Words of Wisdom

HOLY WEEK

Shortly, we will begin the holiest week of the year. In a few days, we go from Christ's life, to His death, and then to His resurrection; which is our salvation.

Holy Week starts on Palm Sunday. This is the only Mass where there are two Gospel readings. The first Gospel reading is the dramatic occasion where Christ enters Jerusalem. He came humbly and he was acclaimed to be the son of David, and therefore, heir to his Kingdom. We take up our palms and sing a resounding hymn to honor Christ our King.

The second Gospel portrays the story of the passion of Jesus. The people who welcomed Him one week earlier as he entered Jerusalem, now condemned Him. What does this have to say about our own weakness, that vacillation of human nature?

Historically, at the time of Christ, the palm tree was a sign of victory and royalty. It was considered a "Kingly" tree. Palm branches were carried by the Jewish people in their processions during festive holy days. Roman soldiers carried palm branches on their victory parades. In our case, the palm branches do signify a most joyful victory, but not one of either worldly or military sense. The ultimate victory of Jesus was his Easter triumph over death and sin.

On this day, we begin to recall that Jesus' victory was through suffering and death. We, too, have to endure the many sufferings that are part of our lives. But our suffering and death are not without meaning or purpose. Jesus has taught us that this is the way to a victorious resurrection and everlasting life. The palm branches also become a symbol and reminder of the victory that awaits each of us as followers of Jesus.

When I was growing up, the gospel read on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Passion Week were the long versions of the other three Evangelist's story of the Passion and Death of Jesus. Now, Holy Monday is when we witness Jesus entering the Temple and becoming very angry at what he found there. People were buying and selling things; the Temple looked like a market instead of a holy place of worship.

Holy Tuesday, the second day after Palm Sunday, is known as "Fig Tuesday". This commemorates Jesus' return to Jerusalem as an example of Israel's spiritual barrenness and their failure to bear spiritual fruit. On Holy Wednesday, or "Spy Wednesday", we remember Judas's betrayal of Jesus, as he secretly plotted with the Jewish chief priests to have Jesus arrested. "What will you give me if I betray Him to you?"

After the first three days of Holy Week, we enter what is referred to as the Easter Triduum. Triduum simply means "a three day festival". It is a time set aside for prayer and worship. The Easter Triduum is three days beginning with Holy Thursday evening and ending with evening prayers on Easter Sunday.

Holy Thursday is the feast day of the Eucharist and the Priesthood. In the morning, at Cathedrals around the world, priests and people gather with their Bishops for the great Mass of the Chrism. The priests renew their commitment to service and the people are asked to pray for them. All three oils used in the Church are blessed by the Bishops on Holy Thursday. The Oil of Chrism is used in Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Orders. The Oil of the Catechumens is used to anoint adults preparing for baptism to encourage and strengthen them. The oil of the sick is used in the Sacrament of Anointing the Sick.

Later on Holy Thursday, also known as “Maundy Thursday”, the Triduum begins with the evening Mass, or the Mass of the Last Supper, which celebrates the institution of the Holy Eucharist. The word “Maundy” is Latin from “mandatum” which means “command” or “order”, referring to Jesus’ command to love one another as he has loved them.

After the reading of Jesus’ command, the celebrant washes the feet of twelve people, representing the twelve apostles whose feet Jesus washed at the Last Supper. At the end of Mass, the altar is stripped bare of its decorations, candles and clothes. This symbolizes the removal of Christ’s presence as he enters His passion. A procession takes the Blessed Sacrament from the main tabernacle to an Altar of Repose, or Holy Sepulcher, where it remains until the Good Friday liturgy.

The word “good” originated from the traditional “goode” meaning holy. Today, on Good Friday, we hear the liturgy of Jesus’ passion from John’s Gospel. We pray for the needs of the Church, the world, and the Cross is venerated. There is NO Mass but the Eucharist is distributed. The service ends in silence.

During the Good Friday liturgy, we kiss or touch a cross as a sign of reverence for this symbol of our salvation. The celebrant reminds the people three times “This is the wood of the Cross, on which hung the Savior of the World.” May our simple gesture of kissing the cross be more than just a formality. Let it express our sincere gratitude for God’s eternal love for us. For many, Good Friday can become quite uncomfortable. It cannot be skipped over on the way to Easter as we commemorate the crucifixion of Jesus, which is a sacrificial death that paved the way for salvation and resurrection, ultimately leading to a restored relationship between God and humanity.


On Holy Saturday, the Church is silent. The altar is bare. The tabernacle is empty. We wait at the Lord’s tomb for His resurrection. After sunset, the Church explodes in joy and celebration of Jesus’ resurrection. This is the night Jesus rose from the dead! This is a night for the whole parish to come together for the Easter Vigil so that we may experience the complete message of our faith, the assurance that death and sin have been conquered.

The vigil begins at the door of the Church where new fire is kindled. The paschal candle is lit, blessed, and held high as it is carried into the Church. The voice of all the ages of Christian history is heard proclaiming the “Light of Christ”. We respond, “Thanks be to God”. Gradually, the light dispels the darkness. From the paschal candle, countless other candles, including those held by parishioners, are lit until the light fills the whole Church. The joy of the Christian faith is in the air and the first “Alleluia” is sung.

Easter Sunday morning follows. New life and fresh hope have come in the risen Christ. We celebrate with a renewal of our Baptismal vows to reject sin and evil, to love God, and follow Jesus. But the celebration is not over. For fifty days we celebrate the risen Christ until he ascends into the heavens and the Holy Spirit arrives on Pentecost. It has just begun ... again.

Vivat Jesus!

Chaplain's Minute

Easter is the heart of our faith and the sure foundation on which Christian life stands. It proclaims that love is stronger than sin, that mercy is greater than failure, and that life has the final word over death. When the stone is rolled away, it is not only the tomb that is opened; the future of humanity is opened as well. Christ's Resurrection is not simply an event of the past we commemorate once a year. It is a living reality that continues to shape how we believe, how we serve, and how we live as Catholic men today.

For the Knights of Columbus, Easter speaks directly to who we are and what we are called to be. We are men who believe that faith is meant to be lived publicly and courageously. The Risen Lord does not remain hidden in the garden; He goes forth to meet the apostles, sending them out to proclaim the Gospel to the world. In the same way, Easter challenges Knights to move beyond comfort and convenience, bringing hope where it may be lacking and light where darkness still lingers.

Easter also reveals the depth of God's charity. The Resurrection flows directly from the self-gift of Christ on the Cross, where He poured out His life for the salvation of all. Charity is not an abstract idea; it is love that takes flesh in action. When Knights serve the poor, assist those with disabilities, support pregnancy resource centers, or stand beside families in crisis, they continue the work of Easter. Every act of charity becomes a quiet proclamation: Christ is risen, and His mercy is still at work among us.

Unity and fraternity find their deepest meaning in the Resurrection as well. On Easter night, the scattered disciples are gathered again, not by fear, but by joy. Christ's victory over death rebuilds what sin and weakness had fractured. As Knights, we are called to be men who foster unity in our parishes, councils, families, and communities. In a world often divided by ideology and mistrust, our fraternity becomes a sign that new life is possible when Christ stands at the center.


Easter also strengthens our commitment to faithful citizenship and patriotism. Because Christ is risen, we believe that no society is beyond redemption and no culture beyond renewal. Knights have long understood that love of country is best expressed through service, integrity, and a commitment to justice and peace. The hope of Easter empowers us to work for a society that reflects the dignity of every human person, from conception to natural death.

The Resurrection, however, is never meant to remain theoretical. Easter always invites a response. As we celebrate this season, each Knight might ask: Where is Christ calling me to roll away a stone? Perhaps it is through volunteering an extra hour at a charitable program, reaching out to a brother Knight who has grown distant, mentoring a young man, or recommitting to daily prayer with one's family. Even small acts, offered with love, participate in the power of Easter and allow the Risen Lord to touch lives through us.

May this Easter renew our identity as Knights of Columbus—men of faith, men of action, and men of hope. United by the Resurrection, may we walk courageously into the world, confident that Christ goes before us and that His victory is already at work through our hands and hearts.

Let us pray. :

Risen Lord Jesus, You have conquered sin and death and opened the way to new life. Renew our faith, strengthen our charity, and deepen our fraternity. Make us instruments of Your peace and witnesses to Your Resurrection in all that we do. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.



Through your powerful intercession, may we receive the grace we seek, according to God's holy will.



After eating, the mouse remembered that he had to escape. But he could not. So, he thought, "Aha! I will just wait and get out tomorrow."


The cat was the next passerby. He smelled the mouse in the basket, lifted the lid, and ate the mouse.


