### Duck Derby Sets Funding Record



ur Lady of Hope Knights of Columbus Council 8086 sold a record 2,000 ducks for its seventh annual Duck Derby, held on the Port Orange City Center Lake during the recent Family Days.

The Duck Derby raised more than \$17,000 in donations and sponsorships, with funds benefiting the many Knights of Columbus charities supported by Council 8086. These include Coats for Kids, Vocations, Global Wheelchair Mission, Habitat for Humanity, Pregnancy Crisis Center and numerous parish and community youth programs.

The 2,000 plastic ducks were "liberated" on the City Center Lake, with Knights using a paddle boat and kayak to "rescue" four winning ducks. Our Lady of Hope Parochial Vicar Father Paul Dau won the \$1,000 first prize, which he donated back to the parish youth group and the Knights' Coats for Kids drive. Second was \$500, with \$200 for third and \$100 for fourth place.

Roger Packard is the council's Grand Knight, with Tim Mell directing the Duck Derby since its inception.



## A National Eucharistic Revival

s you are aware, we are in the second year of the National Eucharistic Revival. This is the Year of Parish Revival, and I hope and pray that you and your Councils are supporting the efforts of your pastors and parishes in renewing our collective faith in the Eucharist. In the words of the National Eucharistic Congress, the Revival is not something we DO; rather, it is a sovereign act of God. The Holy Spirit is asking us to respond to four invitations:

• A renewed attentiveness to HOW we worship.

• A renewed encounter with WHO we worship.

• To discover in greater depth WHY we worship Jesus in the Eucharist and what this incredible gift means.

• To ACT on our faith, bringing Christ to others and spreading the flame of revival.

As I have stated to those of you who have attended meetings on the Spirit of Unity Tour, the Knights of Columbus, by our

very charter, should not be bystanders when it comes to faith formation. Under the leadership of our Bishops, pastors, and chaplains, we should be a force for evangelization both within our faith communities and beyond.

That is why the Supreme Knight and the Supreme Chaplain have led the creation and implementation of the Order's Cor initiative, to help bring form and substance to the faith formation of Catholic men, both Knights and non-Knights. If you and your Council have not yet done so, please have a conversation with your pastor about how Cor might fit in with your parish. Sometimes the timing is right for the introduction of Cor, sometimes it is not. But it is important to have the discussion with your priests, and to ensure they understand the Knights' commitment to supporting the faith formation of Catholic men, whatever form it may take.

Speaking of Cor, a new video series is now available for Cor gatherings and other faith formation activities called "The Mission of the

> Family", consisting of about five episodes of 13 minutes each. It is a great series profession ally produced, well worth the time to watch and study. This, along with other Cor resources, are available from the Supreme website at www.kofc.org/cor.

As I said in last month's column, we will not be mailing individual appeals for our State Charities Funds this year, due to rising costs. We are asking all Councils to publicize this year's appeal through their Council communications for our Charities funds in Vocations, Helping Life, and Special Olympics.

Individual donations can be made online at <u>https://donate.floridakofccharities.org</u>/ or by clicking the red Donate button on the State website (<u>www.floridakofc.org</u>). I would also ask that each Council consider allocating at least part of



its charitable fundraising to one or more of these funds. We are especially in need of donations for our Holy Angels Vocations Fund, which supports our seminaries and Diocesan Vocations programs. Our collective support of the seminaries and the Bishops is an expression of the Spirit of Unity here in Florida. Our State Chaplain, along with the parish of St Agnes in Naples and Council 14202, have led the way this year, already raising over \$7,000 for the State Vocations Fund!

Our membership recruitment continues to be strong in Florida and across the Order! But there are still far too many Councils that have not yet recruited new members. With all the activities within our Councils and parishes in November and December, this is a prime opportunity to offer the gift of membership. Our commitment to faith formation, service programs, and protection for families should be appealing to every Catholic man. But the most common reason why men do not join the Order is because they are never asked. Our Supreme Knight has said that we grow the Order one man at a time, and the most important recruiting occurs on a personal basis. So, please do not be afraid to ask your fellow Catholic men to join the Order!

Again, I want to thank each and every Knight here in Florida for their prayers and their service to their parishes and communities, and for exemplifying the Principles of Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism in everything that they do. And remember--Star Council + Faith Formation = a Successful Council!

oon we will gather around tables with family and friends to celebrate one of the hallowed traditions of our nation ... Thanksgiving. Each time we gather for Mass, it is a thanksgiving. In fact, the Greek derived word for thanksgiving is "eucharist."

This month, particularly on All Souls Day and throughout the month, we recognize and pray for those who have gone before us in our families and in our Order. Many Knights Councils will follow the laudable custom of having a Mass celebrated for their deceased Knights. Some Councils have memorials or plaques dedicated to our deceased members. It's good to remember and pray for them.

The perpetual watch phrase of our order is Tempus Fugit; Memento Mori. Time flies, remember death. As Jesus cautions us, "you know neither the day nor the hour." (Mt 25:13) Tragic deaths leaving families in need were one of the realities faced by our founder Blessed Father Michael J. McGivney in his pastoral ministry, prompting him to help keep that Latin phrase in the consciousness of our first members. Each of us must come to terms with our own mortality.

We know that Jesus had great compassion for the dying and their families. He even restored life to the dead. From a little girl to his own friend Lazarus, and a young man whom we are told was the only son of a widow. This description clues us into the fact that the young man's mother would have been in dire straits in a culture where women were so tied to the support of a husband or, if he passed, to a son. Part of our call as Knights is to be champions for widows

and orphans in ways akin to Jesus and our founder.

In the spirit of Bl. Michael McGivney, may we not only remember the deceased but reach out to their survivors and care for their family members in need. When we look at St. Michael, we see he stands mighty before the Face of God. He stands before the Gates of


Paradise, which was the home for Adam and Eve. And, most of all, he is the Defender of the Faith.

### Council Supports St. Joseph Neighboor Center



fter a special guided tour through the reconstruction of the former St. Benedict the Moor Schoolhouse in St. Augustine, GK Bill Remy (right) and Dave Look (left) presented checks in the amount of \$2,200 to Sr. Kathleen Carr, General Superior of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Saint Augustine. This donation to the St. Joseph Neighborhood Center (SJNC) was made as part of the Supreme Council Aid and Support After Pregnancy (ASAP) program.

Under construction in Lincolnville, the historic schoolhouse is being completely rebuilt, with only the outer walls of the original school building remaining from 1898. The SJNC will be a support facility for young single mothers who face daily challenges of being the sole parent and sole provider for their family. In partnership with the Diocese of St. Augustine and Catholic Charities, the facility will offer career counseling, paid apprenticeships, mentoring, early child education and spiritual direction.

The Saint Joseph Neighborhood Center has received acceptance from the Supreme Council Life and Faith Program office as eligible for the ASAP grant assistance, which rebates 20% of all funds donated by a council or assembly to an approved ASAP organization. Although not technically "a qualifying non-profit pregnancy resource center or maternity home," the SJNC has been approved as eligible for ASAP grant funding due to its unique mission to serve young single mothers and their children.


