

Chaplain's Corner

That Joyful Season - Lent 2026

Brothers and Sisters,

In an earlier Preface for Lent (the Opening Prayer before the "Holy, Holy" and the Eucharistic Prayer), it proclaimed, "You have given us this **Joyful Season to celebrate the Paschal Mystery with hearts and minds renewed.**" Previously Lent was understood as a time of sadness and doing difficult things - mainly because they were difficult and "hard." Yet, Easter celebrates the center of our Christian faith, the Paschal Mystery.

The Paschal Mystery celebrates that death in all its firms and difficulties is not the last word. In the face of difficulties Our God comes to our assistance to open up New Life, New Hope, New Beginnings in amazing and unexpected ways. The difficult situation may still be there, but we are empowered to deal with it. We may be stressed but we are no longer powerless. The spirituality of the Paschal Mystery invites us to do things that are "life-giving" and that bring joy and satisfaction, like loving and serving in Jesus' name.

Too often Lent is often seen as a time for "giving up," like liquor or sweets. I would suggest that this Lent we give up giving up and focus more on what brings joy and happiness to you and to others. May we rejoice in serving at the Fish Fries, at Kimberly Home, or Pinellas Hope. These activities bring joy to others and often to

my life. Is there anything that needs change or is missing? Lent is the grace-full time to work on that.

Love can be understood as "appreciative delight." Another Lenten practice could be taking appreciative delight in our Faith and its many Blessings, appreciative delight in our Council of Knights, appreciative delight in our spouses and relatives, and maybe especially taking appreciative delight in ourselves and dropping any negativity towards myself.



Get ready for a busy February. We start the Lenten season on Ash Wednesday the 18th. Lent is when we engage in various traditional rituals and practices as a way of preparing spiritually for the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter Sunday. Fasting is common during Lent and involves giving up certain foods, activities or habits as a form of self-discipline and spiritual reflection.

St. Agatha, Virgin and Martyr, Memorial

St Agatha of Sicily was born in 231 AD. 15-year-old Agatha, from a rich and noble family, made a vow of virginity for Christ's sake and rejected the amorous advances of the Roman prefect Quintianus, who thought he could force her to turn away from her vows and marry him. His persistent proposals were constantly spurned by Agatha. Quintianus expected Agatha to give in to his demands when faced with torture and possible death, but Agatha simply reaffirmed her belief in God by praying: "Jesus Christ, Lord of all, you see my heart, you know my desires. Possess all that I am. I am your sheep: make me worthy to overcome the devil." Agatha was sentenced to be burnt at the stake; however, an earthquake prevented this from happening, and she was instead sent to a prison, where St. Peter the Apostle appeared to her and healed her wounds. St. Agatha died in that prison in the year 251 AD. She is the patron saint of Sicily, breast cancer patients, nurses, rape victims, and against fire.

Thank you again for your dedication to our Assembly. I look forward to seeing you at our upcoming meetings and events as we continue to serve with unity and purpose.



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The Light Offered, The Sword Foretold, The Promise Fulfilled

February enters quietly, like a soft glow behind frost-covered windows, and yet it holds within it one of the most radiant feasts of the liturgical year. On February 2, the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church celebrates the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, also called Candlemas, when Christ is brought to the Temple forty days after His birth. It is the moment when Mary, the Immaculate Mother, and Joseph, the silent guardian of the mystery, carry the Light of the world into the house of prayer, and the shadows flee before Him. Candlemas is the feast where flame becomes symbol, where candles are blessed and held high as a sign that Christ is the light who pierces every darkness and reveals the path of salvation. In this sacred offering, we watch the Holy Family ascend the Temple steps not simply in obedience to the Law, but as participants in the unfolding revelation of God's eternal plan. The Child is lifted. The Light is shown. The Promise enters His own dwelling as both Lord and Lamb.

As Christ is presented, heaven opens the mouth of Simeon, the righteous elder who had waited his entire life for this single hour. With trembling hands, he takes the Eternal Word into his aging arms and proclaims the Nunc Dimittis, the great canticle of fulfillment. Here, prophecy becomes flesh. Here, longing becomes sight. Yet nestled within this joy is the shadow of the Cross, for Simeon turns to Mary and speaks words that pierce the ages: "A sword shall pierce your own soul." February is therefore not a month of light alone, but of light that knows its cost.

Candlemas reveals that the brightness of Christ cannot be separated from the suffering He will endure, and the glory of Mary cannot be separated from the sorrow she will bear. The Presentation is Bethlehem meeting Calvary. The blessed candles


that glow in our hands are both gentle and fierce, symbols of warmth and warning. They teach us that divine light is never sentimental but always salvific, illuminating not only joy but truth, judgment, and the path that leads to Golgotha.

To live February well is to walk with Mary and Joseph into the Temple of our own lives, offering Christ in every thought, word, and deed. It is to lift Him high as the center of our days, to let His light scatter our darkness, and to accept, with humility, the swords that come with discipleship. And to my brother Knights, this month calls us to carry our candles beyond the sanctuary, becoming torches in a world that often prefers twilight to truth. Let us be men who hold fast to the light of Christ when others strain to extinguish it, men who imitate Simeon's fidelity, Anna's perseverance, Joseph's obedience, and Mary's unwavering surrender. Let us recommit ourselves to the mission of guarding the flame of faith in our families, councils, and parishes.

February is the month when light is offered, prophecy spoken, and destiny revealed. Let us rise to meet it with courage. Let us lift our candles high. Let us become, through grace, men whose lives shine with the radiance of Christ Himself.



Pope Leo XIV Speaks Out On Language

We live in increasingly complex and divisive times. Communication means and supporting technologies permit us to share thoughts instantly and globally. Clarity of message is critical to the transfer of real intent. But not everyone's motive for communicating is necessarily directed at the common good. Sadly, we have experienced this in far too many ways in today's society.

In his first major State of the World address to ambassadors, Pope Leo XIV zoomed in on vocabulary. Yes, he spoke about war, multilateralism, and human rights. But one passage landed with particular force in the age of AI and social media: The Pope warned that "the meaning of words is becoming ever more fluid," increasingly ambiguous, and even "a weapon" used to deceive or punish opponents.

He cautioned that "a new Orwellian-style language is developing," which, while claiming to be inclusive, ends up excluding those who do not conform. Orwell dramatized the same idea in *Nineteen Eighty-Four* with the concept of "Newspeak," a controlled vocabulary designed to shrink what people can say — and, therefore, what they can even manage to think. The aim is not persuasion but limitation: **If a society lacks the words for moral truth, dissent, or conscience, those realities become harder to articulate aloud, then harder to defend.**

Pope Leo's point is that, when key terms lose stable meaning, public debate becomes a contest of power. The Pope told diplomats that "freedom of speech and expression is guaranteed precisely by the certainty of language and the fact that every term is anchored in the truth."


Weak language is not a question of bad style: It's a **moral problem**. Catholic tradition is blunt about the stakes. The Catechism (§2486) teaches that

misrepresenting the truth "undermine[s] the foundations" of our shared life. It also describes Christian witness as a "transmission of the faith in words and deeds," **insisting that speech is never morally neutral.**

That frames Pope Leo's "Orwellian" warning as more than cultural commentary. If language becomes mushy — if words are endlessly redefined **until no one can say what is true** — then conscience and freedom are easier to pressure, and the weak are easier to discard. In 2026, when AI can generate flawless prose in seconds, the spiritual test is simpler and harder: **Will we choose words that tell the truth, or words that help us evade it?**

This is a bold and very timely statement by the Pope. As Catholic men, we have chosen to join an organization based on the principles of unity, charity, fraternity, and patriotism. Communications at our meetings, in our community activities, and in our published materials must not be fluid, ambiguous, or worse.

In the end, life is about the relationships we build with our brothers and sisters in our council, assembly, church, and broader community. Ultimately, these relationships are based on trust and integrity. Pope Leo XIV is telling us that to **walk the walk**, we must also be very clear in how we **talk the talk**. Truth and morality depend on it!

Hardwired for Communion

*Young men won't find fulfillment in digital distraction,
but in a life shaped by faith, fraternity and self-gift*

Last November, I participated in the inaugural Symposium on Young American Men in Washington, D.C. Convened to address the growing crisis of isolation and disconnectedness among young men, it brought together experts and scholars to discuss the reasons behind the crisis - and to offer solutions.

Polling data presented at the symposium by the research firm Cygnal was startling. Nearly 70% of Gen Z men (born between 1997 and 2012) spend one to six hours a day online, and 27% spend six hours or more - browsing, gaming or scrolling through their social media feeds. More than 44% spend between three and six hours per day on YouTube alone, and 11% spend even more time on the site than that. Internet gaming - which researchers link to increased exposure to pornography - is rampant among Gen Z. More than half play video games daily, and nearly 36% play for more than two hours a day.

The data shows that heavy digital usage has a clear link with poor levels of happiness and mental health among young men. Brad Wilcox, a professor of sociology at the University of Virginia, says the addictive nature of gaming, social media and pornography is causing men "to lose their drive and ability to socialize, learn, date, work and form a family." He notes that many of his college-age female students lament that they have never been asked out on a date.

Amid the discouraging findings, there were some rays of hope. The polling showed that other behaviors correlate with positive outcomes. Young men who practice their faith, exercise regularly, have male mentors, and spend minimal time online report significantly higher levels of happiness and better mental health.

Isolation and disconnectedness are nothing new. What is new is the way today's technologies are designed to be immersive and addictive, which makes it so easy to fall into isolating patterns. The men of Blessed Michael McGivney's time were not drowning in internet addiction, but they were struggling with a host of other challenges: low wages, domestic hardship, alcoholism and rejection by mainstream society. These realities shaped Father McGivney's response - and our current realities must shape our own.

The Knights of Columbus can make a real difference in the lives of young men by showing them a path to greater fulfillment and connection. Young men need to know that there is a Christian vision for their purpose and destiny. They need brother Knights to serve as mentors and friends - men who can inspire them to get offline and connect with that vision. They need to understand that they are hardwired for connection and communion - with one another and with God. And they need to know that the Church respects their inherent dignity as men and offers them a compelling vision of authentic masculinity. It's a vision that calls them to make a gift of themselves to others - and through that sacrifice, they find authentic flourishing.

Men deserve better than a life of mediocrity spent online and without a Christian vision of their purpose. St. Pier Giorgio Frassati, canonized this past September, put it this way a century ago in a letter to a friend: "To live without Faith, without a patrimony to defend, without steady struggle for Truth, that is not living but existing."

At their core, all men have a deep desire to be challenged with a vision of life that calls them to sacrifice for a higher purpose. And in today's society, there is no greater challenge for any man than to fully embrace a Christian life. This is a life of real heroism. It is a life of consequence that our times demand. Is it easy? No. Is it worth it? Yes. And it is a life that will make all the difference - in this world and the next.



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,

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
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Prayer for our Nation
