

St Agnes, Virgin and Martyr

Born around 291AD into a noble Christian family in Rome. Renowned for her beauty and virtue, she attracted many suitors, but she dedicated her life to Christ, famously declaring, "Jesus Christ is my only Spouse." She dedicated herself to a life of virginity. Such self-gift was neither well received, nor well understood by the men of her time.

Agnes was reported to the local prefect to convince Agnes to offer sacrifices to the Roman gods. She refused. Outraged, the prefect ordered her taken to the brothels to be violated. During this time Agnes knew her Heavenly Spouse would protect her. At the brothels. The men appeared more frightened of her than she was of them. None dared to approach her. It is said that only one young man did approach her, only to be immediately struck blind and brought to the ground. Through a prayer spoken by Agnes, though, his sight was restored.

The prefect having failed to convert Agnes back to paganism, condemned her to a death by beheading. Agnes willingly offered her neck to the executioner, who trembled with fear as she approached, while she was as joyful as a bride waiting to meet her Bridegroom.

St Agnes was one of the earliest martyrs whose name was honored by its insertion into the Roman Canon



The Month of the Holy Name and the Manifestation of Christ

January opens like a clean white page upon which the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church writes the most sacred of words: Jesus. At the threshold of the year stands the Feast of the Holy Name, when we meditate on the Name given not by human intention but by the voice of the Eternal Father through the message of an angel. It is a Name that holds the weight of salvation, a Name before which every knee in heaven, on earth, and under the earth shall bow. January invites us to begin again not with resolutions but with reverence, placing the Holy Name upon our lips and in our hearts as a shield against temptation, as a refuge in suffering, and as a promise that the God who came in weakness reigns in power. This is the month when Christians reclaim identity not from the noise of the world but from the profound simplicity of invoking Jesus, the Name that steadies the soul like a lighthouse piercing through winter fog.

As the days unfold, January leads us to the Feast of the Epiphany, when heaven unveils the hidden glory of the Child in Bethlehem. The Magi, royal seekers from distant lands, bow low before the King who wears no crown except His mother's love and no robe except the swaddling cloths of simplicity. Their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh reveal the mystery of His identity. Gold for His kingship. Frankincense for His divinity. Myrrh for His sacrifice. In their worship we behold the destiny of nations and the longing of every human heart. Epiphany is the moment when creation itself recognizes its Creator, when the star above the stable burns as a fiery psalm declaring that the Light of the world has come and cannot be hidden. It is the feast that reminds us that Christ is not given to Israel alone, but to all peoples, tribes, and tongues, and that those who truly seek truth will always find Him, even if their journey must cross deserts of doubt or mountains of suffering.

January draws to its close with the Baptism of the Lord, when Christ descends into the waters not to be cleansed but to cleanse, not to repent but to sanctify repentance itself. In the Jordan River, the heavens are torn open, the Spirit descends like a dove, and the Father speaks the words every human heart longs to hear: "You are my beloved Son." This baptism is the inauguration of Christ's public ministry, the moment when the hidden years of Nazareth give way to the revelation of His mission. The waters tremble with awe as the Creator steps into His own creation, and from that moment forward, every Christian baptism becomes participation in that living river of grace. And to my brother Knights, January calls us to renew our vows by the waters of our own baptism. Let us carry the Holy Name of Jesus with honor, live as men who reveal Christ to others through mercy and truth, and stand firm as witnesses of the Light in a world that still wanders in shadow. Let us be like the Magi in seeking Him, like John the Baptist in proclaiming Him, and like the saints whose lives testify to the power of His Name. January is the month that sets the tone for the year ahead. Let us begin it at the feet of Christ, offering Him our lives as gold, our prayers as frankincense, and our sacrifices as myrrh.



Heal Family Wounds

What is more important than a faithful and unified family? What is a greater blessing? What is harder to achieve in today's jumbled world? What better time to heal those wounds than now? Psalm 51 is a heavy-duty confrontation between King David and Nathan, the prophet. David had been unfaithful and not only slept with Bathsheba but also killed her husband, Uriah. Nathan took David to task and prophesied that his son by Bathsheba would die. David lamented in Psalm 51. We have key lessons to review as we regroup. First, God is a God of justice (we get what we deserve), mercy (we can be forgiven and not get what we deserve), and grace (God gives us what we don't deserve). A main lesson here is that we have to recognize our sins, admit to them, and correct them. How? Be contrite. Have sorrow for our sins because they offend God, not just because we may feel guilty. As David tells us, ***My sacrifice, O God, is a contrite spirit; a contrite, humbled heart, O God.*** When we have true contrition, the doors to God's forgiveness, mercy, and grace are opened wide. We need to ask as David asked, ***"A clean heart create for me, God; renew within me a steadfast spirit."*** Then we can heal wounds.



Psalm 51

Have mercy on me, God, in accord with your merciful love; in your abundant compassion blot out my transgressions. Thoroughly wash away my guilt; and from my sin cleanse me. For I know my transgressions; my sin is always before me. Against you, you alone have I sinned; I have done what is evil in your eyes. So that you are just in your word, and without reproach in your judgment. Behold, I was born in guilt, in sin my mother conceived me. Behold, you desire true sincerity, and secretly you teach me wisdom. Cleanse me with hyssop, that I may be pure; wash me, and I will be whiter than snow. You will let me hear gladness and joy; the bones you have crushed will rejoice. Turn away your face from my sins; blot out all my iniquities. A clean heart create for me, God; renew within me a steadfast spirit. Do not drive me from before your face, nor take from me your holy spirit. Restore to me the gladness of your salvation; uphold me with a willing spirit. I will teach the wicked your ways, that sinners may return to you. Rescue me from violent bloodshed, God, my saving God, and my tongue will sing joyfully of your justice. Lord, you will open my lips; and my mouth will proclaim your praise. For you do not desire sacrifice or I would give it; a burnt offering you would not accept. My sacrifice, O God, is a contrite spirit; a contrite, humbled heart, O God, you will not scorn. Treat Zion kindly according to your good will; build up the walls of Jerusalem. Then you will desire the sacrifices of the just, burnt offering and whole offerings; then they will offer up young bulls on your altar.



Ad Maiorem Dei Gloriam... For the Greater Glory of God

I visited New York just before Christmas, and one of the stops was St. Patrick's Cathedral. I had been there before, but this brought back many memories as we prepare for 2026.

Ad maiorem Dei gloriam...for the greater glory of God. This is the motto of the Jesuit order, and I think it is safe to say that this is a primary reason we are all brothers and sisters in Christ. Our actions in the Council, Assembly, and Auxiliary are all driven by that objective in one way or another. Yes, it is often a lot of busy and hard work, but in the end, we are driven to act to serve God's people and bring greater glory to him.



A statue of our founder, Blessed Michael J McGivney, is prominently displayed on the left side of the main altar. The memorial describes Father McGivney's key role in the growth of Catholicism in America, as well as his founding of the Knights of Columbus as a "mutual benefit society for working-class and immigrant Catholic families in the United States". It further describes the formation of an insurance program to "to promote such social and intellectual intercourse among its members as is desirable and proper."

A significant memory for me was the road sign on 5th Avenue indicating John Cardinal O'Connor Way. Cardinal O'Connor was Admiral O'Connor and Chief of Navy Chaplains in the mid-1970's. On his farewell tour of the Mediterranean, he stopped in Naples, Italy. Our pastor asked us to host him for dinner. We did on the way in and the way out. He went to St. Charles Borromeo Seminary in Philadelphia pretty much across the street from St. Joe's University, which I attended. He later went to Georgetown University. Both are Jesuit schools. So, we had the greater glory of God tie. He was consecrated as a Bishop on May 27, 1979, by Pope John Paul II. We were honored to attend that Mass with several other families from Naples and sat about 100 feet from Mother Theresa. A blessing to be in the presence of two saints.

From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

Witness of God's Tenderness

Christ's humble birth in Bethlehem draws our attention to those. Most in need of love

As we approach Christmas, my thoughts naturally turn to my visit to the Holy Land this fall with our supreme chaplain, Archbishop William Lori, and Supreme Secretary John Marrella. We were joined by Msgr. Peter Vaccari, president of the Catholic Near East Welfare Association-Pontifical Mission. During this Jubilee Year of Hope, our purpose was to bring a message of hope and solidarity to those suffering Christian communities deeply impacted by the conflict in Gaza and the West Bank.

One of our most memorable stops was the Holy Family Children's Home in Bethlehem. Operated by the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, the home provides a loving atmosphere for about 50 abandoned children. These children come from a variety of difficult circumstances. Some are newborns dropped off anonymously on the doorstep. Others have parents who are unable to care for them. Still others are victims of abuse and have been placed in the home by local authorities. Regardless of their background, the sisters provide what the children need the most: the healing that comes from a loving home and a genuine sense of belonging.

The sisters' work is difficult. I could see it on their faces. No one is poorer or more vulnerable than an abandoned child - especially in a land torn apart by social and political conflict. Yet the sisters give the children a new life and the sense of security every child needs. And perhaps for the first time in their lives, the children have hope. This was evident to me in the joyful sounds of laughter and play echoing through the courtyard.

In his homily during Mass for the Jubilee of the Poor last month, Pope Leo reflected on the many forms of poverty that plague our world - material, moral and spiritual. He observed that they all share a common thread, a tragedy that cuts through all of them - the experience of loneliness. To break down the "walls of loneliness," the Holy Father said, we must foster a "culture of attention." That is, we must "be attentive to others, to each person, wherever we are, wherever we live, transmitting this attitude within our families, living it out in the workplace ... in different communities, in the digital world, everywhere, reaching out to the marginalized and becoming the witnesses of God's tenderness."

This is the heart of what it means to be a Knight of Columbus - to be attentive to the needs of others and never closed in on ourselves. The Order was founded precisely to look outward - to care for widows, orphans, the vulnerable and the marginalized. Just as God does not abandon us in our hardships, we must never abandon others in theirs. Christ implores us: "Love one another as I have loved you" (Jn 15:12).

As we journey through the Advent season and draw closer to Christmas and the conclusion of this great Jubilee Year of Hope, let us remember that Jesus Christ himself is the true author of our hope. He can break down the walls of our loneliness and give us the grace to be attentive to the real needs of others. He does not abandon us. He came as one of us to save us - poor and vulnerable, born in a Bethlehem manger in a time of great turmoil.

St. Paul writes, "For your sake he became poor although he was rich, so that by his poverty you might become rich" (2 Cor 8:9). Christ came to offer us a new way - the Good News, which has the power to heal us and free us from the power of sin and death. May we open our hearts wide to the riches of his grace, attentive to ways we can generously share this wealth with our neighbors in need.



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,
