What a busy and joyful month of March we had which included the last four weeks of our Lenten Fish Fry. We had a tremendous season this year. Last year, we had a record-breaking year in terms of meals served and in revenue. I'm happy to report that we had another record-breaking year in revenue with a total of 3,289 meals served. I am so pleased at how smoothly everything went this season. Everyone worked together as a team to provide a great atmosphere and quality service and a fun filled experience. Even though we had an unfortunate situation resulting in the fire department coming out and closing us down for almost two hours during our fourth fish fry, we banded together and served 355 meals in an hour and half without missing a beat. In Week 1 we served 524 meals, Week 2 we served 570 meals, Week 3 we served 674 meals, Week 4 we served 355 meals, Week 5 we served 581 meals and in Week 6, we served 585 meals. I want to thank everyone who volunteered to make this season the best. I look forward to working with all of you again next year.

Chaplain's Corner

Jamais plus la guerre

For more than half a century, the Catholic Church has proclaimed a clear and consistent message to the world: war must never be accepted as inevitable, and peace must remain a moral imperative for all humanity.

In 1965, amid the height of the Cold War, Pope Paul VI became the first pope to address the United Nations General Assembly. There, he issued his historic plea: "*Jamais plus la guerre.*" "*Never again war.*" Repeating the call, "No more war, never again war," he warned that "war must stop, or war will stop humanity." His message urged nations to lay down arms, reject the illusion of security through weapons, and commit instead to dialogue and cooperation. It was a defining moment that established peace as a central pillar of the Church's global witness.

This call was later reaffirmed by Pope John Paul II, who continued to emphasize that true peace is rooted not in power, but in justice and respect for human dignity.

In 1983, the US Bishops, led by Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, built upon this foundation with the pastoral letter *The Challenge of Peace: God's Promise and Our Response*. While maintaining the framework of Just War Theory, the bishops introduced a strong presumption against war, insisting that it must always be a last resort under strict moral conditions. They stressed that the destruction caused by war must never outweigh the good it seeks to achieve - an especially urgent concern in a nuclear age.

The letter also rejected the targeting of civilians and opposed the first use of nuclear weapons, challenging policies that placed entire populations at risk. Central to its teaching was the idea of a "consistent ethic of life," linking the defense of human life at all stages with the pursuit of peace. In this vision, the common good

of humanity must take precedence over national or political interests.

That same moral clarity continues today in the voice of Pope Leo XIV. In his recent public addresses, he has warned against the growing normalization of violence, particularly in regions torn by ongoing conflict. He has described the devastation in stark terms, pointing to the loss of innocent lives and the destruction of homes, schools, and hospitals. In his Palm Sunday homily, he stated that God rejects the prayers of leaders who start wars and have "hands full of blood," asserting that "violence can never lead to justice, stability and peace that people are waiting for."

His message is direct: war does not solve problems - it only amplifies them. He has called on leaders to "reopen paths of dialogue" and to reject any attempt to justify violence, reminding the faithful that true peace cannot be built on bloodshed. Instead, he urges the global community to act with responsibility and to choose diplomacy over destruction before conflicts deepen beyond repair.

From Pope Paul VI's historic appeal to the continued leadership of Pope Leo XIV, the Church's teaching remains unwavering. As Knights of Columbus, we are called to live out this message in our own lives - promoting peace, defending human dignity, and standing as witnesses to the belief that a more just and peaceful world is not only possible, but necessary.

"Never again war" is more than a phrase - it is a call to action for each of us.

- April 28 – St. Peter Chanel, Priest and Martyr; St. Louis Mary de Montfort, Priest optional memorial

- April 29 – St. Catherine of Siena, Virgin and Doctor of the Church, Memorial
- April 30 – St. Pius V, Pope, religious, optional memorial.

St. Peter Chanel

St. Peter Chanel was born in France on July 12, 1803, the fifth of eight children. From ages 7 to 12, he worked as a shepherd. A local parish priest persuaded his parents to allow him to attend a small school, where his piety and intelligence soon became evident. He made his First Holy Communion in March 1817, and around this time developed a desire for missionary work after reading letters sent back from America by Bishop Dubourg.

In 1819, he entered the seminary at Meximieux and was ordained on July 15, 1827. Although he initially sought to serve in the missions, he was instead appointed parish priest of Crozat, where he served for three years. He found the parish in poor condition, with low attendance and little religious formation among the youth. Through his zeal and care - especially for the sick - he gradually won over the people.

In 1831, Chanel joined the Society of Mary (Marists), dedicated to both local and foreign missionary work. In 1836, he was chosen to lead a group of seven missionaries to the South Pacific. After a long journey, he arrived on the island of Futuna in November 1837. Though initially welcomed by the local king, the mission proved difficult due to isolation and cultural challenges. Still, some islanders were baptized, and others began instruction in the faith.

Tensions arose when the king feared Christianity would weaken his authority. When his own son sought baptism, the king ordered a warrior, Musumusu, to intervene. Pretending to seek medical help, Musumusu approached Chanel and killed him with an axe on April 28, 1841.

St. Peter Chanel was declared a martyr and was later beatified on November 17, 1989.

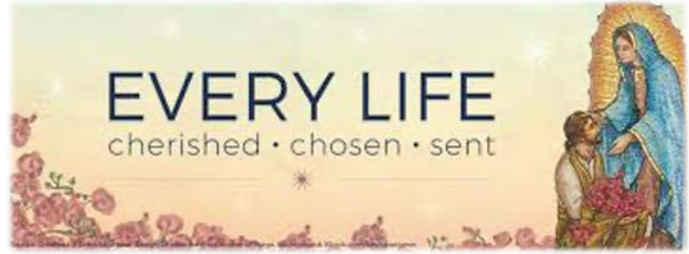

The Month of the Cross, the Empty Tomb, and the Ocean of Mercy

April enters the year as a threshold between sorrow and triumph, a sacred bridge where the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church walks with Christ from the agony of Gethsemane into the blazing light of the Resurrection. It is the month when Holy Week unfurls like a great tapestry of salvation, each day woven with divine intention and infinite love. Palm branches rustle with both hope and warning. The Upper Room becomes the birthplace of the Eucharist. The Garden trembles beneath the weight of betrayal. Calvary rises like a mountain of victory disguised as defeat. In April, the Cross stands at the center of the world, not as an instrument of cruelty but as the throne of the Redeemer who pours Himself out in perfect love. The nails, the thorns, the wounds, the blood, all become the language of a God who refuses to abandon His creation.

Holy Week is not merely remembered. It is entered, lived, and carried within the soul. It is the solemn pilgrimage through death into life.

Then dawn breaks upon Easter morning, and the stone that sealed the tomb is rolled away not only from Christ's grave but from the hearts of all who believe. Easter is not a single day. It is the unending reality that time cannot contain and death cannot silence. In April, the Church stands before the empty tomb listening to the angelic proclamation that shatters despair. The Risen Christ appears not to kings but to the faithful women who never abandoned Him, and to apostles still trembling with fear, reminding the world that His victory begins in love that heals the wounded and strengthens the weak. Each appearance of Christ after the Resurrection is infused with tenderness. Peace be with you. Do not be afraid. Touch my wounds. Break bread with me. In these encounters the Resurrection ceases to be an idea and becomes a fire that ignites every Christian life. Through the empty tomb, the world is reborn. Through the victory of Christ, hope becomes

stronger than death, and love becomes stronger than all the darkness that once ruled the human heart.

April then draws the faithful toward the radiant feast of Divine Mercy, the gift given through Saint Faustina to strengthen a world wounded by doubt and sin. Divine Mercy Sunday, set at the octave of Easter, reveals the heart of the Risen Christ as an ocean of compassion into which humanity is invited to plunge without fear. From His pierced side flow blood and water, symbols of the sacraments and channels of grace. In this month, the Church reminds her children that mercy is not a mere attribute of God. Mercy is His identity. And to my brother Knights, April calls us to enter this ocean with courage, to be men who stand at the foot of the Cross, kneel at the empty tomb, and carry the message of mercy into every corner of our community. Let us serve the broken, console the grieving, reconcile the estranged, and proclaim the victory of Christ with the conviction of men who have seen the dawn after the longest night. April is the month of redemption, resurrection, and renewal. Let us live it with hearts made new.

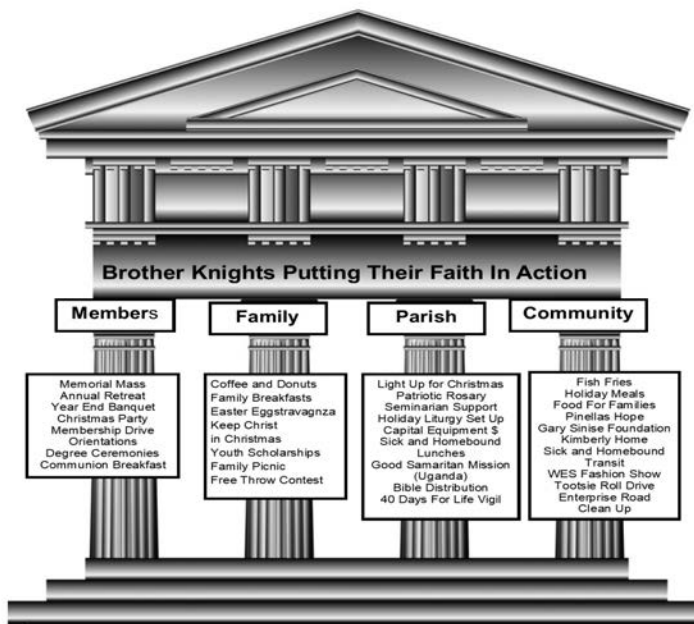

Letter to the Editor

He Is Risen... are we?

First, congratulations to all on our 11th successful year of Fish Fries. Our service to our Parish and community fully represents our principles as Knights and our Auxiliary. Then we turn all that work and profit into even more benefits to the community. We know our plan and execute it well. But what about our bigger plan? Our life plan.

The Gospel of the Fifth Sunday of Lent covered the death of Lazarus, one of Jesus's best friends, as well as his devoted sisters Martha and Mary. Martha and Mary knew Lazarus was failing and asked Jesus for help. We learn in John 11 that Jesus said that the illness would not end in death but would glorify God. Jesus stayed where He was, and Lazarus died. Martha and Mary were devastated by the loss. After several days, Jesus returned to Bethany. Martha confronted Jesus saying, **"Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died"**.

Jesus told her, **"I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?"** She said to him, **"Yes, Lord."** Jesus was taken to the tomb and wept. Some of the Jews said, **"Could not the one who opened the eyes of the blind man have done something so that this man would not have died?"** This perturbed Jesus, and He said, **"Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?"**

With that, **"He cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!"** The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth. Many came to believe that day.

While this was a precursor to Christ's death and resurrection, Father Mike Schmitz ties this story to the Prodigal Son. We are mortal. Our time on this earth is limited. But, like Christ, we are destined for eternal life, an eternal life of our choice as believers and followers of Christ, or not.

The Prodigal Son was loved deeply by his father and given great gifts. Yet he chose to squander not only the wealth he was given but also the love of his father. Eventually, he realized the error of his ways, and in his brokenness, came back to his father saying, **"Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as you would treat one of your hired workers."**

Overjoyed, the father welcomed him back, embraced and kissed him, and organized a great feast. This perturbed his older brother, who had always been obedient to the father. In his anger and disappointment, he questioned the father about how he could do this. The father responded, **"My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found."**

We do not know the end of the story of the Prodigal Son. He failed once. Did he learn his lesson, or did he fail again? What did he choose? We know the Father has chosen eternal love and forgiveness for us. We are all broken in one way or another. As we wrap up Lent, we need to ask ourselves, Do I realize the great gift of God's love for me? Do my thoughts and actions reflect my appreciation for the gifts I have been given and are open to me eternally? Will I be a prodigal son, or will I rise with him on the last day?

Generosity of Heart

The virtue of magnanimity opens our hearts to always respond with charity, humility and gratitude to God

Spend any time on social media or watching political debates and you can quickly conclude that certain virtues are missing from our public discourse. Among them is the virtue of magnanimity. Often defined as a largeness or generosity of heart — from the Latin words for “great soul” — magnanimity orients us toward using our gifts in service to others. It gives us the desire to aspire to great things with the time God has given us on earth.

Magnanimity is an essential virtue if we want to effectively lead our families and our brother Knights. Why? Because it gives us a clarity of mission and purpose. It keeps us focused on striving for the highest ideals and helps us avoid the traps and snares set for us by the evil one. Whereas pride and presumption lead to envy, jealousy, rivalries and a host of other small-minded maladies, magnanimity shows us the more excellent way. St. Paul tells us: “whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just ... if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things” (Phil 4:8).

The magnanimous man is characterized by his selfless generosity of spirit. He knows that he is loved by God and is aware of the gifts and talents that God has given to him. He knows that his gifts are not for his own use but are for serving and lifting up others. And because he is confident in and grateful for these gifts, he recognizes and even celebrates the gifts of others, especially those gifts that he himself may not possess.

In other words, magnanimity gives us the mindset to always see the best in others and interpret their actions and attitudes in the most favorable light possible. It gives us the strength to practice the spiritual works of mercy — bearing wrongs patiently and responding to difficult situations with forbearance and forgiveness rather than revenge. It can be hard to take the high road, especially when we’ve been hurt, but it’s always the better path.

How do we instill magnanimity in our children? As fathers, we should keep in mind that “more is caught than taught” — that is, our children often learn more from observing us than from our instruction. When a magnanimous father demonstrates a generous spirit and speaks well of others, his children take notice. He encourages his children, praising them for their accomplishments and gently correcting them when they need it. He measures his words carefully, for a father’s words of sincere praise are far more fruitful than words of criticism (see Eph 6:4, Col 3:21).

The magnanimous father also sees the great potential in his children. He encourages them to go beyond their comfort zones and to achieve things they may not think possible. He builds their confidence by calling attention to the gifts they have been given. He prays aloud with them and gives them a sense that they, too, have been called by God to greatness — and that they are ultimately called to be saints.

Perhaps most importantly, a father passes on the virtue of magnanimity to his children by loving their mother in thought, word and deed each day. As husbands, we are called to go the extra mile in service to our wives. That can take many forms, but it includes being lavish in our praise, quick to forgive and first to apologize.

St. Teresa of Avila often prayed that God would enlarge her heart. As husbands and fathers, we can make this prayer our own — and we can be confident that God will answer us. Speaking through the prophet Ezekiel, the Lord proclaims, “I will give you a new heart, and a new spirit I will put within you” (Ez 36:26).

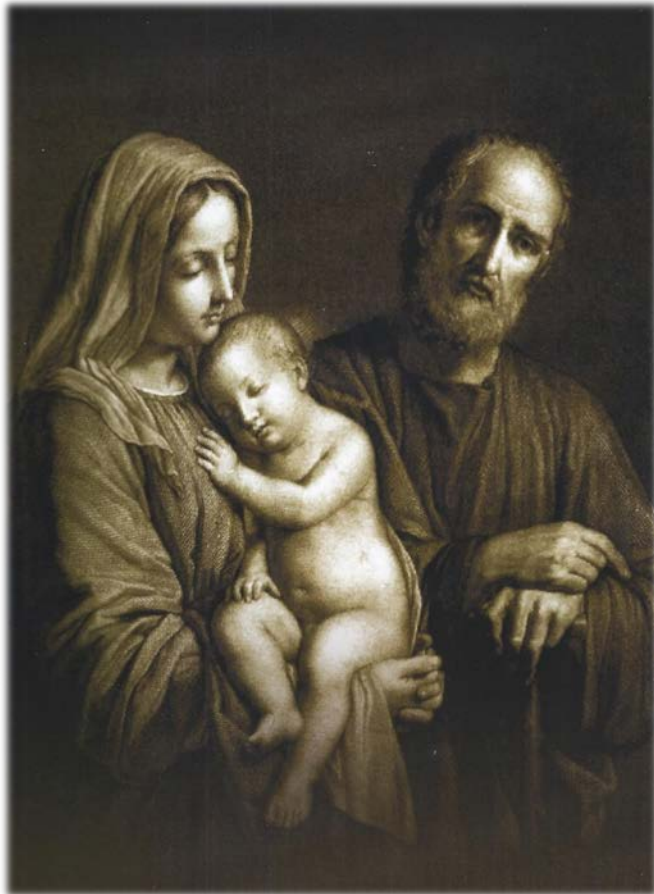

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.

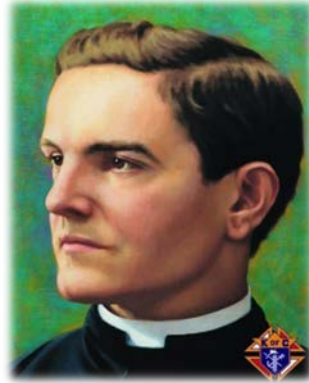
In our daily life and work,
