**SK David Cruz Makes
a Positive Impact**

Knight Honored for Making an Impact

Sir Knight David Cruz, Knights of Columbus disaster preparedness coordinator for the Diocese of St. Petersburg, was recently recognized for his contributions to his community by the U.S. House of Representatives.

The Honorable Gus M. Bilirakis made the presentation to Cruz at a meeting of the House of Representatives.

“It is clear that David Cruz has made a profoundly positive impact on our community through his volunteerism with the Knights of Columbus, and I am grateful for his service,” Rep. Bilirakis said. “May we all strive to serve our communities with the same dedication and humility.”

The commendation pointed out that when Hurricane Beryl hit Texas in July 2024, Operation Barbecue Relief sent Cruz to Texas, where he organized 21 Knights in six days to prepare, cook and serve 7,500 meals a day, for a total of 35,000 meals in one week.

Then, when Hurricane Milton struck Florida in October, he was assigned to accompany and work with a medical crew from Ohio, where they provided medical assistance to more than 400 patients in need. He also worked with Fresh Start for Pasco to feed shut-ins in East Pasco for Thanksgiving. The volunteer work was spotlighted by a film crew sent by KofC Supreme to document their efforts.

Cruz has worked to bring together many of the spiritual groups and civic organizations within the community to help hurricane victims. Thanks to these efforts, Our Lady Queen of Peace served 12,000 families during the six weeks following the hurricanes of 2024. He also continues to work with Fresh Start for Pasco, Endeavors and Pinellas Emergency Operations. Most recently, his volunteerism brought him to help muck out homes after the water finally receded.

“My belief is that we as Knights can be a force multiplier for the other spiritual groups that have well planned service to the people like the Salvation



Army, the American Red Cross and other groups that all have facilities to cook for tens of thousands of people and other services,” Cruz said. “The best thing to help people is to have neighbors helping neighbors. They feel more comfortable working with people that they know.”

Cruz has been doing disaster work since 1973, working with Red Cross Disaster Services after Hurricane Gloria hit New York. He then moved to New Hampshire, where he was put in charge of disaster relief programs for the New Hampshire Red Cross, where he dealt with the flooding and disaster action team. He eventually became deputy director of emergency management for the Granite State.

Cruz moved to Florida in 2009, where he continued to volunteer with fire services, and also worked as a pit lane fire fighter for NASCAR events. He was named KofC disaster preparedness coordinator for the Diocese of St. Petersburg prior to Hurricane Idalia causing major destruction in August 2003, affecting 65,000 homes that were hit directly between Pinellas County and Pascoe County.

Most recently, Cruz worked with St. Rita Catholic Church in Dade City, where 200 homes affected by the storms were not touched until two months ago.

Now, he's patiently preparing in case the volunteers need to spring into action this fall.

"Usually by the time we get to "I" storms in alphabetical order, we may be dealing with some issues that we have to work with," Cruz said.

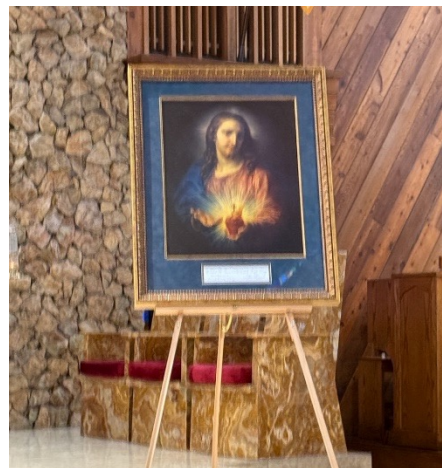


Council Hosts Sacred Heart Holy Hour

We are not building our legacy—we are continuing the legacy of Blessed Michael McGivney, who reminds us of those ordinary men, when united in faith, can do extraordinary things.

My brothers, my offices and my district deputies I am humbled to serve you. I ask for your prayers as we begin this journey together. I also offer you mine. May we always place our trust in Jesus Christ, draw strength from the Holy Eucharist, and seek the intercession of our Blessed Mother, Patroness of our Order. What Is Our Destiny As Human Beings?

Everything that has been created by God has a destiny or purpose. If we go to the book of Genesis, we see God created all things and gave each creation a purpose. divine, to become God-like and enter eternal life where the Saints repose, the 'New Heaven' as, again, the Book of Revelation calls it.

Baptism and the vows of baptism are the markers to Sainthood. The Ten Commandments are the signposts to being perfected each day. 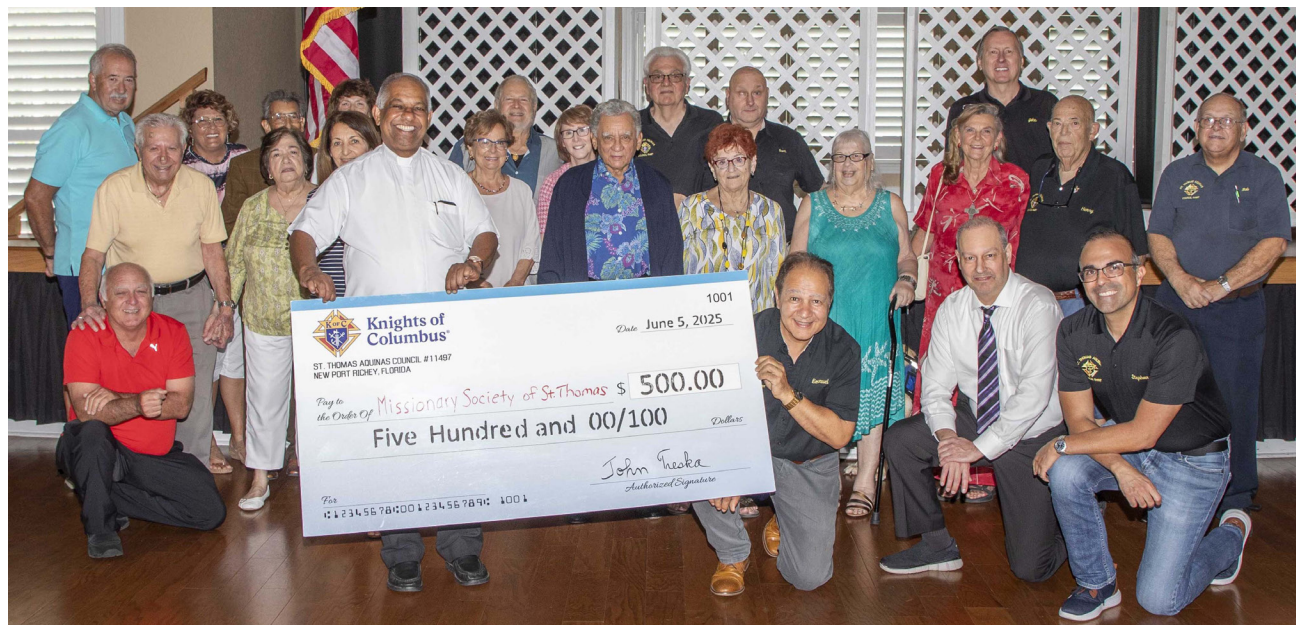

Knight Donates Funds for Ultrasound



Tom and Millie Wenzel recently made a \$7,000 donation to Church of the Epiphany Council No.12569's Right to Life Baby Bottle Campaign towards the purchase of an ultrasound machine.

Wenzel, 92, joined the Knights of Columbus Green Bay (Wisconsin) Council in 1959. He and Millie have been married for 67 years. They moved to Port Orange 25 years ago, and became members of the Epiphany parish, with Tom transferring to Council 12569.

"The Holy Spirit instructed us to donate," Tom said. "We are very passionate about Right to Life, and we feel very strongly that the ultrasound enables the mother to see the baby growing. The picture of the baby moving inside her body helps her to make that important decision to give birth instead of aborting. The mother sees this tiny little human being and realizes it is her baby."

"If we save even one life, our donation has been worth it," Tom added. "The Lord has been very good to us and we feel we should give something back."

Tom, 92, was given 10 years to life after undergoing by-pass surgery in 1985. Forty years later, he is still going strong. He is a former executive at Miller Brewing Company, and remains an avid golfer. He follows all sports, especially his hometown Packers. He and Millie have traveled the world and visited Medjugorje twice, sharing many experiences and memories in their lifetime.

He and Millie have four children, four grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

Council Reaches Service Milestone



Back in January 2017, a group of dedicated men from the St. Cosmas and Damien Knights of Columbus No. 13341 of Lakewood Ranch began a humble tradition—showing up, month after month, to help build homes and hope with Manatee Habitat for Humanities.

Now, 100 consecutive months later, their commitment has blossomed into a legacy of service, faith, and community impact that continues to inspire everyone around them.

Fittingly, the Knights completed their 100th month of service the day before Good Friday—during Holy Week, a time of deep spiritual reflection and renewal. For a group so grounded in faith and charity, the timing could not have been more meaningful.

“Looking back, it’s hard to believe we’ve reached 100 months,” shared Chancellor Mike Mahan. “Our council stays very active throughout the year, so this is truly an unprecedented accomplishment we can all be proud of.”

While their hands have helped build dozens of homes, their hearts have helped build lasting relationships. Some of Mahan’s most cherished memories are those spent working side by side with future homeowners.

“One of my greatest joys has been seeing the excitement in their eyes as we work together to fulfill their dreams. It’s incredibly rewarding to know I’m doing my part to help someone achieve their dream of affordable housing.”

In the early days, the Knights would lend their skills to one home at a time—a single rehab or a house on an empty lot. Today, they’re contributing to entire Habitat neighborhoods.

“The expansion really stands out. Habitat has grown so much. Now, we’re building small communities. We’ve also grown with the work—learning new skills and ‘tricks of the trade’ to help with many aspects of home construction.”

Even when the pandemic paused construction, the Knights never wavered. Instead, they found new ways to support the mission behind the

scenes—organizing materials, prepping for future builds, and making sure everything was ready to go when restrictions lifted. “We still wanted to help however we could. Making a difference in someone’s life—that’s what motivates us.”

For Mahan, volunteering through the Knights of Columbus is a natural extension of his faith. “Charity is a core mission of the Knights,” he said. “I can’t think of a more honorable and worthy cause than Habitat. It’s a chance to grow in faith and serve those in need in a truly meaningful way.”

After 100 months, the Knights’ message is clear: everyone has something to give.

“For someone who is on the fence about getting involved I would say you need to try it just once,”

Mahan encouraged. “There’s no obligation—just do what you can, when you can. What may not seem like much to you could mean everything to someone else.”

As the council celebrates this 100-month milestone, they are filled with gratitude for the unwavering support of the Knights of Columbus. That they reached this moment during Holy Week is a powerful reminder that faith in action can transform lives—and build something lasting for generations to come.

The training was very timely as many of the Council 6624 Brother Knights also serve as ushers and lectors for many of the weekend Masses at Holy Redeemer Parish.

Brother George Jackow, a member of Council 6624 and head of the Safety Committee for Holy Redeemer Parish, remarked that there has been a number of updates since the parish training provided by the Orlando Diocese, and he learns something new every time he takes the training. With the blessing of the pastor, Council 6624 and the Safety Committee will sponsor both first aid and fire suppression training to the parishioners of Holy Redeemer parish courtesy of the Kissimmee Fire Department.

Council 6624 has enjoyed a close relationship with the local law enforcement and first responders of Osceola Council, including the Kissimmee Fire Department, for many years and this has

blossomed over time. Indeed, Lt. Miller was one of the recipients of the Heroes Casino Night, a Council program, which provides donations to help first responder Heroes and their families during their time of need, when his own house burned down while he was away teaching a CPR class.



Knight Creates Marian Devotion Website

Notre Dame Council 10514 of Flagler Beach member Peter Sesso made a presentation to council membership on a new Marian Devotion website that he created with assistance from other professionals.

The website, www.MaryLives.com, is supported by Santa Maria del Mar Parish of Flagler Beach, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Catholic Church of Palm Coast and St. Mary's Abbey of Morristown, N.J.

The purpose of the Mary Lives Ministry is to help young people develop spiritual growth by learning the power of daily recitation of the Holy Rosary and how this practice will help build a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ.

Brother Sesso stated that there are number of powerful videos focused on the Blessed Mother that are embedded in the website. There is also a webpage dedicated to various Marian apparitions with accompanying videos. There is even a link to the 1943 movie, "The Song of Bernadette". The movie tells the story of the apparitions of the Blessed Mother to Saint Bernadette Soubirous in 1858. Those apparitions took place in Lourdes, France. Website visitors can also click on a live video feed from Lourdes and join pilgrims as they pray the rosary at the Grotto.

Clicking on the 'Pray the Rosary' link brings the user to a 'Pray the Rosary with Us' via Zoom at 8 p.m. on the third Wednesday of every month with chat afterward. There is also a 'How to Pray the Rosary' section geared towards children (adults can also use it!). The page lists all of the prayers of the rosary and gives a detailed explanation of the Joyous, Sorrowful, Glorious, and Luminous Mysteries.

The website also has a 'Get Help' webpage. The page has numerous resources listed with contact information for those individuals that are facing difficult life situations. The resources include both local and national organizations that are available 24 hours a day to offer compassionate counseling to those in need. Phone numbers and



website addresses are included for each of the organizations.

INVOCATION reports on local council activities throughout the entire State of Florida

- Article size: **300 words** ideal (half page) to 500-600 words max (full page)
- Articles submitted as an attachment in Word format - not in the body of an email
 - PDF submissions are for ads or promotions - not articles
- Pictures need to be sent separately as an attachment and the original pictures **Please do not format them in any way, we will do it**-- not embedded in a Word document
- **Articles need to be brief, highly relevant and actionable**
- **At a minimum, Who, What, When and Where needs to be in the first paragraph,**
- Articles need to be brief, to-the-point and **of interest** to the entire State Council
 - What is the event/activity about?
 - Whom did it benefit?
 - What was the result?
 - Who are the key players/Knights?
- **Similar story** submissions will be consolidated/batched into one article by the Editors
- Authors must submit on time per the Editor production calendar- **Deadline 1st of each month**
 - Late submittals will be placed farther down the newsletter or not published.
- Proof your article carefully for spelling and grammar before sending (**use spellcheck**)
- Document filename should reflect the office/title, i.e. State Deputy article
- Every Region needs to participate – one page of the Invocation will be dedicated to each Region respectively
 - If a region does not submit content their page will be eliminated from that issue
- Cover story submissions need to be submitted ahead of the deadline due to special photo editing
 - Cover story photos – in portrait style at least 1mb in size - not formatted or resized
 - filename "Cover Story"

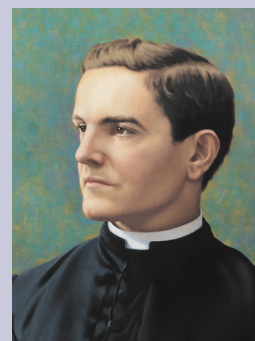
Prayer for the Canonization of Blessed Michael J. McGivney
