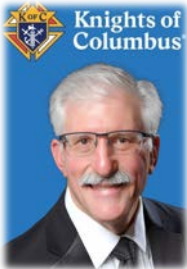

St. Mary Magdalene

St. Mary Magdalene is one of the most prominent women in the Bible and a powerful witness to God's mercy and transforming grace. Although the exact dates of her birth and death are unknown, the Gospels place her at the center of Christ's public ministry, His crucifixion, and His resurrection.

For centuries, Western Christian tradition often identified Mary Magdalene as a prostitute or sexually immoral woman, but Scripture does not support this claim. The Gospels simply tell us that Jesus cast seven demons from her, marking the beginning of her dramatic conversion and lifelong discipleship.

Some scholars have debated whether Mary Magdalene is the unnamed sinful woman who anointed Jesus' feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. While this identification remains uncertain, the Gospels clearly portray Mary as someone whose life was radically transformed by Christ. Her story reminds us that no one is beyond the reach of God's saving grace.

Mary became one of Jesus' devoted followers and was among the women who faithfully accompanied and supported His ministry. She remained near Him during His crucifixion and returned to His tomb on Easter morning to anoint His body. Finding the stone rolled away, she encountered the risen Christ and became the first witness to His resurrection, earning her the title "Apostle to the Apostles."

According to later Christian tradition, Mary remained with the early Church before eventually traveling to southern France, where she is believed to have spent her final years in prayer and solitude.

The Church celebrates the Feast of St. Mary Magdalene on **July 22**. She is the patron saint of converts, repentant sinners, those struggling with temptation, and pharmacists. Her life stands as a lasting testament to the power of repentance, faithful discipleship, and the boundless mercy of Christ.

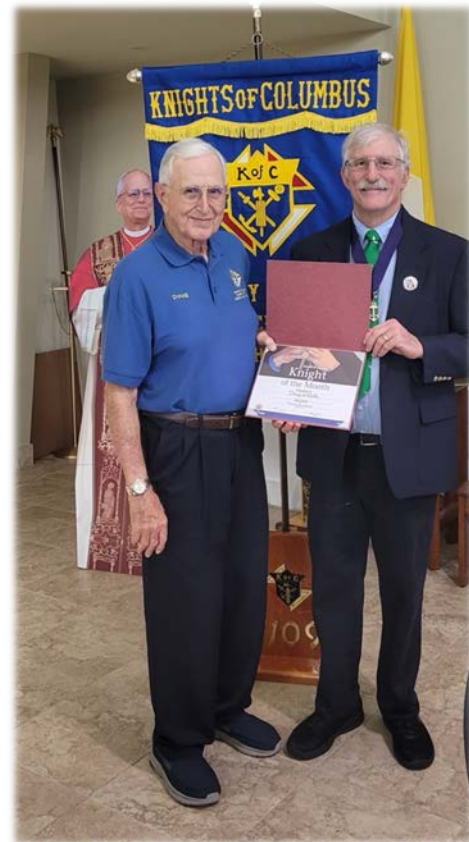

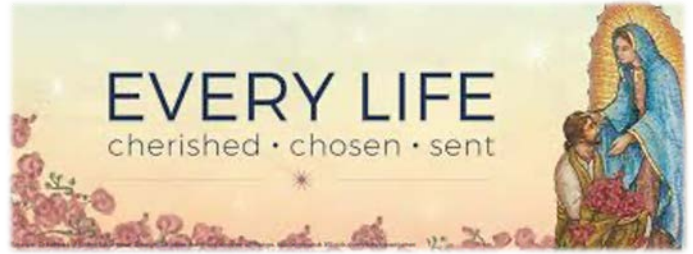

The Month of the Precious Blood, River of Redemption and Seal of the Covenant

July enters the year clothed in solemn splendor, like a crimson banner unfurled over the Church, reminding the faithful of the price of their salvation. It is the month dedicated to the Precious Blood of Jesus, the Blood that fell like rubies upon the earth from Gethsemane to Calvary, each drop carrying the weight of a love deeper than the oceans and older than creation itself. The Precious Blood is not symbol or poetry alone. It is the living price of the new covenant, the river of redemption that flows through the sacraments and into the hearts of the faithful. To contemplate this mystery is to stand before the deepest truth of the Gospel: humanity was not redeemed by power, force, or decree, but by the poured-out life of the God-man who embraced suffering so that the world might be set free. July calls the faithful to gaze upon this Blood with awe, for it is the very heartbeat of salvation, the scarlet thread woven through Scripture from the Passover lamb to the cross of the true Lamb of God.

The story of the Precious Blood is the story of divine love unfolding in crimson light. In the Garden of Gethsemane, the Blood begins to fall, born not of violence but of anguish, revealing the weight of the sins He chose to bear. At the scourging post, it stains the stones as a silent testimony to innocence suffering for guilt. Along the via Dolorosa, it marks the path of sacrifice, like a trail guiding humanity back to the heart of the Father. On the cross, it flows from His hands and feet in streams of mercy. And from His pierced side it pours forth as blood and water, the fountain of the Church's sacramental life. The saints teach that this Blood is the key that unlocks heaven, the shield that defends the soul, the remedy that heals wounds too deep for human consolation. July invites us to enter this mystery not as spectators, but as children washed and claimed

by the covenant sealed in this divine outpouring. The Precious Blood is the song of mercy that has never ceased to echo across the centuries.

To live July rightly is to let this Blood speak into our lives with its quiet authority and boundless compassion. And to my brother Knights, this month summons us to a deeper sense of mission grounded in gratitude for the price of our redemption. Let us be men who defend the dignity of every human life, remembering that every soul is worth the Blood of Christ. Let us console the suffering, uplift the forgotten, and stand firm against injustice, knowing that the covenant carved in Calvary's shadow calls us to courageous charity. Let our councils pray the Litany of the Precious Blood with devotion, enthrone its mystery in our homes, and teach our families to trust in the victory that has already been won. July is the month when the river of redemption flows most clearly before us. Let us step into its waters with fidelity, allowing the Precious Blood to strengthen our hearts, sanctify our mission, and draw us ever closer to the Heart from which it first flowed.

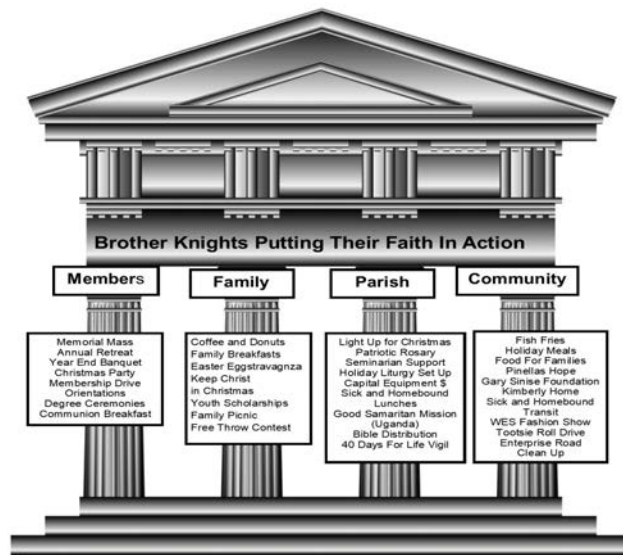

Dominic Patrick Friscia, 88 years old, of Clearwater, Florida, passed away May 28, 2026.

## Letter to the Editor

### Happy 250<sup>TH</sup> In God We Trust

Happy Fourth of July, as we celebrate the 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the signing of our Declaration of Independence. This is a universally historic document as it clearly established the true source of human governance. That is, ***“We hold these truths to be self-evident that all men are created equal and endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights and among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.”*** Self-evident, no sources needed, a strong affirmation. Recognition that the Creator grants human rights, not a King, tyrant, or some other form of human governance. Perfect rights for our order – life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. Further, fifty-six men signed that document, fully committed to seeking Creator-given rights with the knowledge that their choice could involve risk and sacrifice. They signed with the closing phrase that they were offering ***“our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.”*** Nine of those men gave their lives; others their fortunes. None yielded their sacred honor.

This led to arguably the second-most recognized document on human governance – the US Constitution. In the very first amendment, our Constitution specified freedom of religion as a fundamental right. The Magna Carta is the only competitor to our Constitution.

On June 14, 1954, Flag Day, President Eisenhower signed a joint Congressional resolution adding the words ***“In God We Trust”*** to our money. The addition was heavily influenced by the Cold War and the Second Red Scare. Lawmakers aimed to distinguish the United States from the officially atheistic Soviet Union by emphasizing the nation's spiritual and religious heritage.

On Flag Day 2026, the Orlando Sentinel published an article questioning adding that phrase to our money. The author, David Williamson observed, ***“While we’re on the subject of national anniversaries, our national motto has one coming up. “In God We Trust” turns 70 in a few weeks. Somehow it seems***

***older — those must have been a tough 70 years. A national motto should reflect the values that unite a nation. But on July 30, 1956, President Eisenhower signed “In God We Trust” into law as the motto of the United States, despite the fact that Americans were not then, have never been, and are not now united by a shared religion.”***

Yes, it has been a tough 70 years. Journalism used to be professional. The most popular journalist of the era, Walter Cronkite, would close his broadcasts with the words, ***“And that’s the way it is.”*** Now, in far too many cases, the claim should be, and this is what I’m trying to convince you of. It’s not even an opinion. It’s active disinformation. In those 70 years, we have aborted over 68 million babies, expanded our gender base from the two given by our Creator to an ever-expanding number of our choosing, we have suffered an unprecedented major attack on our soil, and we have gone from basically no national debt to over \$38 trillion based on the choices we have made. John Adams told us well over 200 years ago that our Constitution was written for a moral people. Today, our core morality as a culture is in question.

The author sets up a false dilemma in his article. He says, we have never been united by a shared religion and thus cannot claim ***“In God we trust.”*** Our Declaration of Independence addresses our Creator. It does name a particular God or religion. Our Constitution provides for freedom of religion. It does not direct us to a specific God or even a specific god or religion. Lack of a “shared religion” has nothing to do with trusting in God as a diverse people.

In 1954, the Knights of Columbus successfully lobbied to add two words to our Pledge of Allegiance, which was written in 1892. Those two words? ***Under God.*** Not only, In God We Trust. But we are also one nation Under God. These are the core values of our Order as Knights of Columbus, as well as our formation as a country. On July 4, 2026 proudly proclaim that In God We Trust and realize the blessing that we are one nation Under God.

## *From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...*

### **The Heart of the Father**

*Through the Eucharist, Christ teaches that authentic fatherhood begins  
with receiving and sharing the sacrificial love of God*

As we celebrate Corpus Christi Sunday (June 7), the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus (June 12) and Father's Day (June 21), we are invited to meditate more deeply on the love of Christ revealed in the Eucharist and reflected in the vocation of fatherhood.

This year, in a special way, the U.S. bishops will consecrate the United States to the Sacred Heart of Jesus on June 11 - as part of the broader observance of the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. The formal act of consecrating the nation to the Sacred Heart is a way of entrusting our country to the love and guidance of Christ. According to the U.S. bishops, the consecration is meant "to remind everyone of our task to serve our nation by perfecting the temporal order with the spirit of the Gospel."

That idea - perfecting the temporal order with the spirit of the Gospel" - is a tall order. When contemplating something so big, I find it helpful to think of something a little closer to home. St. John Paul II reminded us that "the future of humanity passes by way of the family" (*Familiaris Consortio*, 86).

What does devotion to the Sacred Heart have to do with the family? How can this devotion help us become better husbands and fathers? I believe the answer lies in meeting Christ in and through the Eucharist. The Mass teaches us four lessons essential to understanding what it means to be a father.

First, the Mass connects us to the heart of Christ and gives us the true heart of a father. In revealing the Father's love, Christ is our best guide for what it means to be a father, and he shows us that being a good father begins with being a good son. Jesus said: "I came down from heaven not to do my own will but the will of the one who sent me" (Jn 6:38). The better we understand who we are as God's sons, the better fathers we will be to our own children.

Second, in the sacred liturgy we hear the Father's voice, and he teaches us. Through the readings, we hear our heavenly Father encouraging, correcting and instructing us. We see Jesus modeling how we should act and think. We learn about forgiveness and mercy. The Mass, then, reveals the meaning of a father's love in all its dimensions - a love we are called to make our own and pass on to our children.

The third lesson the Mass teaches is sacrificial love. This is the very essence of the Eucharist. Our heavenly Father made the ultimate sacrifice - his only Son - out of love for us. It was an act in which Jesus himself fully shared. Christ shows us that giving one's life for others is the greatest gift one person can give another.

As fathers, we are called to make a similar sacrifice - to give all that we are and all that we have for the sake of our wives and children. Every family needs a man willing to love sacrificially in this way. We learn that love through the sacrifice of Christ that we encounter in the liturgy.

Finally, the Mass teaches us that Jesus entrusts us with a mission and sends us forth. Yes, modern life is complex, but God works through his creation - and he works through us. He is greater than the forces shaping our world, and he gives us the capacity to achieve great things if we rely on him.

The most important difference we can make in shaping the world is in shaping our children. The Eucharist gives us the strength to fulfill this calling and to form our families - especially our children - as disciples of Jesus Christ.

Devotion to the Sacred Heart is not complicated. At its core, it means having a personal relationship with Christ. And the best way to deepen that relationship is through the Eucharist, where Christ teaches us to love with his own heart.

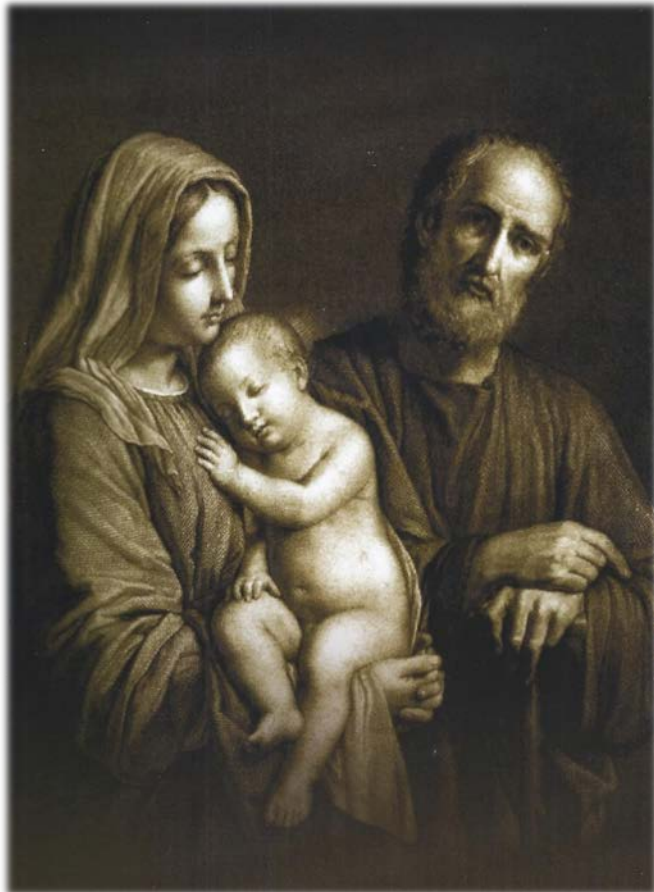

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.

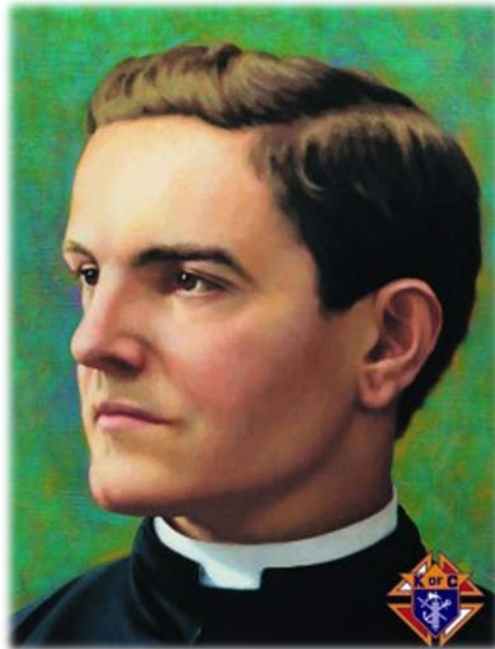
In our daily life and work,
