


<u>Spiritual Advisor Message – SK Deacon Bruce Gesinski</u>

St. Valentine and Valentine's Day

We all know that February 14th is Valentine's Day, but do we know anything about the saint whose feast day is February 14th and for whom the day was named?

The origin of St. Valentine, and how many St. Valentines there were, remains a mystery. However, Valentine really existed because archaeologists have unearthed a Roman catacomb and an ancient church dedicated to Saint Valentine. The first representation of Saint Valentine appeared in The



Nuremberg Chronicle, a great illustrated book printed in 1493. Alongside a woodcut portrait of him, the text states that Valentinus was a Roman priest martyred during the reign of Claudius II.

Along with Saint Marius and his family, Saint Valentine assisted the martyrs during the persecution they suffered under the rule of Claudius II (also known as Claudius the Goth and Claudius the Cruel). In addition, since Rome was at the time involved in many bloody and unpopular campaigns, the emperor found it difficult to recruit the male populace into joining his military leagues. Believing this to be because Roman men were averse to leaving their loved ones or their families, Claudius cancelled all marriages and engagements within the City of Rome. Saint Valentine and Saint Marius, however, continued to perform wedding ceremonies in secret. When it was discovered that Saint Valentine was defying the emperor's decree, he was apprehended. Claudius took a liking to this prisoner -- until Valentinus made a strategic error: he tried to convert the Emperor -- whereupon this priest was condemned to death. He was dispatched by Claudius to the Prefect of Rome who, being unable to force the saint to renounce Christianity, ordered that Valentine be clubbed, stoned and then beheaded.

Saints are not supposed to rest in peace; they're expected to keep busy: to perform miracles, to intercede. Being in jail or dead is no excuse for non-performance of the supernatural. According to tradition, while Valentine waited in prison for his execution, he corresponded with those under his care by sending letters and love notes to his parishioners. It is also believed that while incarcerated, the Bishop fell in love with a young woman who visited him during his confinement. According to some sources, this was the blind daughter of Asterius, his jailer. It is said that God enabled Valentine to miraculously restore the girl's sight. Popular belief indicates that Valentine's farewell message to his love contained a closing that has now transcended time: "From Your Valentine."

Saint Valentine was executed on February 14 in 270 A.D. Later that same year, Pope Julius I is said to have

built a church near Ponte Mole in the saint's memory at a location once known as Porta Valentini and now called Porta del Popolo. The relic bones of this Saint Valentine, who may also have been a physician, are now housed within the Basilica of Saint Praxedes in Rome.

In 496 A.D., Pope Gelasius declared February 14 to be the Feast Day of Saint Valentine. Patron Saint of Lovers and Engaged Couples, with particular jurisdiction over the quarrels which arise between sweethearts. The patronage of Saint Valentine also extends to epilepsy (from which he is believed to have suffered), beekeepers, plague, greetings, travelers and young people. His representations include: birds, roses, a bishop with a crippled or epileptic child at his feet; a bishop with a rooster nearby; a bishop refusing to adore an idol; a bishop being beheaded; a priest bearing a sword; a priest holding a sun; and a priest bestowing sight upon a blind girl.

Mirrors: Self-Reflection and Repentance

The mirror is a cautionary symbol for hollow pursuits that lead the soul away from the divine path. It can teach humility and wise introspection. Gazed into excessively, it breeds narcissism and neglect of our faith. The classic example is Narcissus. He was the handsome Greek hunter who fell in love with his reflection. Ultimately, he wasted away and died worshipping himself.



Mirrors reflect light, but they also shed light on the sins of vanity and idolatry. Our attractive clothing, expensive cars, immaculate homes, successful businesses, fancy jewelry, and the latest gadgets are mirrors that reflect who we are. When put on display, we tell others to "look at me". Lately, American politics speaks volumes because every politician says and does things to draw attention to themselves.

Taking action to become more grounded, self-aware and compassionate will help us control our desire to be attached to worldly things that are born from too much self-love. Jesus taught us about self-denial and making sacrifices. Anything else is idolatry. Did you know that idolatry is mentioned more than 50 times in the Bible? In the Old Testament, the punishment was death. In the New Testament, St. Paul assured us that idolators will not inherit the kingdom.

Just as looking intently into a physical mirror reveals details we might otherwise miss, God's mirror exposes our innermost motives, thoughts, and beliefs. God's desire is that we draw near to hear His voice through the mirror of Scripture. Narcissus was a story about self-reflection. But the story doesn't end there. Scripture says, "Let us examine our ways and test them, and let us return to the Lord". (Lament. 3:40)

Napoleon Bonaparte is a great example of a narcissist who, at the end of his life, examined his ways, read Scripture, and repented. Born a Catholic, his self-interest and rise to power led to a lifelong conflict with Pope Pius VII. He arranged for the kidnapping of this pope and made him his prisoner just so that he could appoint bishops he wanted without papal approval. For this behavior, Napoleon was excommunicated. During his second exile on the island of St. Helena, he read his Bible.

When you look at the famous painting of Napoleon crossing the Alps, he is on his white horse. This painting is a lot like the one of Saul on the road to Damascus which is in St. Paul's Basilica. Jesus struck them both down.

Napoleon was considered one of the greatest military leaders in history. As such, he would be familiar with Sun Tzu's famous quote "If you know the enemy and know yourself, you need not fear the result of a hundred battles. If you know yourself but not the enemy, for every victory gained you will also suffer a defeat. If you know neither the enemy nor yourself, you will succumb in every battle". Shrouded in mystery, with no army to see let alone to fight, he was in awe of Christ. Suffering immensely from stomach cancer, he sought peace with Jesus because his battles were over, and he knew he was dying. Pope Pius VII, aware of Napoleon's suffering, sent a priest, Father Abbe Vignali, to St. Helena to help him.

During his time on the island, Napoleon was known to have said, "The Bible is no mere book, but it's a living creature with a power that conquers all who oppose it." Father Vignali spent about 20 months on St. Helena ministering to Napoleon before his death. He reported to the pope that Napoleon had indeed shown great remorse in his life. Napoleon even composed a will stating that he wanted to be buried according to the rites of the Catholic Church. Pius VII allowed Father Vignali to hear Napoleon's confession, and he was granted absolution. Reconciled with God, Napoleon died a week later.

Purification of our soul lies in looking to Jesus. It is not a better you that you need to see. It is Jesus you need to see. The more you look to Him, the more you will conform to His image. (Romans 8:29) So, in closing, I leave you with words from the Book of James: "Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like someone who looks at his face in a mirror and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like". (James 1: 23-25)

Knights of Columbus Supreme Council Update

The Sacred Heart of Jesus

Knights of Columbus launches its new Pilgrim Icon Program with a Sacred Heart Holy Hour (courtesy Knights of Columbus Communications Department)



The Knights of Columbus launched its new Pilgrim Icon Program centered on devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus with a Holy Hour on the first Friday of January — the day dedicated to the Sacred Heart each month — at St. Mary's Church in New Haven, the birthplace of the Order. During the January 3 event, which was organized by San Salvador Council 1, the official program icon was displayed, depicting Italian artist Pompeo Batoni's famous 1767 image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which is now located in the Church of the Gesù in Rome. This reproduction of the image is one of more than 300 icons, each bearing the apostolic blessing of Pope Francis, traveling around the world as part of the Pilgrim Icon Program.

Before the Holy Hour, Father Ryan Lerner, pastor in solidum of Blessed Michael McGivney Parish, celebrated a Mass for the feast of the Holy Name of Jesus. "The name of Jesus casts out fear, anxiety and distress; reminds us of our need for a Savior; instills trust, brings peace, and unites our hearts more closely to his Most Sacred Heart," Father Lerner said in his homily. "Through the Holy Name of Jesus, may we be drawn ever closer to him, allowing his name to purify and strengthen us on our pilgrim way." After Mass, Father Lerner led a Eucharistic Holy Hour that followed the Order's newly published <u>Sacred Heart Holy</u>



<u>Hour</u> booklet, which contains readings from Scripture and reflections from Pope Francis' new encyclical devoted to the Sacred Heart, <u>Dilexit Nos</u> (He Loved Us). The prayer service also included the recitation of the Divine Mercy Chaplet, prayers to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and time for silent prayer and adoration before the Blessed Sacrament.

The pope's encyclical and the Knights' new Pilgrim Icon Program both coincide with the 350th anniversary of the visions of the Sacred Heart received by the French nun St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, who first promoted the First Friday devotion and reported the 12 Promises of the Sacred Heart tied to the devotion. "In many ways, *Dilexit Nos* can serve as a mission statement for the Knights of Columbus in today's world," Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly wrote in his introduction to the holy hour booklet. "The pope observes that we live in a fragmented and divided society, but the heart of Christ is a unifying center. It is the source of truth and goodness that we all need."

On December 20, 2024, Pope Francis received Supreme Knight Kelly in a private audience at the Vatican where the supreme knight presented the pope with an icon and booklet for the Sacred Heart prayer service. He also provided the Holy Father with an update on notable activities of the Knights of Columbus in the past year, including the growth of the *Cor* men's faith formation initiative, charitable work around the world, and support for vocations in the United States and Canada.

For more than 45 years, the Knights of Columbus Pilgrim Icon Program has given more than 23 million people opportunities to honor Jesus, the Blessed Mother and the saints through 191,000 prayer services featuring icons of different subjects, such as Our Lady of Guadalupe, the Holy Family and St. Joseph. The Sacred Heart icon is the 20th image venerated through the program since 1979.

Supreme Knight Kelly has also encouraged families to enthrone images of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in their homes in response to Jesus' promise to St. Margaret Mary to "bless every place in which an image of my heart is exposed and honored." "As my brother Knights of Columbus bring reproductions of this beloved image to parishes around the world, I hope that they will invite their families — and all families — to consecrate their homes and themselves to the Sacred Heart," said the supreme knight. "In the heart of Christ, we see the heart of the Father. And we ask Our Lord to help us make his heart our own, so that we may see and love in others what he sees and loves in us."

U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Update

Jubilee 2025 - In February, we celebrate the Jubilee of Deacons



Jubilee 2025 invites you to be a pilgrim of hope. For Christians, hope is anchored in the encounter with Jesus whose life, death, and resurrection reveals God's transforming love. Our hope in God is renewed constantly in the gift of the Holy Spirit, the love of the Father and the Son, who is given, even now, to the community of believers.

The Holy See has designated a number of Jubilee Days throughout 2025 to recognize and celebrate different groups of people and various ministries in the Church. This month, among other Jubilee

Days, the Jubilee of Deacons will be held from Friday, February 21, to Sunday, February 23.

In the Catholic Church, the diaconate is one of three degrees in ordained ministry - bishops, priests, and deacons. Since the Second Vatican Council, the Latin-rite Church has restored the diaconate "as a proper and permanent rank of the hierarchy". Deacons preparing for the priesthood are transitional deacons, while those not planning to be ordained priests are permanent deacons. Permanent diaconate can be conferred on a single or married man. If he is married, he must be so before receiving the diaconate.

Lumen Gentium, after describing the function of presbyters as a participation in the priestly function of Christ, illustrates the ministry of deacons, "upon whom", it says, "hands are imposed not unto the priesthood, but unto a ministry of service." The Sacred Order of Deacons is to be a "driving force for the Church's service or diakonia toward the local Christian communities and as a sign or sacrament of the Lord Christ himself, who 'came not to be served but to serve.'" This is at the very heart of the diaconate: to be a servant of the mysteries of Christ and, at one and the same time, to be a servant of your brothers and sisters. That these two dimensions are inseparably joined together in one reality shows the important nature of the ministry of deacons.

In his 2021 address to deacons, Pope Francis expressed a greater focus on cultivating humility and generosity in ministry. Speaking to them, the Holy Father says he expects humble deacons, letting all good be a secret between him and God; he expects deacons to be good spouses, fathers, and grandfathers, inspiring others with their witness of joy in everything without complaining; he expects deacons to be sentinels, to both know the face of the poor and also help the Christian faithful recognize Jesus in them.

The deacon exercises his ministry within the communion and mission of a diocesan Church and in direct relationship with his diocesan bishop, under whose authority he is assigned, as a collaborator in the service of God's people. As collaborators in ministry, serving alongside priests, deacons participate in the one apostolic ministry bestowed by Christ upon the Apostles and their successors. "The diaconate is not an abridged or substitute form of the priesthood; it is a full order in its own right." We thank our deacons for ministering to us, the Knights of Columbus.

The Jubilee Year will offer the faithful opportunities to participate in various jubilee events at the Vatican and in their own dioceses. Pope Francis: Artificial Intelligence (AI) is a Human Creation to be Controlled by Humans (Courtesy Catholic News Services, Vatican City, January 23, 2025)

Artificial Intelligence (AI) or any other technology that worsens inequality around the world and increases fake news should not be embraced as "progress," Pope Francis told business and government leaders meeting in Davos, Switzerland at the World Economic Forum. "Technological developments that do not improve life for everyone, but instead create or worsen inequalities and conflicts, cannot be called true progress," he said. Pope Francis continued, that "AI should be placed at the service of a healthier, more human, more social and more integral development." Pope Francis' addressed to Klaus chairperson of the forum, was delivered by Cardinal Peter Turkson, chancellor of the Ponti-

The annual meeting in Davos from January 20 to 24 brought together leaders in business, government, academia and media to discuss security and cooperation; technology's impact on businesses and development; and safeguarding the planet. While the Catholic Church supports technological development as a result of God-given human creativity, "AI is intended to imitate the human intelligence that designed it, thus posing a unique set of questions and challenges," Pope Francis said in his message. Since "the results that AI can produce are almost indistinguishable from those of human beings," the pope wrote, questions must be raised about "its effect on the growing crisis of truth in the public forum."

Pope Francis also reiterated his concern about artificial intelligence and its use in weapons systems, health care and other life-and-death situations. "This technology," he wrote, "is designed to learn and make certain choices autonomously, adapting to new situations and providing answers not foreseen by its programmers, thus raising fundamental questions about ethical responsibility, human safety, and the broader implications of these developments for society."

Pope Francis noted that people need to be aware that AI really "is not an artificial form of human intelligence but a product of it." "When used correctly, AI assists the human person in fulfilling his or her vocation, in freedom and responsibility." But it is simply an assistant, he said, and not the answer to all the world's problems. Too often, Pope Francis wrote, "human dignity and fraternity are frequently subordinated in the pursuit of efficiency, as though reality, goodness, and truth inherently emanate from technological and economic power." "Human dignity must never be violated for the sake of efficiency," Pope Francis said. "As with all other human activity and technological development, AI must be ordered to the human person," he said. Citing the vision of true progress promoted in the Second Vatican Council's Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, Pope Francis insisted that AI should "become part of efforts to achieve 'greater justice, more extensive fraternity and a more humane order of social relations' which are 'more valuable than advances in the technical field."






