ACS LENTEN CHALLENGE
 The students of Ascension School helped to support our parish's food pantry and social concerns this Lent. For four weeks, our students accepted a challenge to bring in items for the pantry. Chaplain's Message From Deacon Tom Stauffacher

Something Deacon Tom's stresses to his students is ethics. And as Knights we must all adhere to a standard of Christian morals and ethics. As Knights we have been very successful at doing what is right and just. When asked to do something and we can do it — we say yes — if we can't — we say no. There are many factors that influence our decision — why we go out of our way to be merciful? Do we do these things based on personal consequences? Out of fear? Or because we want to live up to the expectations of others? To live up to expectations of a Christian? Or define our moral values apart from what society expects us to do?

For example — On the morning of March 9, 1965, a day that would become known as "Turnaround Tuesday", Dr Martin Luther King led about 2,500 marchers out on the Edmund Pettus Bridge and held a short prayer session before turning them around, thereby obeying the court order preventing them from making the full march. All they wanted to do was have the right to vote. So Dr King's moral decision making was a lot higher than others in society at the time.

This is often a situational thing based on our convictions on what is right and what is wrong. It is that simple. We learn growing up that by doing that extra thing — that Christian conduct that we are asked to have as a Baptized Christian — we learn to be merciful and to have pity on those in need and we do what we can to help those in need by using our time and talents.

We have a situation right here in our Parish where the Thrift Shop is not able to be open on Saturday due to a lack of volunteers. If asked to work one Saturday a month would you say yes? What is that cost to you in time and talent?

Deacon Tom then recalled a story of how he managed his time and talent a few years back working in the Thrift Shop — by bringing his own volunteers to help man the store.

And that is the kind of thing that we as Knights do — our Christian ethic. It is a positive thing that we do to help those around us who need our help. God blesses each and every one of us for what we do for his Church as we use our time and talent to do that.



Assembly Faithful Friar's Message from SK Deacon Chris Meehan

Words of wisdom from the recent Parish Mission presented by Father Emmerich Vogt — Father Vogt spoke of many spiritual subjects but one of the most interesting and relevant things he spoke about was addiction. Specifically, addiction as a source of evil. He made it very apparent to those attending that no matter what type of addiction we are exposed to — be it television, drugs, internet, alcohol, pornography or whatever, the addiction is driven by evil trying to take control of us. Our goal should always be to stay in charge. We've talked about spiritual warfare and we hear about that a lot. We can never forget that we are at war for our souls. The moment a child is conceived, the soul of that child is at risk because the devil wants to disrupt all of God's work. So our job as Knights, especially as Fourth Degree Sir Knights, is to help make sure our Country gets on track and stays on track. So we need to find as many ways as we can to live out our life exemplifying freedom from addiction. So if you know a brother who struggles with some sort of addiction be it drugs, alcohol, pornography or something else, it is your obligation — your duty — as a Knight to find a way to help them. Encourage them to seek help or to lead them towards your life example and being there for them to offer support and encouragement. In that way we can hopefully cause them to reform and give up their addiction.





A History Lesson for Women's History Month

Women in History — as we recognize February as Women's History month. Deacon Chris talked about several history making women who exemplify the meaning of women in history.

Cole Brauer — the first American women to race solo around the world. She began her journey through the world's most treacherous waters some four months ago. The 29-year-old, 5-foot-2 powerhouse sailed 30,000 miles over 130 days. Cole joyfully waved flares as she sailed full speed into port. Cole is already planning another round-the-world-race, this time as part of a team. She says she hopes her solo journey will inspire other women to aim for historic firsts.



Mother Teresa — an amazing Albanian-Indian Catholic nun and the founder of the Missionaries of Charity. A simple woman with no world credentials yet people around the world would fight to get close to her — and why? Because they see in her God's presence. Our soul looks for that in people even if we don't realize it. And that's why we gravitate towards people like Mother Teresa.

Katherine Johnson — An amazing woman. And someone Deacon Chris talked about during our meeting last month for Black History Month. She was a genius mathematician who came up with the orbital calculations for John Glenn's orbital mission.

Rosa Parks — changed the whole course of what is considered fair and just treatment of people of color. What gumption for her to speak up for her rights and basically change the course of history when it comes to rights for African American men and women — and really beyond that to all men and women who come to this country who are not of European white Anglo-Saxon origins. A wonderful woman with great strength of will and character.

Rosalind Franklin — First lady of DNA. Ever hear of James Watson and Francis Crick? They were two scientists who received the Nobel Prize in 1962 for the discovery of the DNA molecule, But what you don't hear about is Rosalind Franklin — Why? Because she died before the Nobel Prize committee received the nomination. In 1954 Watson and Crick clearly stated in a paper that without data obtained at Kings College by Rosalind Franklin and her PHD student, the formulation of the DNA molecule would have been most likely impossible. So this submission to the Noble Prize committee may not have been possible without the contributions of Rosalind Franklin even though her name was never mentioned in the submission.

Hedy Lamar — considered the most beautiful Hollywood actress at the time. An interesting woman with no formal training in math or science but she had a tremendous curiosity. In her movies, she often didn't have many speaking parts — they were more interested in showcasing her beauty. So she would be in her trailer working on inventions. She loved to invent. She was married to an arms dealer. She usually came along with him to arms deals — he of course hoped her beauty would help in the sale. So at one such meeting, the customer wanted a torpedo that could be guided. They discussed radio control but decided that would be too easy to hijack. But Hedy understood what they were talking about. And Hedy had a music composer friend who wanted to synchronize two player pianos so that multiple player pianos could play the same tune. Hedy realized that if she could synchronize the signal at both ends of the torpedo then it would not be susceptible to jamming. So she actually invented this concept and received the patent in 1942 along with her composer friend. A concept that is still used today.

Renew the House of the Lord Richard Becker — Capital Campaign Chairperson

A quick overview of things to come with the renovation of the interior of our church. The plan will be briefed to the Parish at all Masses the weekend of April 6 and 7. The committee has been working since August to put together this campaign. The committee consists of:

- Richard Becker

The goal of the campaign is to raise \$2.5 Million. The primary purpose is two-fold.

- Install a fire suppression system in the church
- Renovate the interior of the church

These are the primary projects we will fund first with money raised. We do have several other projects across the parish campus but they can only be funded after we fund the primary project. These other projects would include:

- Renovation of the Parish Hall including the kitchen
- Renovation of the Ministry Building
- Replace tiles at the entrance to the church
- Expand the Adoration Chapel
- These are only ideas at present — no plans have been drawn for these additional projects. Plans will only move forward if we secure funding above and beyond funding for the primary projects.

A brief history. The church was founded in 1959. In 1961 the first church was built — this was what is the current Parish Hall. In 1961 the first school was built which is now the Ministry Building. In 1987 — 36 years ago — the current church was built. In those 36 years there have been a few minor renovations but no major renovation to the interior of the church since it was built.

Richard then provided an architectural rendering of what the interior of the church would look like after renovations have been made.

- First — there will be no change to the statue of Christ ascending into Heaven — this is after all Ascension Parish.



- The Crucifix that is on the South wall will be moved to the left of the altar behind the Ambo.
- The Tabernacle will be moved from the right side of the church to behind the altar.
- The pews in the church will be replaced by all wood pews that have a curve to them so the view of the altar will not be obscured regardless of where the parishioner sits. There will be no upholstery on the pews — only wood. This will make the new pews more hygienic and make it easier to keep them in prime shape for many years. The kneelers will be padded.
- Floor tiles will be completely replaced.
- The altar will be handicapped accessible — a ramp will be built to the left of the altar to allow those who have difficulty with steps easier access to the altar.
- The wall will be removed by the choir.
- There will be statues of both Mary and Joseph at the back of the church — to the right and left of the altar where the Tabernacle was and where the Baptismal Font was located.
- The Baptismal Font will be moved to the front of the church. This is more traditionally correct as you need to be baptized in order to enter the church.
- A fire sprinkler system will be installed in the church. The piping for the sprinklers will be hidden behind panels. Only the sprinkler heads will be visible. This is similar to the system at St Johns in Viera.
- Glass will be installed in the doors of the two confessional rooms to allow parishioners to know if someone is in the room —and to offer more security for the priests.
- The floor plan of the church will not change except for the area near the gift shop. Here there will be a new rest room — both men, women and a family bathroom. Bathrooms will be handicapped accessible.

The formal announcement will be at Masses on April 6 & 7 and on April 8 a packet will be mailed to all parishioners which will include most of what you have seen here as well as a brochure outlining all of these renovation plans. Parishioners will be asked to look over the packet and when they return to Mass on the following weekend they will be asked to make a commitment to the church.

Unlike the Bishop's Appeal, this campaign will allow you to spread pledges over 3 years. In the packet will be a suggested pledge for each family. This of course is not a commitment, but only a suggestion. The committee is asking everyone to do their part — be it more — or less — than the suggested pledge.

Three things you can do now:

- Pray for the success of the campaign.
- Proclaim — we as Knights do have a strong voice in the Parish and parishioners will listen to us. So spread the word that this is an important campaign and something our Parish needs and something everyone needs to support.
- Participate by pledging what you can afford.

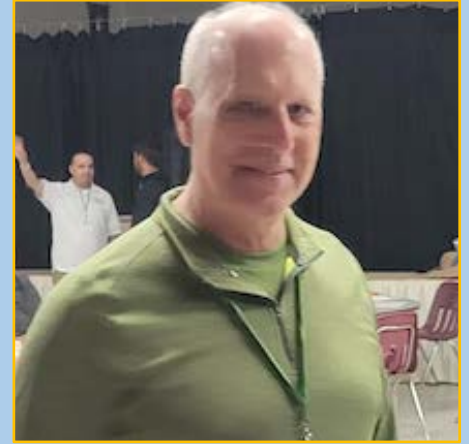

The game begins with a coin toss to determine which team starts the game and the color ball they want to use. The starting team has three tries to roll the small white ball called the "beyond the halfway point of the court. Each team tries to bowl their four bocce pallino" balls closest to the pallino. Scoring is based on the number of a team's balls nearest to the pallino until the other team's ball cancels the remaining balls. When a bocce ball hits or touches the pallino, everyone has to yell "bocce" that is loosely based on the Italian word for kiss. It was a pleasure working with the athletes. Some who caught a bus before 6:00am to compete. Each were cheerful and supportive of one another. All trying their best to gain a spot in the State Summer Games later this year.

Types of Prayer

There are numerous types of prayers that enrich the Catholic spiritual tradition. The [Catechism](#) describes different types of prayers:

- Prayers of Adoration/Blessing (praising God simply for being God)
- Prayers of Intercession (asking for God to help someone else)
- Prayers of Petition (e.g., [Prayers for Strength](#), [Prayers for Healing](#), etc.)
- Prayers of Thanksgiving (giving thanks to God)

We, of course, have the [Lord's Prayer](#), given to us by Jesus in the Bible. It's one of the first prayers that Catholics learn and a prayer known universally by all Christians.

[Sacred music](#), like [Gregorian chants](#), can also be a form of prayer. Christian prayer can draw upon specific texts and prayers that vary by season, as in the [Liturgy of the Hours](#), or can be the recitation of or meditation on particular prayers, as with the [Rosary](#).

Prayer can be structured, like reflecting on daily Gospel readings with [Lectio Divina](#), or be more open-ended, like sitting in silence with God through [Christian meditation](#).

You might also consider praying with the [Examen](#) if you're struggling with getting started in prayer. Your guide will lead you to reflect about your day, and you can talk with God about the good and the not-so-good moments, just as you would with a friend.

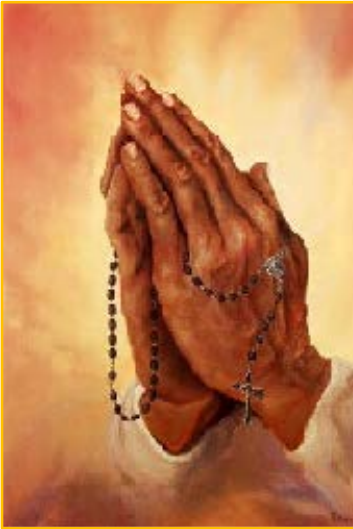

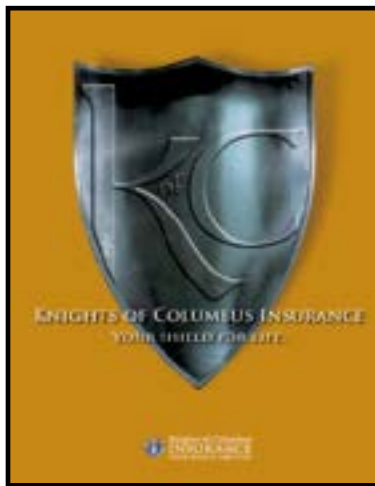
