

Words of Wisdom from our Grand Knight

ONTO THE FINISH LINE

We have had a rather great year in our Council. From the start, we had an Operating Plan for the year, and we followed it. Many thanks to all of you for your contributions to the Council's success. We should be able to fulfill most of our objectives of our Operating Plan by the end of this month.

Looking forward, our Nominating Committee lead by Lou Nagy and assisted by Ron Balaze and Mike Monville, has completed their work and will present their Slate of Officers to the Council at our monthly Council Membership Meeting next month in May. Our election of new Officers will be at the Council Membership Meeting in June.

Gerard Bernard has already had one meeting to start the budgeting process for our 2025-2026 Fiscal Year. He has one more meeting scheduled in the middle of the month. He will present the final Draft Budget to the Officers at their meeting later this month. Once approved by the Officers, the Budget will be presented to the membership at the May Council Membership Meeting for discussion. The final Council Budget for 2025-2026 will be voted upon by the general membership at the Council Membership Meeting in June.

The Council calendar has gone through two revisions and updates so far and the final revision will occur at the Officers Meeting later this month. Our Final version of the 2025-2026 Council Calendar will be reviewed and distributed to the general membership after our Council Membership Meeting in May. You are already aware that timely revisions and updates do occur during the year and updated versions of the Council Calendars will be distributed in a Microsoft Excel format as needed.

One of the things that we noticed early on in this Program Year was that a vast majority of our fund raising activities were in the last half of the year. When you review this year's calendar, I would strongly suggest that we look for fund raising activities to fill in the first half of the year. Over the past two years, we have upgraded two of our fund raising activities to a level that some of our minor charitable contributions have been diminished. Our Golf Outing went from raising around \$5,000 for general charitable purposes to almost \$15,000 for specific charitable purposes. With the start of the Deacon Tom Grant Scholarship Fund, our Christmas Party proceeds which we used for general charitable purposes now will go directly to the Deacon Tom Scholarship Fund.

I am not complaining about either function. Both are very important, both need to be funded and supported, but we have lost opportunity for general fund raising to fill the needs of other items on our path to Star Council. We need fund raisers to fill the voids left by consolidating charitable support for these two major efforts. The first half of the year is essentially wide open to providing opportunities to plan fund raising efforts for these "smaller", but essential, charitable donations. We need ideas from you on how to go about creating and accomplishing these smaller fund raisers.

Two final items, by the time this newsletter is distributed, I will have set the date for our Annual Appreciation Luncheon to thank our members and the Ladies Auxiliary for the tremendous amount of time and effort put into all of our functions and events this year. I will announce the date and location of our Luncheon at the next Council Membership Meeting. And finally, our next Exemplification will be on Thursday, May 15, 2025 at Tillotson Hall at 7:00 PM. Please attend to show support for our new members.

Lent ends at sundown on Holy Thursday and then we enter the three holiest days of the year, with Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil. They are, as the USCCB says, one liturgy spread over three days, as we remember the Last Supper, Jesus' Passion and Death and, on the holiest night of the year, His Resurrection. I will briefly reflect on Holy Thursday and Good Friday but want to focus especially on the importance of the Easter Vigil.

Holy Thursday gives us the chance to reflect on the Last Supper, on Jesus' last meal with his disciples, when he washed their feet (as we will do on Holy Thursday night), and when we celebrate the gift of the Eucharist and the priesthood, and we remember Jesus' betrayal. Deacon Harry and I will wash the feet of twelve parishioners as a symbol of our call to serve you, the parishioners of Our Lady of Mount Carmel.

Good Friday, of course, we remember Jesus' Passion and death. In that service (which is a service, not a mass) we always hear John's account of Jesus' Passion, and we have the opportunity to venerate the cross. This service is, of course, deliberately stark and simple with very little music and begins with the priest and the deacon normally prostrating on the floor before the altar. The altar is bare until Communion time and there are also no candles until Communion time.

And, of course, the Easter Vigil is a celebration of Jesus' Resurrection. But the Easter Vigil is so much more than that. If you have never been to an Easter Vigil, I would strongly encourage you to attend one. Many people say that the Easter Vigil is too long but, although it is 2 hours plus, if you attend an Easter Vigil you will know that the time goes by very fast; it doesn't seem that long! There are so many wonderful parts of the service, and I want to unpack those briefly in this month's reflection.


The service begins with the service of light. We gather in darkness and light a fire as a reminder of the light of Christ's Resurrection which we celebrate on that night. The Easter Candle (also known as the paschal candle), is lit from the fire, is blessed and is then carried in to a dark church. Everyone is given small tapers which are lit once the paschal candle has entered the church but the light of the candles is the only light in the church. I pray an opening prayer and then Mark Lyda will sing the Exsultet, a long and beautiful prayer celebrating Jesus' Resurrection from the dead. We then have a long Liturgy of the Word, with up to seven Old Testament readings along with accompanying psalms and prayers, but at least three readings; we have 4 readings and psalms and prayers. Those seven readings relate some of the key moments of how God has moved in human history beginning with the story of creation, and on through Abraham being asked to sacrifice Isaac, through the journey through the Red Sea through to the promise of God pouring out his Spirit on us.

After the Old Testament readings, for the first time in 7 Sundays, we sing the Gloria, usually with greater joy because we haven't sung it since before Ash Wednesday! During that time all the lights in the church are turned on, and the bells are rung, as another sign of the great joy of that night. Then, after a New Testament reading we sing Alleluia for the first time in 7 weeks!

After the gospel, and the homily, we have the third important part of the Easter Vigil, when we renew our baptismal promises and are sprinkled with Holy Water as a reminder of that baptism. But first, as we are blessed to have two adults to be baptized, this is when we celebrate their baptism. There is a prayer of blessing over the water and then Bob and Dakota will be baptized. After that we celebrate their Confirmation and the Confirmation of four other adults being received into the Church, and the Confirmation of two other Catholics who have never been confirmed. The Easter Vigil is always the most joyful night of the year but, when celebrating a baptism or a Confirmation it's even more joyful, especially to see an adult baptized!

Then, after any baptisms or Confirmations have been celebrated, Mass continues as normal including First Holy Communion for those newly baptized and those received into the Church. Having attended dozens of Easter Vigils I can certainly assure you that, if you want to celebrate Jesus' Resurrection, the joy of the Easter Vigil is far greater than Easter Sunday; there's an intangible joy that makes the Easter Vigil so much more of a celebration even than Easter Sunday, and I hope that you will join us this Easter Vigil to see what I mean!






Meet Tobias Lopez




