We finished about 11:30 with a few tasks left for Code Vet team members to do the following week. We finished a bit early because so much was done and it was starting to get hot.

It was especially great to see the 11 enthusiastic JROTC students get involved and learn some of the handyman skills which most of us take for granted. Mr. Burns' house had a big transformation in four hours. It was the biggest volunteer event Code Vet

has had to date. It was an outstanding example of Charity and Volunteerism. Special thanks to SK Dave Farrugia, our Faithful Admiral for a lot of coordination with Code Vet to put this together.

**Operation Code Vet** is a nonprofit organization that partners with Hillsborough County Code Enforcement to identify veterans who need





assistance to improve the conditions of their home and/or property. Operation Code Vet raises funds, solicits donations of goods and services, and coordinates community outreach efforts and volunteers.

These resources are utilized to help veterans in hardship situations not only get their properties back in code compliance but also to improve their quality of life and the community at large. The group provides volunteers, equipment, and other resources to fix home and yard problems that otherwise could lead to citations or fines.



### Raising Funds for Military Chaplains



verthelast decade, Knights of Columbus Corpus Christi Assembly 2810 has been one of the few Assemblies in the country raising funds for the support of our Military Chaplains, which is overseen by the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA in Washington, DC.

Each year, the Assembly holds a dinner dance and raffle in conjunction with our annual Past Faithful Navigator dinner. This year's event was held on March 9 in the Santa Maria Del Mar Parish Hall in Flagler Beach.

Prior to the start of Covid in 2020/2021, we raised almost \$70,000 to benefit the military chaplains. We were temporarily stalled during Covid, but our program was restarted again in 2022. This year our Assembly raised more than \$4000 in additional monies, bring our total to nearly \$80,000.

In October of 2023 Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly awarded a Civic Award to Assembly 2810 in recognition of our financial support of the Military Chaplains. Our Assembly is comprised of three District 17 Councils: Notre Dame Council 10514 Flagler Beach; Mother Seton Palm Coast Council 17480; and St. Mary's Council 11961, Korona.

Planning this event is critical and requires several months of preparation. Our Faithful Navigator must attend all three Council meetings to announce the event. Our Knights distribute flyers, make announcements and sell tickets at the masses. We solicit ads to appear in our program booklet. This year we received 40 ads from Brother Knights, community members, and local businesses.

Rev. Fr. Manny Lopez, Pastor of Santa Maria Del Mar, and Rev. Fr. Mathew Ibok of Corpus Christi Church, St. Augustine were in attendance.

In his opening remarks, Faithful Navigator, Richard Friese began the program with a prayer by most Reverend Timothy Broglio for military services. Each table had program booklets with the ads from the businesses that supported the Chaplains dinner dance and additional literature from the Archdiocese for the Military Services.

This very successful event could not have happened without the total support of Fr. Manny and the members of our Assembly. The Ladies of our Assembly contributed many hours of their time with decorations, table setup, registration, cleanup and more. Our outstanding Assembly chef's put out the best dinner we have had in years! Our food servers were volunteers from the Santa Maria Del Mar Teen Life Ministry.

### Knights Host "Ambassadors for LIFE" Statue



ather Philip de Carriere Council 10484 hosted the LIFE statue from JMJ Pregnancy Center in Orlando during the months of April and May 2024 at St. Ann Catholic Church in Haines City to celebrate the sanctity of life.

JMJ Pregnancy Center is the only Catholic pregnancy center in the Diocese of Orlando. The LIFE Statue, created by world-renowned sculptor Canadian Timothy Schmalz, represents a pregnant Mary carrying her unborn Son, Jesus. The colossal version of the LIFE Statue is on display at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC.

When visiting Orlando, Schmalz was so impressed to find an all-Catholic pregnancy center, he duplicated a life-size version of the LIFE Statue and gave it to JMJ.

JMJ formed the "Ambassadors for LIFE Campaign" to display in Catholic parishes in the Diocese of Orlando, and other parishes in the State of Florida after that. The campaign's idea is two-fold: promote the sanctity of life among Catholic parishioners, and provide a source of funds for JMJ Pregnancy Center by selling miniature replicas of the LIFE Statue while on display at the parish.

The Knights at St. Ann Church learned of the initiative and secured a month-long display that

began on Tuesday April 9, the day after the Feast of the Annunciation. A team of Florida Knights helps JMJ Pregnancy Center move the statue to parishes taking part.

During its stay at St. Ann, the LIFE Statue was positioned under a mural of Our Lady of Guadalupe in the church narthex. The display period lasted until the Friday before Mother's Day. The Knights of St. Ann have a long-standing

commitment to honor unborn children. The Council built a prayer chapel for the unborn in the parish's carillon tower. An Italian sculpture of Blessed Fr. Michael J. McGivney adorns the chapel.

Grand Knight SK David Miller said about the experience, "We appreciate the efforts of JMJ Pregnancy Center and the openness of St. Ann Parish to honor the sanctity of life from its very beginning stages. As brother Knights, we can take pride in our privilege to protect expecting women and their unborn children."

As described in their media kit, "Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) is a volunteer-driven nonprofit dedicated to building and delivering hand-made, fully furnished beds to children in need.

SHP's mission is to tackle childhood bedlessness, which we estimate to affect nearly 3% of the population." While the February webinar "Council Focus Areas for the Next Four Months" <a href="https://goto.webcasts.com/viewer/event.jsp?ei=1655435">https://goto.webcasts.com/viewer/event.jsp?ei=1655435</a> suggests that a council provide funding, volunteers, and a large space with electricity to build 20 beds at \$250 each, councils can work with local Sleep in Heavenly Peace chapters (<a href="https://">https://</a>

<u>shpbeds.org/chapters/?state=Florida</u>) to support other scheduled "Build-A-Bed" events without providing funding or a suitable location.

On April 13, eight brother Knights and families of St. Thomas à Becket Council 16236, serving Incarnation parish and St. John Fisher quasiparish of the Personal Ordinariate of the Chair of St. Peter, supported a "Build-A-Bed" event at Lowe's Home Improvement in Fern Park north of Orlando. Over a four-hour period, volunteers cut, sanded, and completed sixty beds in an assembly line process. Brother Knights observed that while it was hard work, it provided a tangible impact for those in need, and they look forward to participating in future "Build-A-Bed" events.

Whether your council has the resources and location to fund and host a large-scale event or can work with your local Sleep in Heavenly Peace chapter to support an event in your area, brother Knights and families can put their Faith in Action and serve their community through a "Build-A-Bed" event.

Just a very festive celebration for the welcome home of the 85 veterans who flew into Washington DC to spend the day at the World War II Memorial.

On April 6, 2024, the Florida State Secretary, Michael P. Gizewski, had the honor and privilege of meeting two distinguished military veterans at the Honor Flight Reception at the Palm Beach

International Airport, West Palm Beach, Florida. The Veteran on the right of State Secretary Michael P. Gizewski served was at the shocking bombing of Pearl Harbor by Japanese fighter attack planes. The man to the left of the State Secretary was on the battleship USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay, where the Foreign Minister and General Yoshijiro Umezu signed their names on the document of surrender at 9:04 A.M. to General McArthur. He accepted the Japanese surrender for the United States, the Republic of China, the United Kingdom, and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republic and in the interest of other nations at war with Japan.

The event raised more than \$22,000, which will be divided among Father Lopez Catholic High School, Sacred Heart, St. Paul, St. Brendan, St. Peter and Lourdes Academy. In addition, the deanery will establish an endowment to help sustain long-term growth.

Leading the Council 8086 efforts were DGK Ernie Jackson and GK Roger Packard, working with Our Lady of Hope and Council Chaplain Father Matt Mello. Two dozen Knights worked the event in various capacities.

Knights from Father Downey Council 4934 provided additional Knight power, running the bank and a jail.

### Florida Bishops Oppose Extreme Abortion Amendment Vote No on Amendment 4

Florida Amendment 4, which will appear on Florida's November 2024 ballot, is an extreme proposal that legalizes full-term abortion with no protections for the preborn child, including when the child is capable of feeling pain. This proposed amendment to our state constitution would prohibit all restrictions on abortion before viability and create a broad exception that any healthcare provider could exploit to allow abortion up to birth.

Furthermore, the amendment would effectively overturn or seriously jeopardize common-sense state laws that have regulated abortion for years. These include basic health and safety requirements for clinics where abortions are performed, requiring a physician to perform abortions, informed consent requirements, laws limiting public funding of abortion, and parental consent requirements before a minor's abortion. These risks demonstrate the extreme nature of the amendment.

We urge all Floridians of goodwill to stand against the legalization of late-term abortion and oppose the abortion amendment. In doing so, we will not only protect the weakest, most innocent, and defenseless of human life among us but also countless women throughout the state from the harms of abortion.

Human life is sacred. The dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision of society. Direct attacks on innocent persons are never morally acceptable, at any stage or in any condition. In our state, human life is repeatedly being destroyed by abortion. Over 84,000 vulnerable and voiceless children were aborted in Florida in 2023.

This matter concerning the respect for human dignity and the fundamental value of human life is of grave importance to both our Church and our state. The threat of abortion remains our pre-eminent public policy priority. Therefore, we support a coordinated campaign to mobilize against the proposed amendment. To this end, we offer this prayer to defeat Amendment 4:

Ever-living God, you give life and desire a future for all your children. Take hold of our nation, state and community and awaken in every heart awe for the gift of life. Send your Spirit to strengthen us with wisdom and fortitude as we defend mothers and children in Florida from laws that disregard their health and safety.

Mary and Joseph trusted in you and welcomed Jesus into our broken world. God Almighty, we ask their intercession to protect the preborn and their mothers, and to guide all parents in raising their children. May they help us build a civilization of love by upholding the sacredness of life and accompanying pregnant women in need.

We ask this through Christ, our Lord. Amen.

### Obispos de la Florida se Oponen a la Enmienda Extrema sobre el Aborto Voten No en la Enmienda 4

La Enmienda 4 de la Florida, que aparecerá en la papeleta electoral de la Florida en noviembre de 2024, es una propuesta extrema que legaliza el aborto a término sin ninguna protección para el niño antes de nacer, incluso cuando el niño es capaz de sentir dolor. Esta propuesta para enmendar la constitución de nuestro estado prohibiría todas las restricciones al aborto antes de la viabilidad y crearía una amplia excepción que cualquier profesional de la salud podría aprovechar para permitir el aborto hasta el nacimiento.

Estos riesgos demuestran la naturaleza extrema de la enmienda.

Exhortamos a todos los floridanos de buena voluntad a que luchen contra la legalización del aborto tardío y se opongan a la enmienda sobre el aborto. Al hacerlo, no sólo protegeremos las vidas humanas más débiles, inocentes e indefensas entre nosotros, sino también a innumerables mujeres de todo el estado contra los daños del aborto.

La vida humana es sagrada. La dignidad de la persona humana es el cimiento de una visión moral de la sociedad. Los ataques directos a personas inocentes nunca son aceptables moralmente, en ninguna etapa ni condición. En nuestro estado, la vida humana se destruye repetidamente por el aborto. En 2023, más de 84,000 niños vulnerables y sin voz fueron abortados en la Florida.

Este asunto sobre el respeto de la dignidad humana y del valor fundamental de la vida humana es de gran importancia tanto para nuestra Iglesia como para nuestro estado. 
#### Prayer for the Canonization of Blessed Michael J. McGivney
