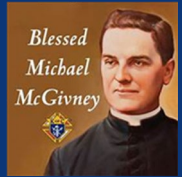

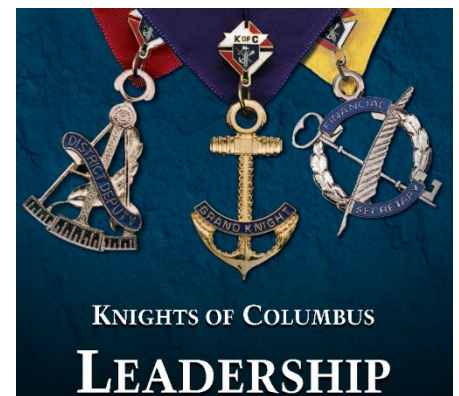


Deputy Grand Knight Message – SK Michael Ernst

Leadership That Lasts

"Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labor in vain." — Psalm 127:1

Most of what we discuss focuses on what we are doing this month or this year. Occasionally, it's important to step back and ask a longer-term question about how leadership itself is sustained — and whether what we are building is meant to last. True leadership is not measured by how well things run while we are here, but by whether they still run when we are gone. Every organization faces the same question: do we rely on a few capable individuals — or can leadership reproduce itself?



For the Knights of Columbus, this is a structural issue. The men we hope will lead are not less faithful or committed. They live under tighter constraints: careers, families, and responsibilities. Yet much of our design still assumes open availability for multiple commitments. This gap between design and real life is where capacity is tested. When filling roles requires pressure, the system is pushed beyond what it can sustain. That can produce burnout and withdrawal, not leadership.

The real challenge is design. Are we building an organization that fits the lives of modern Catholic men — or one that functions only when a few exceed their limits? The future of the Knights will not be shaped by how strongly we recruit, but by whether the structure we invite men into is sustainable.

Pro-Life Movement

The month of January holds significant meaning for the pro-life movement as it marks the anniversary of the 1973 *Roe v. Wade* Supreme Court decision. Since 1974, the March for Life has been held annually in Washington, D.C., around this date to serve as a peaceful protest and a "joyful witness" to the dignity of human life. Even following the 2022 *Dobbs* decision, which overturned *Roe v. Wade*, the march continues each January to advocate for legislative protections at both the state and federal levels and to foster a "culture of life" where abortion becomes unthinkable.



The Catholic Church has been a foundational supporter of the march since its inception. This support is rooted in the theological belief that human life is a gift from God that begins at conception and possesses inherent, unrepeatable dignity. Beyond the march itself, the Church emphasizes a "consistent ethic of life," connecting its anti-abortion stance to broader social justice efforts, such as supporting mothers in need through parish programs and advocating for the protection of all vulnerable populations. As Knights, we always support life.

The Divine Physician and a Christian Approach to Mental Health and Wellbeing

“May the God of peace himself sanctify you wholly; and may your spirit and soul and body be kept sound and blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.” 1 Thessalonians 5:23

To be Christian is to celebrate the coming into our midst of the Son of God, Jesus Christ. The mystery of the incarnation, of God’s personal entrance into history, and the good news of Christ’s revelation which we call the Gospel, changed everything. We have simply never been the same, for ever since our Lord’s life, death, and resurrection and the beginning of the Church’s mission, we have lived with an earnest hope for authentic and everlasting happiness.



Even before the advent of Christ, and before our definitive knowledge of God’s goodness and the possibility of heavenly peace, humanity knew that all was not well. We knew that we needed a Savior. Aristotle observed that every human person “pursues the good, or apparent good” in his or her actions. We all strive for goodness, or what we think will bring us happiness, but we also tend to confuse what is truly good with what only appears to be good. The very fact that we have trouble distinguishing objective goods from objective evils was a sign to the ancients of our brokenness. This helps explain why Aristotle also spoke of *hamartia*, literally meaning “to miss the mark,” to describe the basic tendency of the human person to fall short of perfection. In fact, the Gospels, in the original Greek, speak of *hamartia*, the modern word for which will be immediately recognizable: it is what we call sin, the rejection of God, the source of all good. The negative effects of our separation from him so obviously frustrate our natural desires for health, wellbeing, and lasting happiness. We see that even before Christ’s incarnation, humanity recognized it was “sick” and required divine intervention if minds and hearts were ever to be set right.

All of us experience the consequences of original sin. All of us experience the tendency to miss the mark and the sickness of mind and heart that results from our fallen condition. And all of us, in one way or another, experience crises that affect our mental health and wellbeing, threatening our capacity to experience the happiness and peace which God wishes for us. Fortunately, all of us (whether we realize it or not) also experience the desire for God’s grace, which acts like a divine medicine poured out as balm for our anxieties, hurts, and wounds.

As a priest and bishop, I have observed with increasing pastoral concern the emergence of a broad crisis concerning mental health that is negatively impacting Americans, and especially young people, in terms of their spiritual, mental, emotional, and physical wellbeing. The intent of this pastoral letter is therefore to offer encouragement and guidance, in light of the teachings of Christ and the Gospel, to all who wish to confront and overcome the modern world’s challenges to mental health and wellbeing. In this pastoral letter, I offer my reflections on the proper place of counseling in the Catholic life—when and in what manner we should make use of it in our pursuit of that authentic happiness that is holiness.

Knights of Columbus Supreme Council Update

Majority of Americans Continue to Support Legal Limits on Abortion; Most also support Pregnancy Resource Centers for Mothers and their Babies

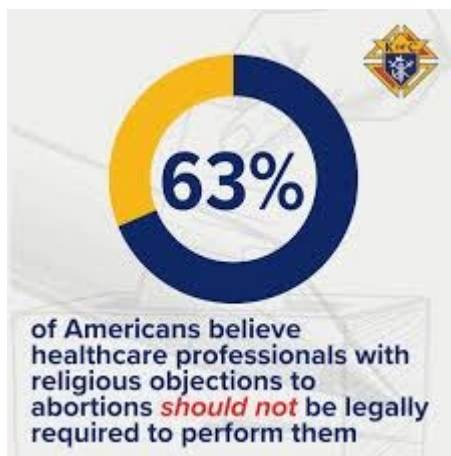

The 2026 Knights of Columbus-Marist Poll results, released on January 22, 2026, show that 67% of Americans support placing legal limits on abortion, and that 57% support limiting abortions to at most the first three months of pregnancy. This survey, conducted by the Marist Poll and commissioned annually by the Knights of Columbus, also found that 84% of Americans support pregnancy resource centers, which offer support to mothers both during their pregnancy and after their baby is born. Additionally, the poll found that 63% of Americans believe healthcare professionals with religious objections to abortions should not be legally required to perform them, while 88% of Americans believe that laws can protect both the mother and her unborn child.

"Despite the publicly heated debates about abortion, there remains a consensus of opinion on this issue among Americans. Americans believe abortion should be limited yet include exceptions for rape, incest, or to save the life of the mother," says Dr. Barbara L. Carvalho, Director of the Marist Poll. "Despite the changes in practice that have occurred since the Supreme Court's landmark Dobbs decision, public opinion has remained consistent." "Once again, most Americans are steadfast in their belief that abortion should be significantly limited yet laws should include exceptions for rape, incest, or to save the life of the mother," says Dr. Barbara L. Carvalho, Director of the Marist Poll. "This clear trend found in the annual Knights of Columbus-Marist Poll has continued, nearly two years after the Supreme Court's landmark Dobbs decision."



"The Knights of Columbus-Marist Poll continues to show that a majority of Americans support legal restrictions on abortion. At the same time, a growing majority support pregnancy resource centers, which provide assistance to mothers and their children in their time of greatest need," said Knights of Columbus Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly. He continued, "The Knights have supported vulnerable women and their children since our founding by Blessed Michael McGivney more than 140 years ago, and our commitment has never wavered. And now, we're guided by the encouraging words of Pope Leo XIV, who recently mentioned in his "State of the World" address, 'life is a priceless gift,' and that, as Catholics, we have a 'fundamental ethical imperative' to 'welcome and fully care for unborn life.' The Knights of Columbus' mission will continue to be guided by these principles until abortion becomes unthinkable."

Knights across the United States have raised more than \$19 million to support vital pregnancy resource centers through our ASAP, or *Aid and Support After Pregnancy* program. Knights have also funded the purchase of over 2,000 ultrasound machines, which empower mothers to see their unborn babies.

Note: This national survey of 1,408 adults was conducted January 12 through January 13, 2026, by the Marist Poll sponsored in partnership with the Knights of Columbus. Adults 18 years of age and older residing in the United States were contacted through a multi-mode design: By phone using live interviewers, by text, or online. All potential respondents were screened for age. To ensure representativeness, data was balanced to match current estimates for the adult population by region, age, gender, education, income, race and ethnicity using the U.S. Census Bureau information.

This month's Bible Verse:

My brother Knights of Columbus, now that we have entered the month of January and stand at the midpoint of our fraternal year, we are presented with a powerful and grace-filled opportunity. U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Update

“Our United Prayers, Sacrifices, and Efforts To Protect Human Life and Heal the Wounds Inflicted by Abortion Remain as Important as Ever,” says Bishop Daniel E. Thomas

“We must continue to support pregnant and parenting mothers in need and offer spiritual and emotional help to all who have participated in abortion,” said Bishop Daniel E. Thomas, Chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops’ Committee on Pro-Life Activities, marking the 53rd anniversary of the decision by the Supreme Court of the United States in *Roe v. Wade* that legalized abortion nationwide. Noting there have been several pro-life victories since *Roe* was overturned in 2022, he cautioned that human life is still gravely threatened by legalized abortion as it continues to be aggressively promoted at the state and federal level.

Bishop Thomas’ full statement follows: “January 22 marks the anniversary of the tragic U.S. Supreme Court decision, *Roe v. Wade*, that legalized abortion nationwide and led to the loss of over 65 million children and immeasurable harm to their parents and family members. This solemn day is commemorated each year with the observance of the Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children for prayer, penance, and our personal recommitment to the cause of life.

“We continue to give thanks to God for the opportunity to defend human life in law through the overturn of *Roe* in 2022. Since that time, we have seen several pro-life victories. Most recently, at the national level, Congress acted heroically last year in largely defunding Planned Parenthood of federal taxpayer dollars. Meanwhile the Administration has reversed several of its predecessor’s pro-abortion policies. “Despite these successes, human life is still gravely threatened by legalized abortion as it continues to be aggressively promoted at the state and federal level. Many challenges remain, including pro-abortion ballot initiatives, the increased use and availability of abortion pills, and the need to protect the Hyde Amendment to keep taxpayer funded abortion out of national health care bills. We must continue to support pregnant and parenting mothers in need and offer spiritual and emotional help to all who have participated in abortion. Our united prayers, sacrifices, and efforts to protect human life and heal the wounds inflicted by abortion remain as important as ever.”

“As our Holy Father Pope Leo XIV has said, ‘God’s mercy calls us to protect every life, especially those society overlooks—the child yet to be born and the elderly nearing their journey’s end—because each bears Christ’s face.’ “May we see the face of Christ in every single person, in every pregnant mother, and every child in the womb. Let us remain steadfast in our commitment to ensure that every human life may be protected in law and welcomed in love, and that abortion may be unthinkable.”

Vatican Update

God speaks to the faithful; take time to listen every day, Pope says

If Christians are to speak about God, then they must dedicate time each day and week to listening to God's word in prayer and the liturgy, Pope Leo XIV said. "We are called to live and cultivate friendship with the Lord" through prayer, he said on January 14 during his weekly general audience.

"This is achieved first of all in liturgical and community prayer, in which we do not decide what to hear from the Word of God, but it is he himself who speaks to us through the Church," he said. "It is then achieved in personal prayer, which takes place in the interiority of the heart and mind."

"Time dedicated to prayer, meditation and reflection cannot be lacking in the Christian's day and week," he said. "Only when we speak with God can we also speak about him." Speaking to visitors gathered in the Paul VI Audience Hall for the general audience, the Pope continued a new series of talks dedicated to the Second Vatican Council, which "rediscovered the face of God as the Father who, in Christ, calls us to be his children," Pope Leo said in his first talk introducing the series on January 7.

Pope Leo dedicated his January 14 catechesis to the Vatican II Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation, "Dei Verbum," calling it "one of the most beautiful and important" documents of the council. The document, published in 1965, affirms "a fundamental point of Christian faith," that "Jesus Christ radically transforms man's relationship with God," who is no longer invisible or distant, but has been made flesh, he said. Out of the abundance of his love, the Lord "speaks to men as friends and lives among them, so that he may invite and take them into fellowship with himself," he said. "The only condition of the New Covenant is love."

While the Covenant is eternal, and "nothing can separate us from his love," the revelation of God has "the dialogical nature of friendship," which "does not tolerate silence, but is nurtured by the exchange of true words," he said.

Just as human friendships can end with "a dramatic gesture of rupture or because of a series of daily acts of neglect that erode the relationship until it is lost," one's friendship with Jesus must be cultivated and cared for daily, Pope Leo said.



Therefore, the first step is to cultivate an "attitude of listening, so that the divine Word may penetrate our minds and our hearts," the Pope said. "At the same time, we are required to speak with God, not to communicate to him what he already knows, but to reveal ourselves to ourselves." "If Jesus calls us to be friends, let us not leave this call unheeded," he said, adding "Let us take care of this relationship, and we will discover that friendship with God is our salvation."

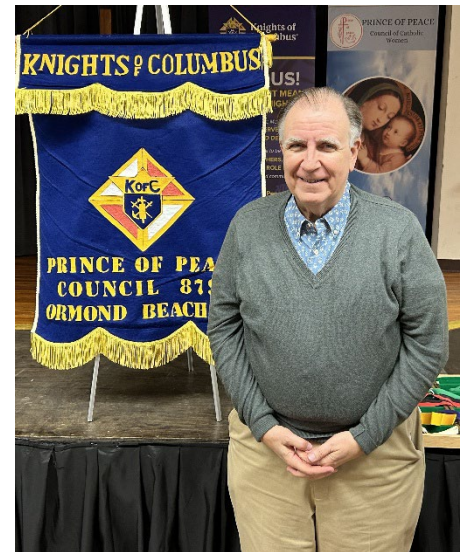
Recruit and Welcome New Knights

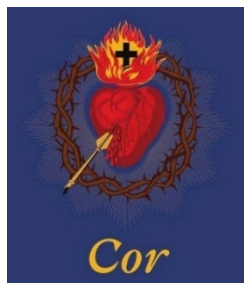

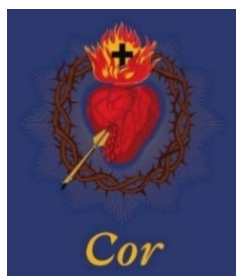




Upcoming Activities: Veterans; Cor; Breakfast; Fish Dinners; Monastery Retreat; 60th Anniversary

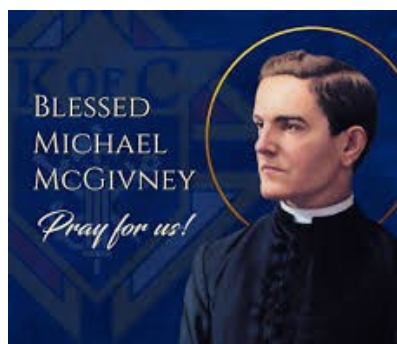
