### CHAPLAIN'S COLUMN

### Deacon Tom Dwyer

This month, I finish listing the remaining three of eleven American saints. Already mentioned were: Elizabeth Ann Seton (Jan. 4); John Neumann (Jan. 5); Marianne Cope (Jan. 23); Katharine Drexel (Mar. 3); Damien de Veuster (May 1); Junípero Serra (July 1); Kateri Tekakwitha (July 14); Théodore Guérin (Oct. 3).

**St. Isaac Jogues (1607-1646)** A Jesuit priest from France, Jogues was a missionary to the Indians. Tortured and imprisoned by the Mohawks in his first mission, he survived and baptized some Native Americans before returning to France. He returned, even knowing he might not survive a second time. Killed in Auriesville, New York, he was named a saint in 1930. His feast day is Oct. 19th.



St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (1850-1917) A missionary from Italy, Cabrini founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. She left Italy to establish an orphanage in New York City. She travelled extensively throughout the U.S. and to Nicaragua, Brazil, Chile, Argentina, and Grenada to found orphanages, hospitals, convents, and schools. She made 24 transatlantic crossings, even booking passage on the Titanic, but switching to an earlier booking after hearing about problems with one of the order's hospitals in Chicago. Naturalized as a U.S. citizen, she was canonized a saint in 1946. Her feast day is Nov. 13th.

**St. Rose Philippine Duchesne, 1769-1852** Born in France, she joined the Visitation nuns at 19 before being forced to leave France during the French Revolution. Traveling to the Louisiana Territory, she was a missionary to Native Americans. She started the first free school for girls west of the Mississippi River and the first Catholic school for Native Americans. She was named a saint in 1988. Her feast day is Nov. 18th.

Mail the Mass Card to the Recipient (Healing) Family (Memorial).

This program reflects the core of our mission—charity, unity, and fraternity. A card featuring Blessed McGivney, accompanied by Mass and seminarians' prayers, is a powerful expression of support and faith.
