Welcome to the St Thomas More Council April Newsletter

Memorial Day is an American holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Memorial Day 2023 will occur on Monday, May 29. Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings and participating in parades. Unofficially, it marks the beginning of the summer season.

The origins of the holiday can be traced back to local observances for soldiers with neglected gravesites during the Civil War. The first observance of what would become Memorial Day, some historians think, took place in Charleston, S.C., at the site of a horse racing track that Confederates had turned into a prison holding Union prisoners. Blacks in the city organized a burial of deceased Union prisoners and built a fence around the site. Then on May 1, 1865, they held an event there including a parade. Blacks who fought in the Civil War, participated in spiritual readings, songs, and picnicking. A commemorative marker was erected there in 2010.

One of the first Decoration Days was held in Columbus, Mississippi, on April 25, 1866 by women who decorated graves of Confederate soldiers who perished in the battle at Shiloh with flowers. On May 5, 1868, three years after the end of the Civil War, the tradition of placing flowers on veterans' graves was continued by the establishment of Decoration Day by an organization of Union veterans, the Grand Army of the Republic. General Ulysses S. Grant presided over the first large observance, a crowd of about 5,000 people, at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia on May 30, 1873. The orphaned children of soldiers and sailors killed during the war placed flowers and small American flags atop both Union and Confederate graves throughout the entire cemetery.

The day that we celebrate Memorial Day is believed to be influenced by Illinois U.S. Representative John A. Logan, who was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives as a Democrat in November 1858, and served as an officer during the Mexican War. It is said that Logan, a staunch defender of the Union, believed Memorial Day should occur when flowers are in full bloom across the country. Congress passed an act making May 30 a holiday in the District of Columbia in 1888. Now Memorial Day is observed as the last Monday of May. In 2000 the National Moment of Remembrance Act, which created the White House Commission on the National Moment of Remembrance, encourages all to pause at 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day for a minute of silence and was signed into law by Congress and the President.




















April Knight of the Month

STM Capital Campaign

(This section will be a new and ongoing part of our Council newsletter. I will use this section to keep you aware of progress as it becomes available.)

Update on the Capital Campaign, "Our Church ... Our Future" The Active Phase of the campaign ended on March 31st, and as of our last count we raised \$2,293,237 in pledges across 492 donating households. Thanks to this outpouring of generosity, we are a majority of the way toward achieving our goal of\$2,500,000. These funds will help us replace the roofs in the Chelsea and Spirit Center, the HVACs across all three buildings, and support other improvements around campus to ensure the grounds are safe for our faith community.


As anyone who has stepped on campus over these past few months can attest, these necessary capital improvements are well underway. Most of the re-roofing work is nearing completion, and A/C replacements and related controls upgrades continue to be installed as they become available; due to supply chain shortages, this work will continue into the summer. Painting and other structural

refurbishments continue to be performed to plan, and we are anticipating work to commence on the walkway pavers here shortly. Depending upon whether or not there is capital campaign money leftover at the end of performing the major repairs and renovations, a list of nice-to-have capital projects collected from the feedback of campaign donors may become candidate for any remaining funds. However, prioritization of such projects, let alone whether funding will exist and should be directed toward these candidate ideas, cannot begin until (a) firm and final costs are paid on the primary scope of this campaign, and (b) it is certain that campaign pledges will translate into collected monies.

To date, we have collected \$947,268 of the above noted pledge total. We are off to a fantastic start! To help us continue this progress toward our goal, and ensure we can pay off all the work being done to carry St Thomas More into the future, we are seeking volunteers to help with the Redemption Phase of the project. The time frame of the Redemption Phase is April 2023 to March 2026. During that time, the Redemption Committee will oversee the communication and outreach necessary to support receipt of periodic pledge commitments, and keep the Parish informed about our status vs goal.

In support of the administrative efforts of the Redemption Committee, the Parish has been authorized to a hire part-time 'Campaign Secretary' (a 1099-based independent contractor). This individual must be able to make at minimum an 18-month commitment to the campaign and be able to work flexible hours each week in support of the Committee's and/or pledge timeline's needs. Qualified candidates will need to be well-organized, strong users of Microsoft Office (Word, Excel, and PowerPoint), comfortable working independently, and solid communicators. If this sounds like something you might be interested in, please reach out to the Parish office for a copy of the job description, and to send your resume along with your expression of interest. Special Olympics

There are many great opportunities coming up where you can volunteer to assist and participate. Brother John Cesare has done a fantastic job as Chairman of this committee through his leadership and communications of its activities. If you are interested in becoming involved in Special Olympics please reach out to Brother John Cesare for details how you can become a volunteer.

Current Outlook: During the last two years during COVID, Special Olympics went through some changes that affect the way we volunteer. This was due to a realignment of management, retirements, etc. which resulted in a consolidation of areas. I just want to bring you all up to date so that you are aware of the opportunities to volunteer. Be it a coach, which is more of a commitment. or be it one individual event for a day or a week. Sarasota County is now part of Area 7 which is comprised of 14 counties in the western part of the state. It comprises of the counties that report out of Bonita Springs. Stanley Sylverain is our contact relative to opportunities. He is responsible for Manatee, Sarasota, DeSoto, Highlands, and Charlotte counties. Lee, Collier, and Monroe counties are managed by a different person out of the same Bonita office. The other western counties are: Citrus, Sumter, Hernando, Pasco, Pinellas, and Hillsborough, all of which report out of Tampa. There is some overlap when regional or state tournaments take place and a call goes out for volunteers. The sports tentative scheduled dates are as follows: Tennis – Jan- May, Cycling, Soccer – Jan-May, Stand-Up Paddle –May-August, Bowling – May-Sept, Basketball-Oct.-Feb, Equestrian – Jan-April, and Swimming May-Oct. I receive a report monthly, which at time arrives with a reasonable amount of lead time to plan for a volunteer's time, and sometimes not enough lead time to make plans. Steve and I will keep you abreast of opportunities to volunteer so that you don't waste time in driving or showing up and have to leave because there are enough volunteers. It is important that you register on the on line portal and secure your volunteer selection. There are situations like bowling in which Al Ferrigno has embraced and has worked with person/persons that have made commitments to extend seasons. That is an exception. However, his position which is coaching requires class A status (fingerprinting, online training, and concussion protocol), and is a status that is ongoing. Single event volunteers do are not required to provide this as you can register for an event and signup at arrival or online. I appreciate your involvement in Special Olympics and thank you for your help.

Right to life

More and more families are suffering economic hardships and consequently more pregnant women are in need of the life-saving services and support provided by My Choice and Community Pregnancy Centers. As Knights we are dedicated to the sanctity of life. The "40 Days for Life 365" campaign provides each of us the

opportunity to participate 365 days a year. Our Council has been requested to participate at the Sarasota Planned Parenthood facility on the 4th Thursday of every month – from 9AM to 1PM. Please consider praying outside of the Planned Parenthood facility. Thanks to our Brothers for participating on our day to pray.

While amazing things happen every year in the blessed work of helping women and saving babies, the Dobbs decision from the Supreme Court and the overturning of Roe v. Wade has resulted in the need to help more pregnant women considering abortions. Florida recently passed a 6 week ban. It will take effect only if the state's current 15-week ban is upheld in an ongoing legal challenge that is before the state Supreme Court. The 15 week ban is currently in place in Florida, but abortions have actually increased this past year as our state has become an abortion destination. Most abortions occur prior to 15 weeks and our border states have tighter restrictions which means more women are coming to Florida for an abortion. For this reason, there is now a greater need to continue our prayer walks and our support of those pregnancy centers we now support. Please continue to **safely and peacefully** support the work we are already doing. Please remember that in accordance with K of C guidelines you cannot handout materials or confront someone entering Planned Parenthood unless you are approached by the person first for information. You are allowed to greet them and pray for them, but do not go beyond that unless they reach out to you.

A special "thanks" to Brothers Neil Corrado and Brian Harkins and their outstanding work in building our Right to Life program. We encourage you to join us on the 4th Thursday of every month in front of Planned Parenthood. Many have much less functionality than the doctor portrayed on the show. I mention this because many of us know of someone who is on this autism spectrum. If diagnosed early in childhood and intervention begun, those with autism may still live a relatively normal life. However, many with autism struggle and have other complicating medical or psychological issues and need much support during their lives. That's where the Knights of Columbus Family Fraternal Benefits may be able to help. The Family Fraternal Benefits cover a number of situations.
