Faithful Friar's Message



Dear Sir Knights,

In November and at the beginning of Advent the Church gives us readings from the Book of Revelation and Daniel. These books are called apocalyptic, which means they deal with God's revelation of the end times. The Book of Revelation appeals to many people because it speaks of suffering, death, and God making things right. We all experience times of difficulty, when things go badly. We wonder if God cares or will rescue us from these difficulties.

Written at the end of the first century when the Church was experiencing persecution, many Christians began to lose hope.

Apocalyptic literature reminds the reader that persecution, famine and war are part of the travails of life. But even with all of them, it doesn't mean that God is sleeping or not in charge. Instead, it is the dying gasps of Satan and his legion trying to make a final stand.

One feature of apocalyptic writing is symbolism. Creatures with many heads and eyes, beasts who sweep stars from the sky, and riders on horses that bring plagues seem too hard to understand. Symbolic language is meant to do two things. You can read each part like a code to understand what the early church faced in the Roman Empire. The beast with the sign 666 is a veiled description of Emperor Nero, for instance. Yet, when reading the entire story it reads like a science-fiction fantasy. At the end all comes out well and Christ is the victor sitting on the throne in the heavenly Jerusalem.

An insight in the Book of Revelation and other apocalyptic literature is that when tough times come believers need to be even more steadfast and faithful. Those that fall away will be lost. Those that remain will be rewarded. In every time there will be challenges. We don't know when the end of the world will come or when our life on earth will end. What we do know is that whatever time we are given should be spent serving God and neighbor. We are called to live each day faithfully to God, working out our salvation. God has guaranteed the victory. Now we live in that freedom. We not only confess with our lips that Jesus is Lord, but we live it by our actions.
