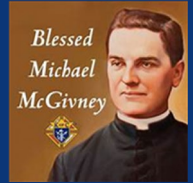

District Deputy Message – SK Charles Armstrong

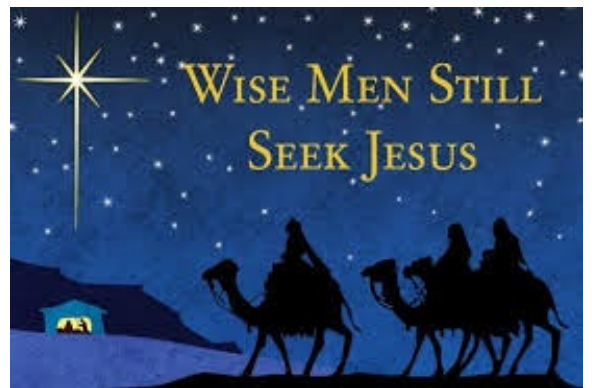

Spiritual Advisor Message – SK Deacon Bruce Gesinski

An Epiphany

We probably all know the story of the Magi, and how they brought the baby Jesus gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. “When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, “Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage.” When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They said to him, “In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: ‘And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel.’” We might even remember that the wise men told King Herod they would tell him when they found the newborn Jewish King so that Herod could come and pay him homage also. “Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star’s appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, “Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage.”



After their audience with the king, they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary, His mother. They prostrated themselves and did Him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered Him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.” But after having visited the baby Jesus they were warned in a dream not to return to Herod. “And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.” (Matthew 2:1–12)

The magi’s detour on the way home is an example of what happens in our lives when we encounter Christ ourselves. Pope Gregory the Great said, “Having come to know Jesus, we are forbidden to return by the way

we came." An instructor of mine put it well, "Once we have the information, the knowledge, we can no longer act as if we didn't. Our lives have changed. After meeting our Savior, our old way of living life is no longer an option. The knowledge of the love of God enters our souls. We can no longer satisfy our desires with our old way of life. We can only be satisfied with The Way, The Truth, and The Life who is Jesus."

Choosing a new path is not without sacrifice. The three wise men had to take unfamiliar roads to return home. They forfeited the safety of a planned route in order to save the newborn King. Like the magi, our new knowledge may force us to choose between what's easy and what's right. While the right choice may inconvenience us, it will always glorify God.

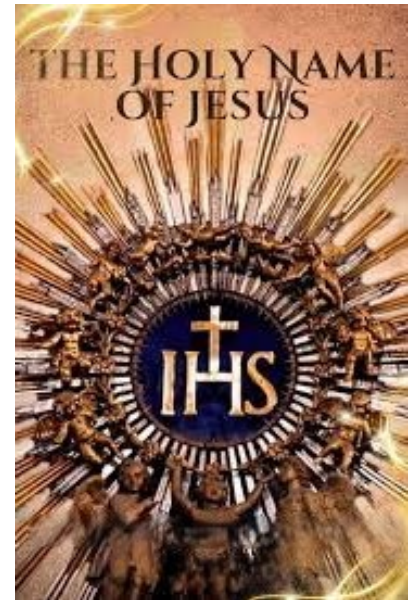

The Holy Name of Jesus

On January 3, the Church celebrates the Memorial of the Holy Name of Jesus. This memorial was eliminated from the liturgical calendar in the reforms that took place after the Second Vatican Council. In the reforms, the Holy Name of Jesus was moved to a votive mass that a priest could celebrate at his discretion on open weekdays in Ordinary Time. This meant that few priests, and fewer of the faithful, would mark their calendar for it each year. In 2002, Saint John Paul II reinstituted the memorial.

Today, we live in a secular age that seeks to separate faith from life. Matthew Kelly (2021) talks about the 4-isms that are ruining your life: individualism, hedonism, minimalism, and materialism. According to the National Catholic Register (2022), Father Roger Landry says that "even within the Church, there is sometimes a powerful push for assimilation with cultural elites and conformism with prevailing ideas, such that we lose our distinctiveness, speak of Jesus less explicitly, and begin to behave and speak like a charitable association calling people to goodness rather than to God". And Catholic educational institutions speak of "values" and "traditions" instead of authentically Christian faith and morals.



Christian persecution goes back a long way. In the Acts of the Apostles, the Sanhedrin, after flogging the Apostles Peter and John, forbade them "not to speak or teach at all in the name of Jesus" (Acts 4:18, 5:40). This prohibition still occurs in various countries today where Christians are not given religious freedom. In many places with full religious liberty, Christians do not speak or teach in Jesus' name by choice or custom. The United States is such a place. American youth have become so accustomed to thinking, speaking and acting in ways that are increasingly like that of the world. No matter where I go, I constantly hear God's name being misused and spoken of in vain. Even profane language is off the charts. It's so common that most people don't even notice. Why would they when it's in TV programming, movies, music, Tik Tok videos and novels.

According to Exodus 20.7, "You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses his name." Jesus wants us to pray in his name, promising that whatever we ask the Father in his name he will give us (John 14:13; 15:16; 16:23) and that whenever two or three are gathered in his name, he will be present in our midst (Matthew 18:20). To pray in Jesus' name is to do more than finish our prayers by saying "through Christ our Lord." It means to pray in communion with the person of Jesus, to turn to the Father together with the Son. The Catechism states that "the name of Jesus is at the heart of Christian prayer" (CCC 435) and "is the simplest way of praying always" (CCC 2668). I don't understand why Vatican II thought it was wise to remove the memorial of the Holy Name of Jesus. Evidently, Saint John Paul II agreed since he reinstated it.

Jesus wants us to act and preach in his name (Acts 9:15; 9:27). He gave the apostles the ability to work miracles (Mark 16:17; Acts 3:6). He warned us that we would be hated and persecuted because of his name (Luke 21:12; John 15:21; Acts 21:13). But through those sufferings, we would be more united to him and to his work, as those hardships would be pulpits by which we could more greatly witness to his saving mission. He also said we should know him through his name so well that we should recognize various imposters who would falsely invoke his name to deceive us and others (Matthew 24:5; Luke 21:8).

Saint Paul urged people to have the same mindset as Jesus, who humbled himself to death on the cross but “God greatly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father” (Philippians 2:6-11). In the history of the Church, many saints helped spread devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus through litanies, prayers, writings and devotions. The month of January is traditionally dedicated to Jesus’ Holy Name.

Knights of Columbus Supreme Council Update

A Light to the World: The Holy See Mission’s 60 years at the United Nations

Ban Ki-moon, then Secretary General of the United Nations, greeted Pope Francis before the Holy Father addressed world leaders gathered for the U.N.’s annual General Assembly in New York City on September 25, 2015. “Your Holiness,” he said, “welcome to the pulpit of the world.” It was the fifth time a pope had spoken from that unique pulpit since the Holy See attained permanent observer status at the United Nations in 1964. For the past 60 years, the Holy See Mission to the United Nations has worked diligently and creatively to give global resonance to the Church’s teachings and perspective.

Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly noted the 60th Anniversary in his annual report in August, saying, “To celebrate

this milestone, we're strengthening our long history of support for the Mission, as it brings the Church's prophetic voice to the world stage." To this end, the Knights of Columbus Board of Directors pledged last spring to financially assist the Holy See Mission in renovating its New York City office — 30 years after the Order helped to acquire the building as a gift to Pope John Paul II.

The Holy See Mission is currently led by Archbishop Gabriele Caccia, appointed permanent observer by Pope Francis in 2020. Archbishop Caccia, a native of Italy and a longtime member of the Holy See's diplomatic corps, spoke about the history and purpose of the mission and some of the ways that the Order has shown its support.

COLUMBIA: What is the primary purpose of the Holy See Mission to the U.N.?

ARCHBISHOP CACCIA: I would like to begin by quoting a message that Saint John Paul II addressed to Mr. Javier Pérez de Cuéllar, then secretary general of the U.N., in 1989: "It was in 1964 that my predecessor, Paul VI, chose to establish an ad hoc Mission to the United Nations. He did this in light of new orientations that were taking place within the Church, and in response to the appreciation which the international community had long manifested with regard to the Holy See's efforts in favor of peace and solidarity among the nations. By sending an Observer to your Organization, he intended to demonstrate the Holy See's concern for all initiatives aimed at promoting the human, social, cultural, political and moral growth of the community of nations. He likewise desired to make the Church's contribution more effective within the United Nations' deliberations on matters of world concern."

COLUMBIA: What role has the Knights of Columbus played in supporting the Mission of the Holy See to the U.N. in recent decades?

ARCHBISHOP CACCIA: First, we are immensely grateful to the Knights of Columbus because, as indicated on the plaque at the entrance to our offices: "This building was acquired through the special generosity of the Knights of Columbus as a gift to His Holiness Pope John Paul II as a means of assisting him in calling the family of nations to walk together on the path to peace." Since then, the support the Knights has offered to the Holy See Mission has been constant and enabled many initiatives. Only recently we received a very generous contribution to start important renovation work needed to ensure that our building is brought up to the regulatory standards of New York City.

In addition to material assistance with the buildings and programs of the Holy See Mission, the Knights of Columbus has also made a very real human contribution. The present Supreme Knight, Patrick Kelly, was an intern at the mission and contributed to its work with generosity and dedication. In fact, I am pleased to be able to say that the strong faith, good character and lively intelligence that marked Patrick Kelly's contribution as an intern are hallmarks of the successive groups of the wonderful young Catholics whom we welcome each year. The generous contribution of the Knights of Columbus ensures they are able to be with us in New York and contribute firsthand to the Holy See's mission in the international arena.

COLUMBIA: Is there anything else you would like to share with Knights of Columbus worldwide and their families?

ARCHBISHOP CACCIA: I came to know well the activity of the Knights of Columbus in my previous mission in the Philippines. I especially appreciate the way in which the Knights try to implement the teachings of the Church in the daily life of their members so as to build a better society for all, especially for those who are in greatest need. I encourage each and every member to rediscover the beauty and the importance of their call and to engage with generosity at all levels with the spirit of your founder, Blessed Michael McGivney. I have been privileged to witness this here in the United States and in other parts of the world, and I want to express the sincere gratitude of the Holy See and my own. May God bless you all!



U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Update

Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope



As the Universal Church looks toward the Jubilee Year 2025 (the 2,025th anniversary of the Incarnation of our Lord), the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) is thrilled to support the Holy Father in this "event of great spiritual, ecclesial, and social significance in the life of the Church." As Pope Francis stated in his February 2022 letter announcing the Jubilee 2025, "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision. The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire..."

The Jubilee Year will offer the faithful opportunities to participate in various jubilee events at the Vatican and in their own dioceses. The great tradition of opening the Holy Door began when Pope Francis opened the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica last month on December 24. Other holy doors will be opened at the Rome basilicas of St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major, and St. Paul Outside the Walls. For pilgrims who cannot travel to Rome, bishops around the world are expected to designate their cathedrals or a popular Catholic shrine as special places of prayer for Holy Year pilgrims, offering opportunities for reconciliation, indulgences and other events intended to strengthen and revive faith.

Blood Drives.

Our last Blood Drive on Sunday, November 24 was successful. We collected 19 pints, with 22 individuals attempting to give, exceeding our Council's monthly goal of 14 pints. We have donated 51 pints so far this Fraternal Year toward our goal of 90 pints. The next Blood Drive will be Sunday, January 26. 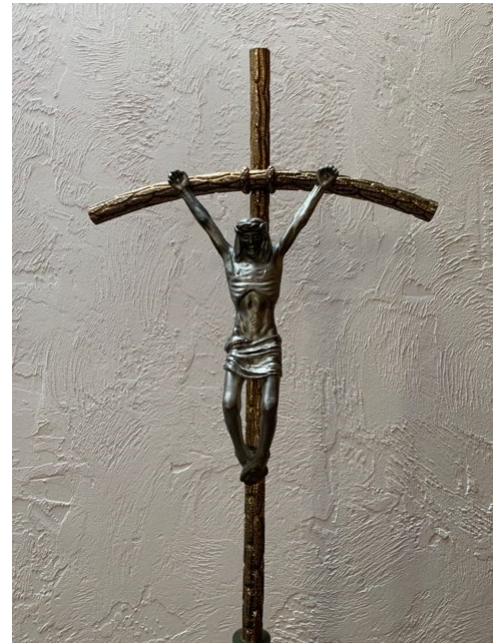

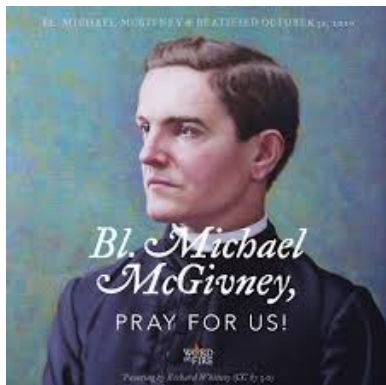
