We have come further than Father McGivney ever imagined. But we've only gone where Christ has called us to go. Now he's calling us to go even further. And we are ready.

Like every generation that came before us, we will move forward - in charity, unity and fraternity. We will serve our Lord by serving others. And we will sacrifice for them, like he did for us.

It is an honor to join all of you in this great work. Now let us put our faith into action once again - as heralds of hope in all we do.



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,
