

### Words of Wisdom from our Grand Knight

### THE REAL MEANING OF THANKSGIVING TO A 5th GRADER

Historically speaking, the first Thanksgiving Day in 1621 was when the Puritans and the Patuxet tribe had a three day celebration celebrating a successful harvest in their new colony near Plymouth, MA. Later, the next Thanksgiving Day was the one declared by George Washington in 1789 to give thanks to their Creator and to celebrate the founding of a new country. Later still, another Thanksgiving Day was declared by Abraham Lincoln on October 3, 1863 to thank God for a full list of blessings incurred over the last year including peaceful relations with other nations, population growth, and fruitful fields. At this time, he also asked all Americans to pray for the healing of the nation's wounds from the Civil War. In 1870, President Ulysses Grant included Thanksgiving in the Holidays Act but no repetitive annual date was determined. Then in 1939, President Franklin Roosevelt declared that the fourth Thursday of November would be Thanksgiving Day, as it continues today.

Growing up in north central Illinois, my Mom and Dad traveled home to Detroit, Michigan on Thanksgiving and on Easter every year. With no major highways as we have today, that trip took 12-14 hours depending on weather and traffic. As I got older, I remembered more and more of that trip. Concurrently, the type of car my Dad had continued to change as I was the oldest of eight children.

On one Thanksgiving trip, my Grandfather was a bit more talkative to us than normal. I vaguely remember being in 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup> grade and could probably carry on a better conversation than in years past. The one conversation that I remember was when he asked me and my brother Pat what Thanksgiving Day was all about. After we answered his question relating our trip from Illinois to see him and Grandma, about eating turkey with more food than we typically saw at any other meal during the year, and about getting to see Bozo the Clown on the Windsor, Ontario TV station in Detroit. Off course he asked if we enjoyed watching the Detroit Lions play football on Thanksgiving Day. I remember that was much less important than Bozo.

While at first, he was encouraging to see where we would take the conversation and to see where our priorities were. Then there was a great pause. He then asked us what was the most important to us, Thanksgiving, or the Day? My brother immediately answered the day was the answer as Thanksgiving was an old, old holiday from back with the Puritans and the Indians. I was puzzled as my Grandfather did not ask foolish questions and I came to the conclusion that my brother was wrong, but did not know why.

"Are you thankful for your parents?", my Grandfather asked. Sure Grandpa, of course.

"Are you thankful for your family?", was my Grandfather's next question.

Then, "Are you thankful for being able to play outside and go to school?" My brother asked why should we be thankful for school which my Grandfather responded with a long litany of reasons why education was important. He was an honor graduate of Purdue University with a degree in Electrical Engineering and worked for Michigan Bell, a Division of American Telephone & Telegraph, known today as AT&T.

I was starting to figure out what my Grandfather was talking about.

"Are you thankful that our country is not at war and that we can live in peace?" he asked. My brother Pat was puzzled as he had not heard the adults talking about World War II and Korea like I had.

His last question puzzled both my brother and myself. On numerous occasions, we had seen Grandpa kneeling along side of his bed, both in the morning and at night, loudly thanking God for the blessings that he had during the day or asking God to help him accomplish certain things during the day. Even though me and three of my brothers we in St Mary's Elementary School at home, we had never seen this at school, or at home with either Mom or Dad, or anywhere else.

He had asked me and my brother Pat how often we thanked God for all of the blessings which we had. He finally reminded us that Thanksgiving Day in November is when all of the peoples in the United States of America thanked their Creator for all of the good things that have happened to them over the past year. He reminded us that we need to thank God at least daily, but preferably multiple times daily for the blessings that he had bestowed upon us, our family and our friends.

I wish that I would have followed his example a bit better than I have done. While I never forgot that expressing one's thankfulness to other individuals is quite important, but one should also never forget to thank God for the many blessings which He has bestowed upon us.



My Grandfather was one of the Electrical Engineers working in the Long Lines Division that perfected long-distance telephone calls. That division was originally in Sacramento, California, but AT&T had decided to centralize their engineers in Detroit, Michigan to develop a stronger, unified approach to enabling long-distance telephone calls, and then continually improve them. When he retired after 48 years working on the same project for AT&T, long distance phone calls were being sent across the nation by microwave. His last project before retirement was interfacing with Comsat which was a public/private communication satellite network.

I've now had the pleasure of celebrating over a dozen Thanksgivings but, a few years ago, at one of the Thanksgiving celebrations I attended, we did something that I found really underlines the meaning of our celebration today.

Rather than have the usual grace before meal, each of us round the table were asked to share a short prayer of thanksgiving to God for what we were thankful for in the past year. And those prayers made us all realize how blessed we all were by God. And the blessings we focused on weren't just the usual blessings such as the freedom we have to gather together for Thanksgiving, or for the gift of being able to see and breathe and hear, things that we all too often take for granted. But one of the things that came up time and again in our thanksgiving prayers that year were thanks for the trials and sufferings we had experienced in our lives, trials that had helped us to experience the love and support of those around us. We were doing, as Paul was asking us to do, to rejoice always in the Lord and always giving thanks.

So, as we celebrate Thanksgiving may God bless you all abundantly and, at this special time of year, may we always be able to rejoice and give thanks to God for the many blessings we have received from God, both the good and the bad.









The first day of school our professor introduced himself and challenged us to get to know someone we didn't already know.

I stood up to look around when a gentle hand touched my shoulder. I turned around to find a wrinkled, little old lady beaming up at me with a smile that lit up her entire being.

She said, "Hi handsome. My name is Rose. I'm eighty-seven years old. Can I give you a hug?" I laughed and enthusiastically responded, "Of course you may!" and she gave me a giant squeeze.

"Why are you in college at such a young, innocent age?" I asked.

She jokingly replied, "I'm here to meet a rich husband, get married, and have a couple of kids..." "No seriously," I asked. I was curious what may have motivated her to be taking on this challenge at her age. "I always dreamed of having a college education and now I'm getting one!" she told me.

After class we walked to the student union building and shared a chocolate milkshake. We became instant friends. Every day for the next three months, we would leave class together and talk nonstop. I was always mesmerized listening to this "time machine" as she shared her wisdom and experience with me. Over the course of the year, Rose became a campus icon and she easily made friends wherever she went. She loved to dress up and she reveled in the attention bestowed upon her from the other students. She was living it up.

At the end of the semester we invited Rose to speak at our football banquet. I'll never forget what she taught us. She was introduced and stepped up to the podium. As she began to deliver her prepared speech, she dropped her three by five cards on the floor. Frustrated and a little embarrassed she leaned into the microphone and simply said, "I'm sorry I'm so jittery. I gave up beer for Lent and this whiskey is killing me! I'll never get my speech back in order so let me just tell you what I know."

As we laughed she cleared her throat and began, "We do not stop playing because we are old; we grow old because we stop playing. There are only four secrets to staying young, being happy, and achieving success. You have to laugh and find humor every day. You've got to have a dream. When you lose your dreams, you die. We have so many people walking around who are dead and don't even know it! There is a huge difference between growing older and growing up.

Difficult roads can lead to beautiful destinations.

If you are nineteen years old and lie in bed for one full year and don't do one productive thing, you will turn twenty years old. If I am eighty-seven years old and stay in bed for a year and never do anything I will turn eighty-eight. Anybody can grow older. That doesn't take any talent or ability. The idea is to grow up by always finding opportunity in change. Have no regrets. The elderly usually don't have regrets for what we did, but rather for things we did not do. The only people who fear death are those with regrets."


She concluded her speech by courageously singing "The Rose." She challenged each of us to study the lyrics and live them out in our daily lives.

At the year's end Rose finished the college degree she had begun all those years ago. One week after graduation Rose died peacefully in her sleep.

**IMMOKALEE** REPORT






