Words of Wisdom from our Grand Knight

OUR GUIDING LIGHT

After watching many of my peers at work die after two or three years of retirement, I came to realize that the only way to not follow in my peers footsteps was to ensure that I was quite busy after retirement. I was so afraid of following in my peer's path, that I overcompensated with ways to keep myself busy. One of the ways that I planned to accomplish this was to learn about the historical significance of a few things in American History. The two things that interested me the most at the time was why the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution were written in the way they were, and what was the underlying reason why the Union won the Civil War when the Confederates won most of the battles.

I was able to answer the question about the Civil War by looking at the history of a few men. I ran across a book written by Martin Dugard about "The Training Ground". This book was about five men who fought in the Mexican War in the late 1840's. It appears that Grant, Lee, Sherman, Jackson and Davis paid attention to what they learned during this war. Simply stated, they were quite attentive to how General Winfield Scott prosecuted the war. In the end, it was four of these five people, as Jackson was mortally wounded at the Battle of the Chancellorsville, who affected the outcome of the American Civil War.

The first item of interest took a bit more research. My original hypothesis was that the first successful colonization of America was from Europeans searching for religious freedom. The Puritans were the first group of religious dissidents who were successful in colonizing. Their first attempt at governance was the Mayflower Compact which was mostly successful. Of the four precepts of the Compact, one stated that "The colonists would live in accordance with the Christian faith". This Compact treated the colonists as a "commune" which later produced unfortunate results which were addressed by their governing body. The failure was when certain colonists felt that they did not have to contribute any work to the group and still receive the benefits of the groups work. I also learned from my investigation that the original Mayflower Compact was the work of its religious leaders, William Bradford and Pilgrim Pastor William Brewster

Throughout the 1600's, Christian leaders had a significant influence on both civil and governmental advances, helping secure both civil and religious liberty. Consider the following:

- 1619 Rev William Wickham served in Virginia's original Assembly.
- 1636 Rev Roger Williams and Rev John Clarke founded the colony of Rhode Island
- 1639 Rev Thomas Hooker and Rev John Davenport founded the colony of Connecticut and helped write its first Constitution
- 1641 The Rev Nathaniel Ward wrote the "Massachusetts Book of Liberties"
- 1681 Quaker minister William Penn founded Pennsylvania and wrote its "Frame of Government"
- 1692 Rev John Wise and Rev Increase Mather helped establish due process in the judicial system.

The three institutions of government in Scripture are family, government and church. When all are working together as designed, the outcome will be Biblical citizenship. And, that is exactly what our Founders were, Biblical citizens. Regardless of what you read about the American fight for freedom, the guiding light of its governance was biblical. According to a University of Houston study of roughly 15,000 writings of the Founding Fathers, the most often quoted sources used by the Founding Fathers were:

 4^{th} – John Locke – 2.9% - author of "Two Treatises of Government (1689) which defined classical republicanism, also known as civic republicanism

 3^{rd} – Blackstone – 7.9% - wrote "Commentaries of the Laws of England" which became the best-known description of the doctrines of the English Common Law


 2^{nd} – Montesquieu – 8.3% - wrote "The Spirit of the Law" (1748) which stated that "government should be set up so that no man need be afraid of another" (proponent of checks and balances)

 1^{st} – The Bible – 34%

It is no wonder why the United States and its Constitution has survived and prospered for over 249 years. While it is not perfect, and never will be, it is the second oldest Constitution in the World. With Divine Providence being the guiding light of our Founding Fathers, how could they possibly fail! While each of our Founding Fathers had a common belief in God, their conversations as transcribed by their Continental Congress secretaries, found endless discussions on the majority of concepts. And, in the final stages, Divine Providence guided mortal men to agree upon the words defining our freedoms.

Lecturer's Minute Pledge of Allegiance

July is the month in which we celebrate our independence from Great Britain. We acknowledge the founding of a nation of former colonies and the change from a struggle for "our rights as Englishmen" to a war for complete independence from the British crown.

Our founding documents not only created a country dedicated to basic freedoms but to establish goals for the nation that we pursue to this day.

When most of us began kindergarten, one of the first things we were taught was the "Pledge of Allegiance". The "Pledge" was recited everyday before class began. Our council meetings begin with the "Pledge" as does the Congress and state legislatures. There is no requirement to do so in law nor is the wording for the "Pledge" found in any of our founding documents.

There was no "Pledge" until 1885 when Union Army Captain George Thatcher Balch determined that some form of oath was desirable. His early version was: "We give our heads and hearts to God and country; one country, one language, one flag!" Note that this wording included a reference to God, something subsequent versions omitted until 1954.

The current "Pledge" carries some controversy regarding it's author. It is thought to have been written by a person named Bellamy, either a 13 year old Kansas boy or an older preacher who submitted it to a magazine for publication. They interestingly had the same last name but were not related.

Several attempts were made to include "under God" in the "Pledge" but failed until June 14, 1954. On that day President Eisenhower officially proclaimed that "under God" be added to the "Pledge". June 14 is now officially "Flag Day" in the U.S. (Note: The Knights of Columbus started using "under God" in 1951).

When reciting the "Pledge", it is proper to face the flag, place your right hand over your heart. Gentlemen should remove their headwear and hold it over their heart. Military personnel and veterans will render a hand salute.

The next time you recite the "Pledge of Allegiance" think of what you are saying and the meaning behind those thirty-one words. You are swearing an oath, promising to give your total support to the ideals as set forth in the documents that form the bases of the United States of America. Truly a worthy undertaking!

As the United States celebrates Independence Day, Pope Leo XIV received Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly and Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori in a private audience at the Vatican. The July 4th audience was the first meeting of the U.S.-born pope with the leader of Knights of Columbus - which was founded in New Haven, Conn., in 1882 — and the leader of the Archdiocese of Baltimore — the first diocese in the U.S., established in 1789.

The Supreme Knight and Supreme Chaplain pledged the Order's loyalty to Pope Leo and promised ongoing prayers and support for his pontificate. They also provided the Holy Father with an overview of the Knights of Columbus, highlighting the Order's charitable activity and men's faith formation initiatives.

The Order's leaders presented special gifts relating to the patriotic occasion of the audience, as well as the Pope's Augustinian background. The first was a framed archival photo of the launching of LST-286, the tank-landing ship on which Louis Prevost — the Pope's father — served during the D-Day landings in Normandy, France. The gift was of special significance, given the Supreme Knight's own service in the Navy and the fact that Archbishop Lori's father — Francis Lori — also served on an LST during World War II.

They also presented two early English editions of works by St. Augustine of Hippo — his famous autobiographical Confessions (printed in 1660, London) and Meditations(printed in 1728, London), consisting of selections from three Augustinian works of piety: De meditatione, Soliloquies and Enchiridion.





Our Lady of Mount Carmel: a personal reflection

Where do the years go? It was 3 years ago this weekend (as I write this on the eve of the feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel) when I celebrated my welcome to the parish! Yes. 3 LONG years have already gone by! You've been stuck with me for 3 long years already! It seems impossible but ...

As always at this time of year I've been reflecting a lot these past few weeks on who Our Lady of Mount Carmel is to me and, basically, she means everything to me. She has guided me every step of the way to where I am now and, I know, she will continue to guide me. For those reasons, I thought that, for this bulletin, I would share with you how important Carmel, and especially Our Lady of Mount Carmel, has been to me.

Although I was a "cradle Catholic" my faith didn't really mean anything to me I was in my mid 20's. God had led me very clearly to buy a house in Hastings, on the Sussex coast, best known for the Batte of Hastings in 1066. The parish I joined there "happened" to have an annual pilgrimage to Aylesford, our most important Carmelite house in the Order, and that was where I met Carmelites for the first time, and was introduced to Carmelite spirituality. That visit also inspired a great Marian devotion within me and several friends noticed that I was different after that first trip to Aylesford; something had changed. As I would later realize it was Mary, Our Lady of Mount Carmel, who had changed me by my visit to Aylesford.

I began to read Therese of Lisieux and Brother Lawrence of the Resurrection and began to be inspired by what I was reading and, after finally giving up the fight with God over considering priesthood and religious life, because of my experiences at Aylesford I thought first, obviously, of the Carmelites and never looked elsewhere. During my novitiate, my first year in the Order and, once I had completed my studies in the UK and had a chance to study Carmelite spirituality in Washington DC, Mary and the Saints of Carmel grew more and more important to me, and have formed me to be the person I am. Every step of my Carmelite life has been taken under Mary's guidance and protection and, literally, every significant step, such as applying for simple vows, solemn vows, diaconate and priesthood, I was applying for those steps praying in front of a statue of Our Lady of Mount Carmel.

In my nearly 20 years of Carmelite life Our Lady of Mount Carmel has been with me, and guided me through this process, and this is why, whilst I do have doubts and fears about new assignments (and I had plenty of those 3 years ago when I first arrived here) I have faith and trust that, just as God and Our Lady of Mount Carmel have guided me before this, so God and Our Lady of Mount Carmel will continue to guide me in the present and in the future in each step of the journey.

When I was ordained as a priest the bishop ordaining me ended his homily by urging me to be a Carmelite who is a priest, not a priest who is a Carmelite, and that is a fundamental difference. My priesthood very much flows from my being a Carmelite. I have been formed as a Carmelite and that is what gives me life and sustains me in my priesthood. That is one of the reasons why you so often see me wearing my habit, precisely because I am a Carmelite first and foremost. It used to be that priestly ordination was the biggest day for a Carmelite and, of course, it still is for our families, but for the younger Carmelites in formation, solemn vows, our lifelong commitment to the Order, is the most important thing.

So, as I end this longer than usual reflection, my prayer for each of you is that, as Mary did at the wedding feast at Cana, she may lead each of us to her Son, and that, by spending timing with Mary and her Son, our minds and hearts will be transformed by the values of the gospel.






The Ladies are out to LUNCH!
