


Luke 2:8-14

GOD GAVE HIS ONLY SON ...

How many of us who went to Catholic Grade School remember the Nuns constantly reminding us that it is better to give than to receive? I never believed them until about 6th Grade when I finally became brainwashed. In the same vane, years later when our Pastor would get up on "Money-talk Sunday" he constantly reminded everyone that God pays back exponentially. "If you increase your weekly contribution by \$1.00, it is likely that you will receive it back many times over!" No one believed him, but who were we to contradict the Pastor of our parish?

I personally think nothing has changed:

On Giving Tuesday, the Tuesday after Thanksgiving, many organizations and companies make a myriad of promises that things will improve if only you contribute \$35.00, or more, today.

When you look at your mail on any day of any week, what percent of your mail is actually someone asking for money?

Remember when all of the news websites on the Internet were free?

Remember when a cup of coffee was \$0.15?

Have you noticed that most "hot" sales are not really a "hot" price, but a large percentage discount? The question becomes a discount from what?

I think the real spirit of giving is really something else. I do remember when the Pastors of most churches changed from family's weekly contribution to the Church to a new strategy called Time, Talent and Treasure. My Dad told me that this was simply getting much more by giving something other than money. I believe that our next door neighbor had a better idea as he thought that any combination of the three was important. If you did not have the Treasure, Time or Talent is also acceptable. I thought that my neighbor had the correct conclusion.

So, let me share a couple of numbers that you may be interested in:

Our parishioners gave over \$100,000 in food and financial contributions to the Guadalupe Missions in Immokalee in 2025.

These same parishioners gave over \$50,000 in Christmas gifts and financial support to the same Guadalupe Missions in Immokalee in the last month.

Knights of Columbus Council 15821 raised and donated over \$42,000 to various charities and institutions in 2024-2025.

Knights of Columbus Council 15821 donated countless hours of labor for Parish and Council events including the Lenten Dinners, maintenance and upkeep of Tillotson Hall, supporting and delivering our parishioner's donations to Guadalupe Missions. If we also include all of the assistance that Knights provide the Parish through the many ministries of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, that number grows significantly.

Knights of Columbus Council 15821 helped raise over \$50,000 in two years to help support the Deacon Tom Grant Scholarship Fund.

Giving is a habit that many Catholics seem to come by intuitively. God the Father gave his only son to mankind to show His love for us. Jesus' ministry over a short three years showed the same love for his fellow man that he gave his human life for the forgiveness of our sins. I think that this is a prime example of leadership in "setting the example" of what should be expected. I would say that many of our fellow Knights fit this description well. Don't you think so too?



Reflection: The Sacred Heart Icon and the Love of God in this Advent Season.

As we approach the final days before Christmas, our hearts naturally turn toward the mystery of God's love revealed in the Incarnation. The birth of Christ is the ultimate sign that God "so loved the world" that He entered into our humanity to redeem us. In this sacred season, it is profoundly fitting that the Sacred Heart Icon is among us, traveling from council to council across the country. This image of Christ's Heart reminds us that His love is not abstract—it is personal, burning with mercy and tenderness for each of us.

The Knights of Columbus Pilgrim Icon Program invites us to encounter this love through prayer, particularly in the Holy Hour structured around the Sacred Heart. The prayer booklet accompanying the icon provides a beautiful rhythm for this time of devotion. It begins with an Introduction, which sets the tone by reminding us that the Sacred Heart is a symbol of Christ's total self-giving. His Heart is pierced and aflame, signifying both His suffering and His passionate love for humanity. This devotion calls us not only to contemplate His love but to respond with our own love and by our repentance and conversion.

The Holy Hour unfolds in several parts: Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, prayers and litanies, Scripture readings, reflections, and time for silent adoration. Each element draws us deeper into communion with Christ. The Litany of the Sacred Heart is particularly powerful, as it names the many ways Christ's Heart is present to us—patient, generous, source of consolation, and fountain of mercy. These invocations remind us that the Heart of Jesus is not distant; it beats for us here and now.

The reflections in the booklet comes from Pope Francis's last encyclical Dilexit Nos ("He Loved Us"), which emphasizes that devotion to the Sacred Heart is rooted in Scripture and Tradition. It is not merely sentimental; it is a profound theological truth. The Heart of Jesus reveals the inner life of God—a love that is faithful, sacrificial, and transformative. As Dilexit Nos explains, this devotion calls us to imitate Christ's love in our own lives, especially through acts of charity and reparation. In a world often marked by indifference and division, the Sacred Heart reminds us that love is stronger than hatred and that mercy triumphs over sin.

As we stand on the threshold of Christmas, these truths take on special meaning. The Child in the manger is the same Lord whose Heart was pierced on Calvary and now reigns in glory. His coming at Bethlehem was an act of love so radical that it changed the course of history. To gaze upon the Sacred Heart Icon in these days before Christmas is to be reminded that the love which began in the stable continues to flow from His Heart today.

May this Holy Hour that we just celebrated yesterday (at the time of writing this) and the presence of the Sacred Heart Icon in these days inspire us to open our hearts more fully to Christ. Let us allow His love to transform us, so that we, as Knights and as Catholic men, may bring that love into our families, parishes, and communities. In doing so, we honor the Heart of Jesus and prepare a fitting dwelling for Him this Christmas.



December Grace and Grief


In his 13 years of priesthood, Father McGivney had many joyful December days, and some sad ones as well.

On the happy side was his priestly ordination, Dec. 22, 1877, in America's first Catholic cathedral, now known as the Basilica of the Assumption in Baltimore. After four years of preparation at the nation's first Catholic seminary, he was ordained by Archbishop James Gibbons, who later became a cardinal and the leading American church figure of his time. After ordination, Father McGivney took a train to his hometown of Waterbury, Connecticut, to offer his first solemn Mass for Christmas, with his widowed mother and some siblings attending. Imagine the joy yet gentle pressure on the new priest as he went through the elaborate rituals of the Christmas Mass before a hometown crowd!

Years later, grief tempered the joy of Christmas preparations when his mother died on Dec. 8, 1888, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. Now a seasoned pastor in Thomaston, Father McGivney traveled back to Waterbury to offer the Requiem Mass – a grateful and dutiful son to his earthly mother, Mary Lynch McGivney, and his spiritual mother, the Church.

As we make our own pilgrimage through this month that culminates in the Christmas Octave, let us ask Blessed Michael McGivney for guidance amid our joys and sorrows and prepare for the true focus of Advent, the Second Coming of Jesus.



The Color Corps of the Knights of Columbus Fourth Degree stood tall and reverent at Epiphany Cathedral during the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. The bilingual Mass celebrated in both Spanish and English, though primarily in Spanish was a beautiful testament to the universality of our faith. Following the liturgy, the faithful processed joyfully to the school courtyard, where a traditional Mexican feast awaited. 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

From Saint Nicholas to Santa Claus: A Catholic Reflection on a Beloved Figure

Every December, homes across America are filled with images of a jolly man in a red suit, bearing gifts and laughter. For many families—Catholic and otherwise—the figure of *Santa Claus* has become inseparable from the celebration of Christmas. Yet behind the cultural icon stands a real saint of the Church: **St. Nicholas of Myra**, a fourth-century bishop whose heroic charity continues to echo through the centuries.


As Catholics, rediscovering the roots of Santa Claus is not merely a historical curiosity, it is a reminder that the heart of our Christmas traditions spring from the witness of a saint who modeled the merciful love of Christ.

The Real Saint Nicholas: Bishop, Confessor, Wonder-Worker

St. Nicholas was born in the late third century in Patara, in what is now Turkey. Orphaned at a young age, he inherited substantial wealth—wealth he saw not as personal possession but as a gift entrusted to him for others. Guided by the Gospel admonition to care for "the least of these," Nicholas became known for his **quiet and generous charity**, given secretly and without fanfare.

One of the most beloved stories tells of Nicholas secretly providing dowries for three impoverished young women, one at a time, saving each of them from a life of destitution. When the father of the young women stayed awake for two days to catch the mysterious benefactor in the act of giving the third dowry, he fell on his knees in gratitude for what Nicholas had been doing. St. Nicholas only asked that the father keep his actions a secret (which he presumably did not do). In this moment we see clearly the saint's spirit: a shepherd after Christ's own heart, who sought to restore dignity and lift burdens in the name of the Lord with true humility.

Nicholas eventually became bishop of Myra, where he continued to be celebrated for his holiness, his defense of the faith (tradition even links him to the Council of Nicaea), and miracles attributed to his intercession. After his death in A.D. 343, devotion to him spread widely across both East and West.





HOW A HOLY BISHOP BECAME "SANTA CLAUS"

The journey from the revered *Saint Nicholas* to the modern American *Santa Claus* was long and layered—a blend of Christian tradition, European folklore, immigration, and the creative imagination of modern culture.

Early Christian Devotion Spreads His Fame

As devotion to St. Nicholas grew, so did customs associated with his feast day, **December 6th**. In many European countries, this became a day of gift-giving, especially for children, honoring the saint known for secret generosity.

Dutch Traditions Reach the New World

By the time Dutch settlers arrived in America in the 17th century, they brought with them their beloved *Sinterklaas*—a distinctly Dutch pronunciation of "Saint Nicholas." In their communities, Sinterklaas still resembled a bishop, complete with miter and staff, visiting children to reward virtue.

American Culture Reimagines the Saint

Over the 18th and 19th centuries, American writers and artists reshaped the image of Sinterklaas into something new. Washington Irving's playful writings, Clement Clarke Moore's famous poem, *A Visit From St. Nicholas* ("Twas the Night Before Christmas"), and later illustrations by Thomas Nast gradually transformed the saintly bishop into a jolly, round, fur-clad figure traveling by sleigh.

Though his outward appearance changed, many traditions—gift-giving, generosity, childlike wonder, and the spirit of joy—echo the virtues of the original saint.

A Catholic Perspective: Rediscovering the Saint Beneath the Suit

While the American Santa Claus is now a cultural figure rather than a directly religious one, Catholics can still embrace his roots with gratitude. Santa Claus is not simply a symbol of seasonal cheer—he is, at his core, a reminder of *a life shaped by the Gospel*.

St. Nicholas points us back to Christ Himself

His generosity reflects the self-giving love of the Incarnation. His desire to protect the vulnerable echoes the Church's call to defend human dignity. His humble anonymity in giving reminds us that authentic charity seeks not recognition but communion with God.

When parents tell their children stories about Santa, they can enrich those moments by connecting them to the saint who walked the earth, loved the poor, and lived the virtues we hope to cultivate in our families.

Bringing St. Nicholas Back Into Christmas

Here are a few Catholic ways to honor both St. Nicholas and the joyful traditions that surround him:

- Celebrate the Feast of St. Nicholas on December 6th, perhaps with shoes left out for small treats or notes highlighting virtues each child has shown.
- Tell the real stories of St. Nicholas, emphasizing his love for Christ and the poor.
- Strongly encourage acts of secret charity, just as the saint did.
- **Use the image of Santa Claus as a bridge**, helping children understand that behind the cultural figure stands a saint who lived the Gospel with heroic generosity.

From Myra to the North Pole—A Journey of Grace

The American Santa Claus, though wrapped in layers of folklore and cultural evolution, still traces his lineage to a Catholic bishop whose life radiated the love of Christ. As we celebrate the joy of Christmas, we have a unique opportunity to reclaim that spiritual heritage, teaching our children—and reminding our own hearts—that the true meaning of the season is the gift of God Himself.

May St. Nicholas, the Wonder-Worker of Myra, pray for us, that we may become generous witnesses of Christ's love in our own time.

Santa Claus Visits the Vatican.

Each year on the feast of St. Nicholas, the Swiss Guards keep a long-standing tradition. One of the guards dresses as St. Nicholas and walks through the Vatican giving out small gifts.

This year, "St. Nicholas" also visited Pope Leo XIV and offered him a gift.

St. Nicholas was a bishop known for giving help and gifts in secret, especially to the poor.

His life inspired what we now call "Father Christmas" or "Santa Claus."

The name "Santa Claus" comes from the Latin and old forms of the name Nicholas.

The feast of St. Nicholas on December 6, celebrated close to Christmas, later helped shape the custom of including "Santa Claus" in Christmas celebrations. See less



Saint Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin Optional Memorial

St. Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin (1474–1548) was an Indigenous Mexican convert and visionary associated with the apparitions of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Born in Cuautlitlán (now part of Mexico City) with the name Cuauhtlatoatzin ("the talking eagle"), he belonged to the Chichimeca people. At about fifty, he was baptized by the Franciscan missionary Fr. Peter da Gand.


On December 9, 1531, while on his way to Mass, the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to him on Tepeyac Hill, asking that a shrine be built in her honor. When the local bishop asked for proof, the Virgin directed Juan Diego to gather roses blooming miraculously in winter. He carried them in his cloak (tilma), and when he opened it before the bishop on December 12, the flowers fell, revealing the miraculous image of Our Lady of Guadalupe imprinted on the fabric.

Juan Diego spent the remainder of his life as a hermit near the chapel that housed the image, devoting himself to prayer, service, and caring for pilgrims. He died in 1548 and was buried in the first chapel of the Virgin.

The miraculous image, which is preserved in the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe, shows a woman with native features and dress. She is supported by an angel whose wings are reminiscent of one of the major gods of the traditional religion of that area. The moon is beneath her feet and her blue mantle is covered with gold stars. The black girdle about her waist signifies that she is pregnant. Thus, the image graphically depicts the fact that Christ is to be "born" again among the peoples of the New World, and is a message as relevant to the "New World" today as it was during the lifetime of Juan Diego.

Juan Diego was canonized on July 31, 2002 by Pope John Paul II in the Basilica of Santa Maria di Guadalupe, Mexico City and is remembered as a humble messenger whose faith and vision continue to inspire devotion throughout the world.





The Marine Protected by St. Michael the Archangel A Story of Heavenly Intervention During the Korean War

In the winter of 1950, amid the brutal cold and chaos of the Korean War, a young Marine named Michael lay recovering in a military hospital. From his bed, he penned a letter to his mother—a letter that would soon become one of the most extraordinary accounts of angelic protection in modern history.

Michael began by reminding his mother of the devotion she had instilled in him since childhood. Every night before bed, she had taught him to call upon St. Michael the Archangel, Heaven's mighty defender, with the simple but powerful prayer: "St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle..." Even after he became a Marine, facing the harsh realities of war, he never abandoned that devotion. In foxholes, on patrols, and beside dying comrades, he whispered the familiar prayer, trusting that the Prince of the Heavenly Host watched over him.

One day, as his unit marched through freezing, enemy-ridden terrain, something remarkable occurred. A towering Marine—broad-shouldered, calm, and radiating a quiet strength—suddenly appeared at his side. Michael had never seen him before. The stranger introduced himself with a simple, almost knowing smile: "Name's Michael."

The two walked side by side. The newcomer encouraged him, spoke to him with a brotherly confidence, and then said with sudden firmness, "Stay alert. Trouble ahead." Before Michael could ask more, the world erupted in gunfire.

An enemy ambush exploded around them.

Michael dove for the ground instinctively—but the Marine beside him remained standing tall and unshaken, bullets tearing through the air yet leaving him untouched. Confused and terrified, Michael tried to move, but a sudden shot struck him, and he collapsed in the snow. As his vision blurred, he felt two powerful arms catch him—arms that held him with both strength and gentleness.

When he looked up, what he saw defied earthly explanation.

The Marine called Michael now shone with an unearthly radiance. A brilliant light surrounded him, and in his hand he held a sword—not of steel, but of pure fire and glory. With sweeping, majestic strokes, he moved toward the enemy soldiers. Michael could hear their screams—and then silence.

Hours later, when the patrol found him, Michael tried to explain what had happened. His sergeant, shaken and confused, insisted that the young Marine had been entirely alone. No other Marine had been seen with him that day. And when they inspected the bodies of the enemy soldiers nearby, they discovered something impossible: not a single bullet wound among them—only deep, clean slashes, as though struck by a mighty blade.

The story traveled quickly throughout the Marine Corps, and soon reached the ears of military chaplain Fr. Walter Muldy. After meeting with the young Marine and examining the testimony, Fr. Muldy affirmed publicly that the account was true. It was, he believed, a profound and unmistakable act of divine intervention.

To this day, the story of the Marine protected by St. Michael the Archangel continues to strengthen the faith of soldiers, families, and believers around the world. 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Merry Christmas one and All!

This time of year is bust for everyone celebrating and waiting for Christmas.

Savor the anticipation of the arrival of Christ. Check out Waiting Well from Fr. Mike

Schmidt. A month of short Advent prayers and reflections that are not usual but beautiful. :

12/17 Genesis 49:8

Today, offer someone praise or encouragement where it is due, particularly if it is someone about whom we struggle to think well. Offer God a prayer of thanksgiving for the gift of that person in your life.

12/18 Matthew 1:24

What task have you been putting off for fear that you won't do it well? Ask the Holy Spirit to banish that fear, and then resolve today to make at least a little bit of progress on that task.

12/19 Luke 1:25

In which areas do we need to be kinder to ourselves (being patient with our spiritual progress, forgiving ourselves for things we have already confessed, or accepting a particular wound or weakness and olering it to the Lord to be healed)?

12/20 Luke 1:30

There are three kinds of fear: natural (fight or flight, life preserving fear), sinful (excessive and immoderate fear), and religious (fear of the Lord's power). Do you have any fears that you're giving power to that should belong to God? Identify this fear so that you can work on returning this power to God.

12/21 Fourth Week of Advent 1 Chronicles 4:10

asking God to extend your boundaries. Ask God to help you see as he sees and to expand your desires to encompass what he wants for you.

12/22 1 Samuel 2:6-7

How can you stretch yourself to give a little bit more than usual during this season of Advent (for example, tithing, donating time or labor, or giving away items to those who need them more than you)?

12/23 Malachi 3:1-2

Reflect on ways you are anticipating God's move or putting limits on his power. Ask him to help you reject the lie that he will not do anything new in your life or that you are

"stuck in a loop." Ask him instead to alirm in your heart the truth that he makes all things new.

12/24 Luke 1:68

Write down some of the greatest blessings you received this Advent. Thank God for these and for the gift of your faith. Reflect on his gifts to you this season to deepen your trust in his continued providence.

Meditate upon the scene of the Nativity, putting yourself in the place of some of the participants. In what ways do you feel like the shepherds, coming to Christ with little to oler? In what ways are you as the innkeeper, shutting Christ out of your heart and not wanting him to dramatically change aspects of your life? Conclude your prayer by thanking Jesus for the gift of his birth and spending a few moments in silent adoration, gazing upon him lovingly like Mary and Joseph did






