Wonderful Wednesdays — Need Volunteers!

- Our next big Wonderful Wednesday challenge will be to fill the very large shoes of SK Frank
 Conley as he moves out of the limelight of Wonderful Wednesday. We will need to make a
 decision soon on the Summer BBQ dinner that would start in July. We are in the process of
 discussing options to continue these programs.
- We have discussed continuing the weekly meals via committee by divvying up Frank's tasks to several volunteers. The attached document lists the many tasks Frank performed organized into three committee roles - Administrator, Inventory Manager and Meal Coordinator.
- We are looking to establish a committee to continue Wonderful Wednesday and Lenten Fish Dinners for the parish. A committee approach distributes responsibilities to several volunteers which reduces time commitments for each. Accordingly, three committee roles have been defined: Administrator, Inventory Manager and Meal Coordinator. The concept is to have two Administrators (co-leaders), two Inventory Managers (co-leaders) and several (5 or 6) Meal Coordinators. Each Meal Coordinator will be responsible for one or two meals during each "dinner season". Dinner seasons are Fall, Winter, Lenten, Spring and Summer.
- We are requesting volunteers to serve in each of these roles. Ideally we would have two Administrators, two Inventory Managers and six Meal Coordinators. With this team, no one person has to make a commitment for weekly participation.

Flag Retirement Ceremony with Ascension Catholic School — May 9

On May 9th the Assembly held a Flag Retirement ceremony with Ascension CatholicSchool 7th and 8th grade students following the 8:30 morning mass. Over 70 students with Principal Claudia Stokes, Assistant Principals Donna Violi and Donna Potomski and teachers from both grades along with Pastor Fr. John Bosco and and Fr. Zachary Parker attended this first ever ceremony with Ascension School. The ceremony went very well with students reciting parts from the ceremony script. An idling freight train stopped next to the ceremony area resulting in everyone's inability to hear most of the readings by the students. As a result of this distraction, it was decided in the future to hold the reading parts of the ceremony at the school or Parish Hall. Then everyone would move to the Flag Retirement Ceremonial area at the Knight's house for the conclusion of the ceremony. After the readings, two of our Boy Scuts placed the designated worn flag into the fire pit. This was accompanied with the playing of taps followed by everyone singing God Bless America. These students and future leaders of this country demonstrated their Patriotism by showing reverence to our nation's flag.





























Memorial Day Flag Ceremony at J.N Tucker/Shady Oaks Memorial Cemetery

On May 31st, Memorial Day, a ceremony for the African American Veterans buried at J.N.Tucker/ Shady oaks Memorial Cemetery was held. SK Bobby Sullivan opened the ceremony with a prayer for all the deceased veterans and a brief history of the cemetery. SK John Autio spoke about the creation of Decoration Day, first established following the end of the Civil War and created by General John J. Logan as a National Day of Remembrance and observed on May 30th. In 1968 Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act making the last Monday in May the official Memorial Day holiday. SK Deacon Chris Meehan then led attendees in a prayer for those who gave their lives in battle.

Flags were then placed at each of the grave sites with Deacon Chris anointing each grave with prayers and holy water. Over 20 members of the Assembly, Council, Ladies Auxiliary and relatives of the deceased attended the ceremony and participated in the placing of the flags.













Flags for Heroes



On April 16 as part of our Round Table meeting with Pastor Rev John Bosco Maison the fundraiser "Flags for Heroes" was presented and received his approval to use the church facilities to hold the events .The first Patriotic Fundraising event will be on July 4th. Flags for Heroes is about anyone who is or was a hero in someone's life. One example could be a healthcare worker during COVID who responded to the need. During the early stages of working with this unknown fatal virus these heroes sometimes made the ultimate sacrifice with their lives providing care for their patients. Healthcare providers frequently connected with the families of the patients succumbing to the virus whose loved ones could only say goodbye remotely. Heroes can be Military, Fire Fighters, Police Officers, EMS, Doctors, Teachers, Coaches, Clergy, anyone who is a hero in your life.

There is minimal upfront cost to the Assembly. Flags are only purchased if sponsored — price to sponsor is \$50. The person sponsoring the flag receives a medallion with the name of the honoree — this is then given to the sponsor after the flags are taken down. The plan is to plant the flags in the open area near the Knights house. They would remain there for a week before they are taken down and held for the next celebration.



The first celebration would not be a big money maker as much of the donation would be used to cover the cost of the flags. But future celebrations would not require the purchase of new flags so the entire \$50 — expect for the minimal cost of the medallion — would be profit for the Assembly.

SK Deacon Chris Meehan on Pentecost

I was recently reading the teachings of St Cyril of Alexandria — one of the early fathers of the church born in the fourth century. Saint Cyril spoke at length about the coming of the Holy Spirit. So that got me thinking about what many have pondered — why does the Holy Spirit need to come? Wouldn't it have been enough that Jesus came to us in this world, died for our sins and established the church before he returned to heaven.? So why did he need to give us the Holy Spirit? Maybe it is not so obvious that it was not enough for Jesus to establish the church and not leave something after his departure. I want to share a reflection from St Cyril on the Holy Spirit.

After Christ had completed his mission on earth it remained necessary for us to become sharers in the divine nature of the word.

So let's think about that — if Jesus had not sent us the Holy Spirit, we would have been educated but not incorporated. We would have been informed by the divine life of Christ and we would have the Eucharist but we would not be brought into the life of the church so that it would be with the Holy Spirt as part



of us. So it was most fitting that the Holy Spirit should descend upon us after the departure of Christ. Because as long as Christ was among the Apostles and early believers in the flesh, it must have seen to those believers that they would receive every blessing bestowed upon Him. Everything was covered — why did they need anything else? But it is only by having the Holy Spirit within us that we are able to be drawn in to the life of God. Father Zach used this reference in his homily of the coming of the Spirit. If you think of the classic model of the triangle — the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Then by sending the Holy Spirit — by fusing us with the Holy Spirit — that triangle is opened up to absorb us. So now we are not simply informed but are actually drawn up into the very light of the Holy Trinity. We are now part of God's inner light. A most remarkable thing to think about. Imagine that we are not just believers but we are actually part of the very God that we worship. So let's look at the Holy Spirit in our lives and take to heart the words of St Cyril —

Does this not show that the Spirit changes those in whom he comes to dwell and alters the whole pattern of their lives? With the Spirit within them it is quite natural for people who had been absorbed by the things of this world to become entirely other-worldly in outlook, and for cowards to become men of great courage.

There can be no doubt that this is what happened to the disciples. The strength they received from the Spirit enabled them to hold firmly to the love of Christ, facing the violence of their persecutors unafraid. Very true, then, was our Savior's saying that it was to their advantage for him to return to heaven: his return was the time appointed for the descent of the Holy Spirit.

Brothers, as Knights, isn't that what we are all about. To face the violence that the world brings against the church. Those of you that follow the various speeches given at communicant ceremonies around the county have probably listened to the speech given by Chiefs kicker Harrison Butker at Benedictine College. The press has viciously attacked him for his comments for speaking out as a Catholic gentleman about his faith. And that's what we face Brothers and we can't do it without the Holy Spirit. So I would encourage you all to pray for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon you.

Seminarian Michael Anctil

This is another wonderful update submitted by Lady Susan Blair from her nephew Michael Anctil — one of the seminarians that we support.

Happy Easter!

At one point as a friend or family member, you indicated you might like to receive periodic updates from me as I continue to be formed in seminary to be a priest of Jesus Christ for his Church. This is the second of those updates, my first one being in the Fall as I was a few months into my time of formation in Rome. Do not feel obliged to respond unless you would like to. As was the case last time, if you have any prayer intentions, I'd be glad to receive those from you. If you'd prefer not to receive the update anymore, just send me a quick note. I anticipate continuing to send an update twice a year.

Station Churches

During the Lenten season, the seminary community continues the ancient practice of visiting the relics of martyrs to pray. After the legalization of Christianity in the empire, this became a practice of visiting particular churches built over the resting places of saints. As a seminary community, we continue the practice of visiting one of these station churches in Rome each morning for prayer and the Holy Mass (except on Sundays, when we continue to celebrate in the seminary as a community). These historic churches are the final resting places of various important saints of the faith, often saints you hear named in the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer I), like Stephen, Lawrence, Clement, Nicholas, Sixtus, Cosmas and Damien, Anastasia, Lucy, and Cecilia. The mornings start with a quiet, prayerful walk as a group



to the church, where a Mass is celebrated by a priest associated with the NAC community. Seminarian serve the Mass, including one who chants verses from scripture at appropriate times with the people chanting the antiphonal response. It is a beautiful way to start the day, which is followed by a walk to class at our universities for the academic part of our formation. Many English speakers come to these Masses including university study abroad students, faculty at universities, and workers in Rome. For me, it became an unexpectedly important part of my Lenten routine.

Formation

Formation continues to go well at the seminary, at the university, and elsewhere I go while here. Many of the conferences and classes end up generating thoughts in my mind that are good for reflection and prayer. Beyond the Lenten station masses, there are ample opportunities to visit important places in Rome for prayer and study. On Mondays after class I help serve meals and talk with refugees at a food kitchen not far from my university. Each seminarian has some kind of assignment in the city to spend time in a ministry. There are also many visitors to the city of Rome we encounter on the streets that may want help with something, especially as the busier travel season has begun again here.



Free Weekends

As part of our formation to be priest with hearts configured to Christ to serve in our dioceses, the seminary in Rome provides unique experiences because of its location to grow in many ways and to learn more about the universal Church. Some of this occurs through "free weekends," which occur about once a month. The normal schedule of the seminary is relaxed to enable us to have time to explore the region or to travel with brother seminarians somewhere in Europe. Due to the smaller size of countries here, traveling within Italy or to other countries is comparable to traveling to another state.

Often these are pilgrimages to follow after saints—a combination of prayer, recreation, and fraternity. Seeing the Church and talking to people in other places helps me to understand the universal aspects of the faith and see how the Holy Spirit is working in people. There are consistent customs with some unique ones. I have been fortunate to visit places this year which include the tombs of Saints Matthew and Andrew in Italy; important sites and the tombs in Spain associated with Saint John of the Cross and Saint Teresa of Ávila (two XVI century mystics); and Trondheim Norway for the Easter Triduum, celebrating liturgies with Bishop Erik Varden in a community that is blossoming in the faith less than two-hundred years after Catholicism was permitted again. Some photos from these trips are attached.



Looking Ahead

It continues to be a very blessed time for me, and I am grateful for the opportunity to be here supported by God, my family, my diocese, benefactors to the seminary, and the spiritual support through prayer by all of you and so many others. My classes and formation continue into June for this "year." Then I will return to the United States for a couple of months to serve in a parish in my diocese before returning to Rome to help with orientation for the next class of men who have been assigned by their bishops to the seminary.

As the Easter season approaches its end in two weeks, we ought to continue to remember the marvelous work of God, for which we cry out, Alleluia—work that stretches with cosmic reach "from creation to the end of time.... Easter reveals the meaning and purpose of all there is, from the greatest to the smallest circumstance and thing. In Christ, and only in him, everything is led to make sense. Everything can become praise. Everything can be redeemed, if only God's power may touch it and extract death's sting" (Bishop Varden).

I pray you remain in the Lord's love as he remains in you. May the God of unchanging power and eternal light continue to accomplish his work in you so that, as you cooperate with his grace, you and those around you may know and see that all things are restored to integrity through Christ, just as by him they came into being.





Coats For Kids — 2024

For this years Coats for Kids Program, the Council selected the children who attend York Elementary School, which is located in Jamestown Tennessee. According to the U.S. Census Bureau of the 272 towns in the state with available data, Jamestown ranks as the poorest. The typical Jamestown household earns just \$18,000 a year, 69.2% less than the statewide median household income. Given the



low incomes, it is not surprising that a larger than average share of residents live in poverty. The local poverty rate in the town stands at 46.7%, compared to the statewide poverty rate of 14.3%. In addition to its high poverty rate, Jamestown also has a high unemployment rate.

Despite its challenges, Jamestown is a resilient community where people come together to help one another and participate in community events.. There are several organizations in the town that are working to address poverty and other social problems. Fentress County Community Foundation provides grants to local nonprofits that are working to improve the lives of residents. Also, the Jamestown Chamber of Commerce is working to promote economic development in the town. Approximately 475 Children attend York Elementary School from grade PK3 (3 yo) to 8th grade (14 yo). The school is pretty much divided equally between girls and boys. The School's Vision: Providing innovation and encouragement and reaching the children's highest potential. The School's Mission: Insure that all students are college, career and life ready. Some of the School's Core Beliefs include: All children can: learn, succeed, be challenged, learn to be socially responsible, all people have worth and value, high expectations encourage high achievement, and all children learn best when parents and teachers work together for the mutual benefit of the child. Lastly, the average temperature in Jamestown during the winter months is approximately 40 degrees.

Florida Bishops Oppose Extreme Abortion Amendment Vote No on Amendment 4

Florida Amendment 4, which will appear on Florida's November 2024 ballot, is an extreme proposal that legalizes fullterm abortion with no protections for the preborn child, including when the child is capable of feeling pain. This proposed amendment to our state constitution would prohibit all restrictions on abortion before viability and create a broad exception that any healthcare provider could exploit to allow abortion up to birth.

Furthermore, the amendment would effectively overturn or seriously jeopardize common-sense state laws that have regulated abortion for years. These include basic health and safety requirements for clinics where abortions are performed, requiring a physician to perform abortions, informed consent requirements, laws limiting public funding of abortion, and parental consent requirements before a minor's abortion. These risks demonstrate the extreme nature of the amendment.

We urge all Floridians of goodwill to stand against the legalization of late-term abortion and oppose the abortion amendment. In doing so, we will not only protect the weakest, most innocent, and defenseless of human life among us but also countless women throughout the state from the harms of abortion.

Human life is sacred. The dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision of society. Direct attacks on innocent persons are never morally acceptable, at any stage or in any condition. In our state, human life is repeatedly being destroyed by abortion. Over 84,000 vulnerable and voiceless children were aborted in Florida in 2023.

This matter concerning the respect for human dignity and the fundamental value of human life is of grave importance to both our Church and our state. The threat of abortion remains our pre-eminent public policy priority. Therefore, we support a coordinated campaign to mobilize against the proposed amendment. To this end, we offer this prayer to defeat Amendment 4:

Ever-living God, you give life and desire a future for all your children. Take hold of our nation, state and community and awaken in every heart awe for the gift of life. Send your Spirit to strengthen us with wisdom and fortitude as we defend mothers and children in Florida from laws that disregard their health and safety.

Mary and Joseph trusted in you and welcomed Jesus into our broken world. God Almighty, we ask their intercession to protect the preborn and their mothers, and to guide all parents in raising their children. May they help us build a civilization of love by upholding the sacredness of life and accompanying pregnant women in need.

We ask this through Christ, our Lord. Amen.






Each year on the first Sunday after Pentecost we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, also known as Trinity Sunday. Although it wasn't until 1334 that Pope John XXII officially established the feast for universal observance in the Western Church, the mystery of the Holy Trinity has been the pulse of the Church's life since the very beginning. The Trinity is "the central mystery of Christian faith and life...[and is] the source of all the other mysteries of faith" (CCC 234). The whole of the Church's life flows from the central belief that the one true God exists as three divine

Persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Since the very beginning of time, God has gradually revealed and communicated the truth of who he is as Trinitarian through what he has done in salvation history (see CCC 53-67). Although God gradually revealed himself throughout different stages of the Old Testament period of salvation history, mankind had no way of knowing the full truth of God's inner life of the Trinity before the time of Christ, since this mystery of our faith is "inaccessible to human reason alone...before the Incarnation of God's Son and the sending of the Holy Spirit" (CCC 237).
