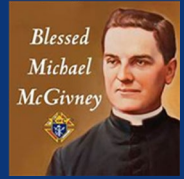

The Solemnity of the Epiphany

On Sunday, January 4, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Epiphany of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. It is that moment in salvation history when the Christ – who is “God from God, light from light, true God from true God” – is revealed, as the fulfillment of all that God had promised to his people Israel, and as the true light which enlightens everyone coming into the world, and more than that, as the One who is the light of the world. Thus did Isaiah prophesy about the Child hidden in a cave at Bethlehem: “Nations [said he] shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance.” Those searching for the light, those seeking the Truth, he prophesies, will be drawn from afar by the Child who is Son of God and Son of Mary. Let us therefore allow the mystery of the Epiphany to illuminate our heart and to guide our steps into a future full of hope.



The Magi v. Herod

In the Gospel reading from St. Matthew, the Magi seem to arrive in Judea suddenly, as if they spotted the star in the night sky, dropped everything and came to investigate. In fact, the Magi had spent their lives diligently and sincerely searching for the Truth. In doing so, they were not trying to make a name for themselves or to satisfy their curiosity. They had no desire to subordinate the truth to ambition or worldly desire. They were searching for the Truth so that they could entrust themselves to it. When they found what they were searching for, they came in adoration. They opened their gifts of gold – gold for the King of kings, frankincense – for they worshipped the newborn Child as God, and myrrh to foretell Jesus’ saving death and burial. In opening their gifts, they opened their minds and hearts to the light of faith – opened them in adoration, in praise and thanksgiving, in humility and love.

In this, they represent untold numbers of women and men who have searched for the Truth, and when they found it, entrusted themselves to it. I might mention St. Ignatius of Loyola who encountered the Lord as he lay recovering from a wound – and thereupon gathered around himself a Society, the Society of Jesus, to proclaim the Name above every other name. Or I might mention Edith Stein, a brilliant Jewish philosopher and convert. In the early 20th century, she discovered in Christ the light for which she searched, entered the Church, and became a disalced Carmelite nun taking the name of St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross. In 1943, she was martyred at Auschwitz – doubly a target of Nazi terrorism because of her Jewish heritage and her Christian faith. Both Ignatius and St. Theresa Benedicta are examples of those who searched for the Lord and gave themselves wholly to the Truth without ulterior motives but only because they were drawn to the Light of lights. Therefore, let us not say that the story of the Magi is a bit of biblical piety without reference or bearing upon our lives! The light of the faith shines brightly and still calls us, even as it called the Magi, to worship the Lord in spirit and truth,

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and in so doing to find our true joy, our dignity, and indeed our destiny one day to share fully in the eternal brightness of God's Triune glory.

And let the tragic figure of King Herod be a salutary warning for us. When the Wise Men saw the star in the East, they came from afar in search of the Christ-child to do him homage. If Herod had gone up on the terrace of his palace, he too would have seen the night sky bright with the glory of God. If his heart were open to the truth, he too would have searched for the meaning of the stars. Instead, he chose to entomb himself in his own illusions of power and grandeur. When news of a newborn King reached him, he was disturbed and immediately began to plot how he might do away with him. Far from searching for the truth, Herod was afraid of it because he was an unjust ruler who exercised power only for his own benefit, and therefore, could not tolerate a rival, even an Infant lying in a manger. The wise and learned Magi must have sensed Herod's utter self-centeredness and, therefore, were disposed to the message they received to avoid meeting him again. Let Herod stand for those who use religion for their own ambitions, those who instrumentalize the faith for political or economic gain, those who put on the faith when it suits their own petty goals and pettier illusions. If it is the Truth for which we are searching, we can apprehend it only on its own terms, not ours. In the end, we do not capture truth. It overtakes us. God surprises us with joy.

The King of Love My Shepherd Is

The King whom Herod mistook as an earthly rival came, not to exercise political or military power, but to be our Shepherd. He came to gather us and indeed the whole world in the fertile pastures of his love. Those pastures are not the rolling hills of some mythical land, some utopia or another, but rather the green pastures of his merciful heart where you and I can graze in safety and "grow in age and grace". If we have come in search of the light, if we have come to seek the Truth, we may find it here, hidden in the Eucharist, hidden in the form of bread and wine. Our Truth, our light, our good grazing ground is found in the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Christ whom we both adore and receive, just as the Magi adored and received the Child whom they encountered in the arms of Mary, his Mother. So too, may we seek and find the Christ in the heart of our Mother, the Church, and finding him, let us adore him in the Eucharist and receive him with faith.

Stronger Than a Scoreboard

During the 126th annual Army-Navy Game on Dec. 13, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly and Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori led college Knights from the U.S. Military Academy and the U.S. Naval Academy in praying a rosary at halftime.

With the Black Knights holding a 13-7 lead at the break, cadets and midshipmen alike left their rivalry on the field to unite in a public display of faith and fraternity. Approximately 250 people gathered in a stadium concourse to pray the rosary, organized for the second consecutive year by Knights from Msgr. Cornelius George O'Keefe Council 8250 at West Point, New

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York, and Commodore Barry Council 14534 at Annapolis, Maryland, with support from the Supreme Council.

“It is so wonderful that you are here — *Pro Deo et Patria*, for God and country,” said Supreme Knight Kelly, referencing the motto of the Army Chaplain Corps. “We live in a great country where we can do this — practice our faith in public. And we can do it because we have the armed forces to protect these freedoms.” Also joining the rosary were Archbishop Timothy Broglio of the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA; Supreme Master Michael McCusker, a retired U.S. Army major; and Catholic leaders from both academies.

Since before World War I, the Knights of Columbus has supported the spiritual and temporal well-being of servicemen and women, a mission that continues today. For more than a decade, the Order has partnered with the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA, to sponsor the annual Warriors to Lourdes pilgrimage and has distributed more than 700,000 copies of *Armed with the Faith*, the Order’s military prayer book. The Knights also sponsor a scholarship program that supports the archdiocese’s Co-Sponsored Seminarian Program, which helps fund

the education of seminarians preparing to serve as Catholic chaplains in the U.S. armed forces. This year, the Order celebrated the 125th anniversary of the Fourth Degree, the patriotic degree of the Knights of Columbus.

The Supreme Knight, a former U.S. Navy officer, concluded his remarks at the rosary event with a bit of humor that turned out to be prophetic. “We all know that God is a just judge, and sometimes he sends rain on ... the Navy, and sometimes on the Army,” Supreme Knight Kelly said. “The only thing I can leave you with is this: Go Navy, beat Army.” The final score: Navy 17, Army 16.

Supreme Chaplain’s Monthly Challenge for January

Archbishop William Lori, Supreme Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus, each month selects a brief passage from the Gospel reading of one of the Sunday Masses. Archbishop Lori shares a brief reflection on the passage and issues a challenge for men to live for the month. Men undertaking the challenge can gather as a group and share their experiences living the challenge. The Supreme Chaplain’s Monthly Challenge is suited for *Cor* or may also be done individually. By taking up the Supreme Chaplain’s Monthly Challenge, men take direct, concrete action to grow in their faith and help their brothers do so as well.

This month’s Bible Verse:

“And on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage.” (Matt 2:11a)

The solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord recalls the visit of the Magi to the infant Jesus. The Magi recognize the newborn king and offer him homage. This great feast occurs during the liturgical season of Christmas, which begins on Christmas Eve and continues through the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. During Christmas

time, we all remember and celebrate the reality that God assumed our human nature and became a little child. May this season also remind us to recognize the dignity of all children — including unborn children — today.

U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Update

Changes are expected this year among the Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops: Pope Leo XIV accepts Resignation of Bishop Gerald Barbarito of the Diocese of Palm Beach; Appoints Reverend Manuel de Jesus Rodriguez as Successor

Bishops are required by Canon Law to submit their resignation to the Pope upon obtaining the age of 75, although the Pope has discretion as to whether to accept the resignation. There are several bishops in Florida who are at or near that milestone age, and we may expect several leadership changes within the Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops this year. Archbishop Thomas Wenski, Archbishop of Miami, turned 75 in October 2025. Bishop John Noonan, Bishop of Orlando, turns 75 in February 2026.



Pope Leo XIV has accepted the resignation of Bishop Gerald M. Barbarito, 75, from the pastoral governance of the Diocese of Palm Beach, and has appointed Reverend Manuel de Jesus Rodriguez, as Bishop-elect of Palm Beach. Father Rodriguez is a priest of the Diocese of Brooklyn and currently serves as pastor of Our Lady of Sorrows Church in Corona (Queens), New York since 2020. Father Rodriguez was ordained to the priesthood on July 3, 2004, in the Dominican Republic, and was incardinated into the Diocese of Brooklyn in 2012. Bishop-elect Rodriguez speaks English, Spanish, French, and Italian.

Vatican Update

Curia must reflect 'new humanity,' founded on love, solidarity, Pope says

The cardinals, bishops, priests, religious and laypeople who work in the Roman Curia are called to be a "sign of a new humanity," founded on mutual love and solidarity, not selfishness and individualism, Pope Leo XIV said. "We are not mere gardeners tending our own plot, but disciples and witnesses of the Kingdom of God, called in Christ to be leaven of universal fraternity among different peoples, religions and cultures," he told cardinals and top Curia officials Dec. 22 during a traditional pre-Christmas meeting with them. "This happens if we ourselves live as brothers and sisters and allow the light of communion to shine in the world," the Pope

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said. "Let us remember this also in our curial service: the work of each is important for the whole, and the witness of a Christian life, expressed in communion, is the first and greatest service we can offer."

The traditional Christmas greeting took place in the Vatican's Hall of Blessing, which was decorated with red poinsettias and Christmas trees adorned with sparkling lights and silver and gold ornaments. While previous popes used the pre-Christmas meeting to review the past year, Pope Leo continued Pope Francis' practice of using it as an opportunity to reflect on what can help or hinder the Curia's mission of sharing the Gospel. Cardinal Giovanni Battista Re, dean of the College of Cardinals, offered a brief summary of the past eight months of Pope Leo's ministry in his opening remarks. Speaking in Italian, Pope Leo said he wanted to take a moment to remember Pope Francis, who passed away April 21 after 12 years as head of the universal church. "His prophetic voice, pastoral style and rich magisterium have marked the church's journey in recent years, encouraging us above all to place God's mercy at the center, to give renewed impetus to evangelization, and to be a joyful church, welcoming to all and attentive to the poorest," the U.S.-born Pope said.

Pope Leo then focused his talk on two fundamental themes of Pope Francis' 2013 apostolic exhortation "Evangelii Gaudium" ("The Joy of the Gospel"): mission and communion. He told the Curia officials that the church's very nature is to be "outward-looking, turned toward the world, missionary," in order to bring the good news of God's love to all people. "The church exists to invite and gather all people to the festive banquet that the Lord prepares for us," he said, so "every person can discover their identity as a beloved child, a brother or sister to

their neighbor, and a new creation in Christ." "Transformed by this discovery, they become witnesses to truth, justice and peace," he said. For that reason, he said, "we need an ever more missionary Roman Curia, in which institutions, offices and tasks are conceived in light of today's major ecclesial, pastoral and social challenges, and not merely to ensure ordinary administration," to better serve local churches and their pastors.

When it comes to communion, he said, Christmas is a reminder that "Jesus came to reveal the true face of God as Father, so that we might all become his children and therefore brothers and sisters to one another." God's love, revealed by Jesus, enables all members of the Catholic Church "to be a sign of a new humanity -- no longer founded on selfishness and individualism, but on mutual love and solidarity," Pope Leo said.

The task of fostering greater communion both within the church and in the world "is urgent," he said. Communion in the church is always a challenge, he said, because of "forces of division" that may sometimes be at play. "We can fall into the temptation of swinging between two opposite extremes: uniformity that fails to value differences, or the exacerbation of differences and viewpoints instead of seeking communion." "Thus, in interpersonal relationships, in internal office dynamics, or in addressing questions of faith, liturgy, morality and more besides, there is a risk of falling into rigidity or ideology, with their consequent conflicts," Pope Leo said. Members of the church are called to "conversion," and to remember, "though many and diverse," they

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are members of the one body of Christ as "brothers and sisters in him," he said. "This communion is built not through words and documents as through concrete gestures and attitudes that ought to appear in our daily lives, including in our work," he said.

Pope Leo encouraged officials to seek "genuine fraternal friendship" and to pray for personal conversion and the "grace to find trustworthy friends, where masks fall away, no one is used or sidelined, genuine support is offered, and each person's worth and competence are respected, preventing resentment and dissatisfaction." "The Lord's birth brings the gift of peace and invites us to become its prophetic sign in a human and cultural context that is too fragmented," Pope Leo said.

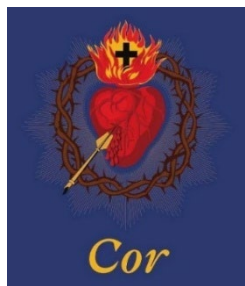

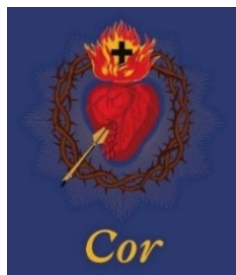

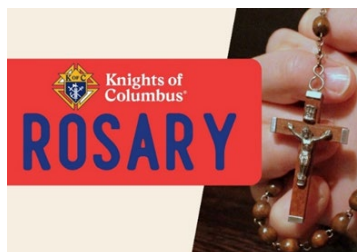
