Notes from the Grand Knight

Membership Drive. We held a very successful membership drive on August 10 and 11. This was in conjunction with the annual anniversary event to honor Blessed Father McGiveny. We had the Father McGivney banner and are own Council banners in place outside both entrances to our temporary church. Tables were in place at both entrances as well and staffed by Knights and ladies from the Ladies Auxiliary. Our goal was to approach all Catholic men who attend Mass and at least give them the necessary informant on the Knights so they can decide if joining the Knights is the right move for them.

We were very successful with the drive and compiled a list of 16 gentlemen who we are contacting in hopes of having them schedule an interview with our membership committee. So far we have six gentlemen who have committed to joining the Knights and we expect to have them attend the next exemplification ceremony which will be held in the Knights room on August 29 at 7 PM. All Council members are welcome and encouraged to attend.

School Activities. We have provided the school staff with a plan of activities for this school year. This plan was approved by the school principal Mrs Claudia Stokes. Below are the actives scheduled:

- **Eagle Pride Run/Walk (Sept)** Knights can assist upon request with set up, traffic control, or other needs.
- Council Soccer Challenge (Oct) 9 to 14 year old participants kick goals for accuracy, top scorers in two age groups and boys and girls categories advance to District competition.
- Citizenship Essay Contest (Oct) 8th Graders are eligible to participate in this contest for a \$50 prize. The essay subject this year is "What are the two most important virtues for an elected leader to possess, and why? How can you determine if the leader has these virtues?"
- **Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest (Dec)** 3rd through 8th graders are eligible to submit Keep Christ in Christmas themed posters. There are three age groups and the winner in each are group receives a \$25 prize.
- Adopt a Family (Dec) The Knights provide an assistance check to two families during the Christmas season. Your administration selects the families based mostly on need.
- Council Free Throw Challenge (Jan/Feb) participants shoot free throws. Top scorers in two age groups and boys and girls categories advance to District competition.
- Science Fair Judging (Jan/Feb), Knights provide a few judges for the annual Science Fair as requested by school staff.
- MCC Scholarships (May) The Knights offer three scholarships to graduating 8th graders planning to attend MCC. Your administration selects the students.
- **Teacher Appreciation Luncheon (May)** Knights offered lunch for the teachers and staff in appreciation for another successful school year.

Soccer Challenge. The first major event planned with the school is the Soccer Challenge planned for October. We have submitted tentative dates to the school for October 7 and 8. We are awaiting approval from the school for these dates. We would run the soccer challenge similar to how we ran the Free Throw Competition in January of this year. We will hold the challenge in the gym during regular PE classes allowing all students to participate. As with the Free Throw, all volunteers will need to be fingerprinted and Safe Environment trained with with the Diocese — and be entered in the school system. Chairs are myself and SK Bob Richmond.

Citizenship Essay Contest. This contest for our school students will also be held in October and SK Mike Marzec has volunteered to chair the contest this year. He will be looking for Knights who wish to read and evaluate submitted essays from the children. Topic of essays is "Most Important Virtues of our Elected Leaders."

Novena for Life. This year, starting on October 6th, which is this year's National Life Chain Day, we are planning to conduct a Novena For Life to pray for nine consecutive days for end of the tragic practice of abortion, for the support for every pregnant mother, and to elevate awareness of this topic as we approach the time of the election and the proposed Amendment 4 in Florida that supports abortion. Fr. John approved this program during our roundtable with him last month.

There is an annual novena called 9 Days for Life at <u>respectlife.org</u> that is supported by the United States Council of Catholic Bishops and that usually takes place in January but can be done at any time. The plan is to follow that structure which is already scripted and takes only 4-5 minutes each day.

The way I envision this working is:

- I. Each of the 9 days, we send an email in the morning to the council and LA with a link to a video containing the prayers, intentions, and reflections for that day. The videos are done following the script provided by respectlife.org. People can watch the video at their own convenient time, on their phone, tablet, or computer, without having to drive to Church. We can also post a link each day on the council's Facebook group page.
- 2. Each of the 9 days, we also have a group attend daily mass, it could be a different group each day, and after mass stay a few extra minutes and have someone lead with the scripted prayers, intentions, and reflections.
- The scripts containing the prayers, intentions, and reflections for each day is at https://www.usccb.org/resources/9-days-novena-printable.pdf
- The videos can be recorded using a phone, then we can edit them and store them on our Google drive. There would be one video per day. Then we email the link to each video each day along with a meaningful message. We also would place links to it on our website under a dedicated page.
- If we can get other ministries to participate that would be ideal. The Pro-Life Ministry is on board and we will meet with them later this month to present the idea more in detail.
- The webpage is ready. Here is the <u>LINK</u> and then you can click on the image for Day I to see what the video looks like with me already doing the first day.
- I also added links on the page to the vote no on amendment 4 message from the Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops.
- Day 2 could be someone from the Ladies Auxiliary, Day 3 someone from the assembly, Day 4 someone from the pro-life ministry, Day 5 someone from the young adults ministry, then someone from CRHP men's, CRHP women's, etc.

National Elections. We have 10 volunteers who worked the Primary election and they will also work the National election in November. All money received by our volunteers will be donated to the Council. We have had this regular group of volunteers for quite some time, so if this is something you think you would like to try, contact SK Rich Passarella for details. This would be for the next election, so you would have plenty of time to prepare.

Parish Picnic. The Annual Parish Picnic is September 22 and preparations and plans are underway. This is an event where "many hands make light work" and a lot of help is needed over several days to make it happen with most of it happening on picnic day. The Picnic will once again be at the Wickham Park Main Pavilion on Sunday September 22nd starting around noon.

Help is needed loading the truck to transport what is needed from the Parish to the park, unloading, setting up, cooking, serving, cleaning up tables, and getting things back to the Parish, so a lot of volunteers are needed. Last year we had close to 1000 participants. They have already received sponsorship support from the local community and more is on the way, SignUp Genius will be available to sign up for the many jobs necessary to carry out this event — so stay tuned for more information.


From Color Corps Commander SK Eddy Merlet

From Spiritual Advisor SK Deacon Tom Stauffacher

We all read the bible, right? So I was thinking the other day about how the Bible talks about us — all of us as Knights. Jesus faced a lot of things and we as Christian Knights also face many things to deal with every day. There are always hostile powers that work against us around the world that seek to destroy our way of life — our Christian ethics.

Most of us can remember from our past our TV sets growing up — most were black and white and the only remote controls available were when our parents told us to change the channel — since there were very few channels, these channel changes were usually few. So we often had to listen to the radio — and what did we listen to? — the Lone Ranger — and Lamont Cranston — "Who knows what evil lurks in the hearts of men — The Shadow Knows." We know people — people where talk is cheap — what they talk is not what they mean. Someone may talk like their intentions are good but their actions tell a different story. So we are often put into the position of having to determine if what they are saying is really what there intentions are.



As Knights the way we act is far more important than what we say. Someone can make a mistake — do something obviously wrong — and we may judge that person on that one mistake regardless of all the other good that person may have done. We may judge without the facts, specifics, or substance We are sometimes too quick in our judgements — we too often judge based on our opinion. God does not judge us on one act. If that were the case, most of us would be in big trouble. God loves us for what we are. God's judgement is not hasty — it is based on mercy, mitigation, and extenuation — the situation we are in — why we did what we did. So with God, we are judged based on the amount of penance we perform, contrition and conversion — how we change our hearts and minds to act better — to do what is right. This applies to all of us as Knights — in our personal relationships — in the Parish, with our family and friends, and in our work environment. Kriegsspiel - 'War Game' Battle Simulator

Kriegsspiel, a German word meaning War Game, is a fascinating study in the evolution of military planning tools. Information in this presentation was extracted from the articles listed in the References section with some editing by the presenter and supplementary material to improve order and content.

Origins

A game originating in history

Kriegsspiel evolved from an Indian game dating at least to the sixth century AD known as **chaturanga**, or "four-limbed". The pieces in *chaturanga* represented the four divisions of the ancient Indian army namely elephantry, chariotry, cavalry and infantry. (An ancient battle formation, *akshauhini*, is like the setup of *chaturanga*.) The pieces also included the Vizier (a high-ranking minister or political adviser of the near east.)

As the game migrated to the west, elephant pieces transformed into bishops, chariots into rooks, (cavalry into Knights), infantry into pawns, and the vizier piece became the queen; also, the name changed to the game we call **Chess**.

In the late 18th century, the German mathematician Johann Hellwig attempted to restore realism to chess and make it a practical military-training tool. And so, updated with 1,617 squares and modern artillery, *Kriegsspiel* was born.



Evolution

From game to strategy tool

Hellwig's game was a commercial success, but too rigid to be useful to military officers. After the German military strategist Georg Leopold von Reisswitz spent years improving it, his son, Georg Heinrich Rudolf Johann, completed the job. Taking advantage of modern map-making techniques, Reisswitz Jr redesigned the game to be played on scaled maps of actual battlefields.

In 1824, the Prussian royal family invited the younger Reisswitz to present Kriegsspiel to the court. King Friedrich Wilhelm III of Prussia and his court were impressed with it that General Karl von Mueffling exclaimed: "It's not a game at all! It's training for war."

Kriegsspiel ("War Game")

How It Works

The game was played on scaled maps of actual territories. Planning officers were divided into two teams, controlling red- and blue-painted lead-block troops representing German and enemy forces. Each turn represented two minutes of warfare, and the teams could do anything real forces could do in that time – move their troops, send scouts, initiate an attack. To simulate the fog of war, teams couldn't see their opponents' full positions, and so sent commands through a seasoned umpire who estimated outcomes for each action. The game became mathematically rigorous: players consulted tables of data from real battles to determine the casualties of a given artillery exchange. Dice rolls introduced randomness into the outcomes of attacks. Troops advanced a realistic distance per turn.

Effectiveness

How useful was it?

Kriegsspiel proved a remarkably accurate simulation engine. Officers used it to predict when and where their troops would need to be resupplied or reinforced. As war machinery improved, the game incorporated new weapons, tanks and aeroplanes.... Wilhelm I, who had, as a boy, played Kriegsspiel at home in the royal palace, became king in 1861. He used the game to plan a range of astonishing victories that united the first German Empire. Kriegsspiel became internationally famous.

Hitler, who had no formal military training, described this sort of game as "childish force calculations." His officers had previously used it to try to dissuade him from inciting conflict: in 1938, when the Führer was contemplating the invasion of Czechoslovakia, General Ludwig Beck used Kriegsspiel to argue this would escalate into a second world war. Hitler had wanted to plunder their neighbour to strengthen the weak German economy. But this weak economy, Beck argued, was precisely why war was a bad idea. Germany was in no position to fight France, and Britain would then be drawn into the fray. Hitler retorted that his officers were to execute his orders, not to question them using a plaything.

Yet his troops were stretched even thinner; By 1940 ... the Führer was forced to find a new approach to block the Allies. Captain Erich von Manstein showed, via Kriegsspiel, that a bold strategy of making a "sickle cut" directly through France, driving towards the English Channel to cut off Allied forces, would be better. Hitler liked the plan for its audacity, which accorded with his intuition. Most German officers thought it too radical to work, and those who supported it did so largely out of desperation – the Nazis were out of moves. To virtually everyone's surprise, Manstein's plan was a success, and the Nazis took France in June 1940.

Impact on History

How has Kriegsspiel shaped world events?

Though often dismissed as trivial, games have reshaped – even saved – the world. In 1983, as Cold War tensions were rising, the political theorist Thomas Schelling arranged a top-secret nuclear-war simulation game for 200 US politicians and military officials. The result of the gamed scenarios horrified everyone: in some cases, nuclear war escalated to the total destruction of life on Earth. In one of the more optimistic outcomes, casualties numbered half a billion, with another half billion expected to die from radiation poisoning. As a result of these exercises, Ronald Reagan's administration pivoted to deescalatory nuclear rhetoric and opened sweeping arms-control negotiations with the Soviets.

Game On (Continued)

This wasn't the first time the fate of the world had hinged on a game. Having contributed to the Nazis' early success, *Kriegsspiel* would also play a role in their downfall. In late 1940, Hitler's officers used it to plan their invasion of the Soviet Union. According to their simulations, the Nazi troops would destroy 240 Soviet divisions, leaving only 60 remaining. The Germans projected such a thorough victory that they didn't bother gaming beyond November.

Almost exactly as anticipated, by November 1941, 248 Soviet divisions lay destroyed – but Stalin had war-gamed the invasion with *Kriegsspiel* beforehand, too, and Gen Zhukov had role-played brilliantly as the Germans. He had left Stalin so distraught by the simulated rout that the Soviet leader had ordered a massive mobilisation of troops in the real world. When November actually came, after those 248 divisions were lost, Stalin had 220 left – not 60 – and as winter set in, the Nazis became bogged down in a war of attrition. It marked the beginning of Hitler's end.

What About Today?

War gaming continues as a training and strategy tool

Today, most major militaries still use war simulation games. While Kriegsspiel proper is primarily the remit of hobbyists and historians, its principles have remained a vital part of military education.

- -- From 1977 to 1997, the US Army used the game Dunn Kempf, named after its two creators, to teach tactics to officers. Playing on scale models of Eastern European terrain, students learned pragmatic techniques such as the use of smoke as a defensive screen.
- -- Intelligence and defence officials still play commercial games such as "Persian Incursion" to foster creative thinking about foreign conflicts, while the US Marines play "Transition and Tumult", designed to simulate conflict in Sudan, to practise quelling local unrest.

Modernization

Inspiration for an entire genre

Simplified variants of *Kriegsspiel* have also found their way into the homes of civilians. In 1913, the avowed pacifist HG Wells published a book of rules for a *Kriegsspiel* variant called Little Wars. He hoped it would inoculate its players against militarism, concluding: "You have only to play at Little Wars three or four times to realise just what a blundering thing Great War must be."

RISK -- A Game of World Domination

Little Wars didn't stop the real thing, but it inspired a new family of commercial war games.

In the 1950's through 1970's, a board game called RISK was all the rage. It was super popular while I was in high school (1968-72).

PanzerBlitz" (1970),

While European audiences, subject to firsthand experience of bloodshed, were less receptive to the genre, American audiences happily played games such as "PanzerBlitz" (1970), albeit with the death camps and famine sanitised.

Dungeons and Dragons / Warhammer

War games soon expanded from historical reenactment into fantasy:

<u>First example</u>: Kriegsspiel's umpire was an early version of "Dungeons and Dragons" Dungeon Master. {Dungeons & Dragons is a fantasy tabletop roleplaying game originally created and designed by Gary Gygax and Dave Arneson. The game was first published in **1974** by Tactical Studies Rules, Inc. It has been published by Wizards of the Coast, later a subsidiary of Hasbro, since 1997. Wikipedia}

<u>Second example</u>: The red and blue block troops of *Kriegsspiel* morphed into the epoxy miniatures of "Warhammer", which features a galaxy-spanning human empire at war with aliens, androids and gods. Warhammer is a tabletop miniature wargame with a medieval fantasy theme. The game was created by Bryan Ansell, Richard Halliwell, and Rick Priestley, and first published by the Games Workshop company in **1983.**

World of Warcraft and Call of Duty

These games, in turn, evolved into modern combat-based video-games such as World of Warcraft and Call of Duty. Many militaries intensively recruit from the gaming community, because the skills required for modern warfare – for instance, remote drone strikes mediated by computer screens – increasingly overlap with the skills that video-games hone.

(All those hours your kid plays video games may be useful after all.)



Florida Bishops Oppose Extreme Abortion Amendment Vote No on Amendment 4

Florida Amendment 4, which will appear on Florida's November 2024 ballot, is an extreme proposal that legalizes fullterm abortion with no protections for the preborn child, including when the child is capable of feeling pain. This proposed amendment to our state constitution would prohibit all restrictions on abortion before viability and create a broad exception that any healthcare provider could exploit to allow abortion up to birth.

Furthermore, the amendment would effectively overturn or seriously jeopardize common-sense state laws that have regulated abortion for years. These include basic health and safety requirements for clinics where abortions are performed, requiring a physician to perform abortions, informed consent requirements, laws limiting public funding of abortion, and parental consent requirements before a minor's abortion. These risks demonstrate the extreme nature of the amendment.

We urge all Floridians of goodwill to stand against the legalization of late-term abortion and oppose the abortion amendment. In doing so, we will not only protect the weakest, most innocent, and defenseless of human life among us but also countless women throughout the state from the harms of abortion.

Human life is sacred. The dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision of society. Direct attacks on innocent persons are never morally acceptable, at any stage or in any condition. In our state, human life is repeatedly being destroyed by abortion. Over 84,000 vulnerable and voiceless children were aborted in Florida in 2023.

This matter concerning the respect for human dignity and the fundamental value of human life is of grave importance to both our Church and our state. The threat of abortion remains our pre-eminent public policy priority. Therefore, we support a coordinated campaign to mobilize against the proposed amendment. To this end, we offer this prayer to defeat Amendment 4:

Ever-living God, you give life and desire a future for all your children. Take hold of our nation, state and community and awaken in every heart awe for the gift of life. Send your Spirit to strengthen us with wisdom and fortitude as we defend mothers and children in Florida from laws that disregard their health and safety.

A Recent Homily from Msgr. Anthony Tocco


Rev. Msgr. Anthony Tocco, fondly known as Fr. Tony, is pastor at St. Hugo of the Hills Parish, where he has served since July 1985. Fr. Tony is a cousin of SK Joe Tocco.

In our society it seems cruel that God would promise Abraham a son in his old age only to ask him to offer Isaac in sacrifice. Strange for us, yes, but not so strange in Abraham's time.

In Abraham's day, the practice of human sacrifice was not unusual. People in that pagan society believed that if they were to protect themselves from the wrath of the god Moloch, they would have to offer a first-born child in fire in order to appease him and they did just that.

Do you remember the word Jesus used when He spoke about hell? I have told you this before. It was Gehenna. (In the Hebrew Bible, Gehenna was initially where some of the kings of Judah sacrificed their children by fire) Thereafter, it was deemed to be cursed. In rabbinic lit Understand that Gehenna was not just a concept or a symbol. It was a real place on the outskirts of the city of Jerusalem. It was the later, when the Israelites began to inhabit the land, they were so appalled at the notion that this had been done, they refused to build dwellings in that area. They made the place a

A garbage dump and, in that place, at the time of Jesus, garbage fires were always burning. The look and the smell and smoke were atrocious. Thus, when Jesus wanted to let people know about hell, He used Gehenna as an example.



If Abraham sacrificed Isaac, it would have surprised very few people. The story was put in the Book of Genesis at this time in history to make it clear to people that the One, True God did not require human sacrifice. He was looking for self-sacrifice. He did not want us to sacrifice others in service to Him. He wanted us to sacrifice ourselves in service to others.

Today, the question is clear to us individually and as a society. Have we really given up human sacrifice? To my mind the answer is clearly no.

Abortion, my friends, is human sacrifice. It is human sacrifice offered at the altar of choice. The issue is even more clearly understood when during the last election, we heard prominent politicians, some of whom call themselves Catholic, debating once again whether abortion, partial birth abortion or the killing of a child as it is brought to birth, and even infanticide, the killing of a child born alive in a botched abortion, whether that should be allowed in this country. We now know that from top to bottom, they said yes. You might forgive me for asking whether or not we have really given up human sacrifice.

I will remind all of you that until Roe vs Wade, January 22nd, 1973, abortion was, for almost 2,000 years only a moral issue. It was never politicized. Until that time, most politicians and virtually all of the Catholic politicians would have been pro-life. Until then, a part of the Hippocratic Oath taken by every doctor, included a pledge never to participate in or perform abortions. Since Roe vs Wade, the pledge has been removed from the oath.

The basic question for all of us today is whether the fetus in the womb is a thing that can be discarded, or a child. If we clearly think that it is a child, shame on any of us for thinking that it could be killed. We really know that it is a child because loving mothers have answered that question for generations. You all know that I come from a very large family. I have seen my sisters, sisters-in-law and dozens of nieces with child. I learned from them very early on that there comes a moment in a pregnancy when a woman first feels life. It is called the quickening. It is an exciting moment for a couple expecting a child. I have never once heard any of them say "I just felt my fetus kick." What I have always heard them say is "I just felt my baby." With modern ultrasound technology, young couples expecting a child can get very excited when they see the first pictures of their infant in the womb. Have you ever heard any of them say "Oh, look at our fetus." Of course not! What they say is natural. "Look at my baby."

As things stand today, confronting this issue is still critical for a believing people. Since Roe vs Wade, sixty-two million infants in the womb have been murdered. Once again, I ask. Has our society given up human sacrifice? Understand this. God Himself is paying close attention to the choices each of us makes.

Recently, I Googled a talk by Senator Langford of Oklahoma defending the value of life on the Senate floor. He had three pictures of a 26-week-old child in the womb. His question was simple. "Is this a baby? Is this a child? She has a face. She has two eyes a nose, lips, a beating heart and a functioning nervous system." Again, he asked, "Is this a baby? Is this a child?" I ask all of you. Is it a baby? Is it a child? I encourage all of you, especially those of you who may be pro-choice, as a Lenten penance, to Google this piece. It will take twenty minutes out of your day. God will smile if you do.

Today's Gospel tells us to travel another road, to climb another mountain. We are invited to join Jesus on the summit of Mt. Tabor. There, if we allow it, we can be transfigured and transformed with Him.

We pray today, as we make life choices in our society, that God will give us the courage to choose rightly. May God also give us the Grace.





Coats For Kids — 2024

For this years Coats for Kids Program, the Council selected the children who attend York Elementary School, which is located in Jamestown Tennessee. According to the U.S. Census Bureau of the 272 towns in the state with available data, Jamestown ranks as the poorest. The typical Jamestown household earns just \$18,000 a year, 69.2% less than the statewide median household income. Given the



low incomes, it is not surprising that a larger than average share of residents live in poverty. The local poverty rate in the town stands at 46.7%, compared to the statewide poverty rate of 14.3%. In addition to its high poverty rate, Jamestown also has a high unemployment rate.

Despite its challenges, Jamestown is a resilient community where people come together to help one another and participate in community events.. There are several organizations in the town that are working to address poverty and other social problems. Fentress County Community Foundation provides grants to local nonprofits that are working to improve the lives of residents. Also, the Jamestown Chamber of Commerce is working to promote economic development in the town. Approximately 475 Children attend York Elementary School from grade PK3 (3 yo) to 8th grade (14 yo). The school is pretty much divided equally between girls and boys. The School's Vision: Providing innovation and encouragement and reaching the children's highest potential. The School's Mission: Insure that all students are college, career and life ready.
