

Words of Wisdom from our Grand Knight

WILL THE REAL POPE FRANCIS PLEASE STAND UP!

Almost four years ago, I listened to Father Fred's homily regarding the Catholic Church and Social Justice. Having been deluged with news regarding Social Justice for years from every major news network and newspaper, my idea of Social Justice had been formed and reformed numerous times. As with most of you, faith in a concept remains strong until an outside source can convince you to change your mind. And believe me, there is nothing wrong or improper with changing one's mind.

Years before moving to Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, my wife and I were members of Epiphany Cathedral. My personal involvement with Epiphany goes back to when Bishop Nivens and Deacon Fran Cole were still around the Cathedral. At that time, I was the volunteer Boy Scout of America lead for Catholic Scouting in the Venice Diocese. I was involved in this mission for over twelve years until I was transferred to Omaha, NE.

When my bride and I retired and moved back to Sarasota, we renewed our membership at Epiphany. During the following eight years, I listened to many, many homilies about Social Justice. Basically, the words went in one ear and out the other. The words of each homily seemed so political. What Father Fred stirred in my mind during his homily was a simple challenge to my current beliefs of Social Justice. While this homily was one of Father Fred's longer ones, he continued to make points that challenged my traditional thinking. And, he made sense.

The following week, I made an appointment to discuss this topic with Father Fred. As we talked back and forth, I easily realized why I had started to change my mind about Social Justice. The more we discussed this topic, the more he made sense. The Social Justice espoused by the Catholic Church is similar yet very different from the current political pundits. When we were finishing our conversation, he reached over to his desk, and gave me a small paperback book on Social Justice in the Catholic Church. I read the book, and reread it; I changed my mind.

That was almost four years ago. This very process occurred to me again a couple of weeks ago. Pope Francis died on the Monday morning following Easter Sunday. While I was mourning the death of the Pope, like every Catholic would, or should, I was suddenly struck by the thought of that he is gone. While I will freely admit that I was not his biggest fan, rather one of his critics, I started to reflect on his passing, on his leadership, and on his papacy.

There was never any doubt that he was the moral and spiritual leader of the Catholic Church. He had an impact on not only the world's Catholic population, but on many, many peoples of all persuasions. He was the Pope of the people. As I reflected, he always wore a smile. He seemed to always prefer being around youth, than older generations. And what I disliked most, he challenged all of Catholicism to think outside the box.

But after a sleepless night of reflection, I realized that his many challenges created thought. There was a challenge to the status quo and a suggestion to open one's mind to allow some new thoughts to intermingle with older thoughts. Over about six hours, I went from a being a skeptic of his approach to becoming a believer in his simple approach of thinking and evaluating something vastly new and different. I finally fell asleep when I asked myself the question about what has really changed. I realized that not much had changed, but the conversation will surely persist.

That night in thought created a change in me that has opened my mind to how change occurs in the Catholic Church. Jesus initiated this change while he preached on Earth for three short years. Jesus' message was extremely radical during his time as pointed out by the Sanhedrin in the first reading of the Third Sunday of Easter. Pope Francis was no different. But as we see on a daily basis, the Catholic Church is a living Church, slow to change, but changing. As we reflect on what has happened over 2,000 years, I would say that Pope Francis has played his part in continuing to guide the children of God in the most righteous path. When Father Anthony and I were discussing this, he calmly looked up at me and said "He was a Jesuit!"


"Pope Leo XIV, the first American Pope, assumes the Petrine ministry with a strong familiarity with the Knights of Columbus. I was honored to meet with him in 2023, shortly after the beginning of his tenure as Prefect of the Vatican's Dicastery for Bishops, and I know firsthand of his sincere appreciation for the Knights of Columbus and our service to the Church around the world. Our Order began during the pontificate of Pope Leo XIII — and in the years ahead, we will proudly stand with Pope Leo XIV as we seek together to build up the Kingdom of God.

"Since our founding in 1882 by Blessed Michael McGivney, fidelity to the Holy Father has been a defining characteristic of the Knights of Columbus. As it was with his predecessors, the pastoral priorities of Pope Leo XIV will guide and inform everything we do."

Following the First World War, the Knights of Columbus answered the invitation of Pope Benedict XV to open sports fields to serve the youth of Rome. The man said, "There you have the secret to success. When you want to gain success as much as you wanted air when you were under water, you will obtain it. That's the only secret."


The Moral:





Flags Across America

Sarasota National Cemetery needs volunteers to place and retire flags for Memorial Day

Each Memorial Day Weekend, Volunteers Remember our Heroes. This Year More Volunteers are needed at our Sarasota National Cemetery to help place American Flags on Memorial Day Weekend. What happens is simple. It all begins with an American flag, placed at every grave site for Memorial Day.

Flags for Fallen Vets, is an all volunteer non-profit that coordinates the event each year, through the direction of local coordinator and organizer Meshia Richardson Judd. She spends countless hours, fundraising year-round, as well as Looking for volunteers to help.

In the beginning, when the event started, several years ago... there were about 400 volunteers, and approximately 9,200 flags were placed at Sarasota National Cemetery. This year over 25,000 Flags will be placed, with over a thousand volunteers needed to make it all happen.

Nearly 10 interments a day are held at Sarasota National Cemetery, as a Hero's final resting place.

The Flags for Fallen Vets and the Memorial Day Weekend Flag Placement mission, is similar to the annual December, Wreaths Across America Wreath Laying... A person takes their last breath twice, once when they leave this beautiful earth and the second time, when their name is never said aloud. That is why as each Flag is placed at every grave site, the Hero is thanked for their service and their name is said out loud.

Now it's time for the Knights to sign up and help for this year's event on Memorial Day Weekend.

The event is Saturday, May 24th, 2025 at 8:00am at Sarasota National Cemetery. On Saturday, May 31st, 2025 at 8:00am, volunteers are also needed to help retire the flags. Specific instructions, location etc will be provided prior to the events.


