

# <u>Spiritual Advisor Message – SK Deacon Bruce Gesinski</u>

### The Original Horse Whisperer

A few years ago, actually I think it must have been quite a few years ago, there was a movie called the Horse Whisperer supposedly based on a horse trainer named Monty Roberts. Having been around horses for most of my adult life, having owned horses, and having helped train horses, I have read a lot about training horses and have been to seminars let by some of the most famous horse trainers in the United States. You are probably wondering what any of this has to do



with anything spiritual, or anything to do with the Catholic faith, and with good reason. Just as a side note, did you know that horses are mentioned in 26 different books of the Bible for a total of 188 times?

I was re-reading and contemplating the Gospel proclaimed on Palm Sunday at the procession with palms – Luke 19: 28–40. In versus 30–32, Jesus tells two of His disciples to go into the village. He said, "Go into the village opposite you, and as you enter it you will find a colt tethered on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it here. And if anyone should ask you, 'Why are you untying it?' you will answer, 'The Master has need of it.'" So those who had been sent went off and found everything just as He had told them. (Luke 19: 30–32) There isn't much there that would grab your attention other than the disciples are going to get a colt that doesn't belong to them or to Jesus.

Versus 35–37 say, "So they brought it to Jesus, threw their cloaks over the colt, and helped Jesus to mount. As he rode along, the people were spreading their cloaks on the road; and now as he was approaching the slope of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of his disciples began to praise God aloud with joy for all the mighty deeds they had seen." At first look, there doesn't seem to be much there either. But let us take a little closer look at what this says.

A colt is a young, unneutered male horse or donkey. Anyone who knows anything about animals knows that unneutered males can be a little on the spirited side, especially horses. So, His disciples bring Jesus a colt on which no one has ever sat. This is a young male horse or donkey that has never been ridden. They throw their cloaks over the colt and help Jesus get on it. He then rides along the road with a crowd of people throwing their cloaks on the road in front of them. As they get closer to the city, people are shouting and yelling and waving palm branches and throwing the palm branches into the street.

If any of you have ever ridden a horse that was the least bit skittish you would know how extraordinary this scene is! People are yelling and shouting, throwing cloaks and palm branches into the street while Jesus calmly rides a colt who has never ridden before down that street. Anyone who has raised horses or trained horses would know how improbable this is. My only answer is that Jesus is the original Horse Whisperer.

### **Knights Without Pay: A Marian Call to Arms**

This May, as spring awakens new life, so too does a deeper art of every Knight—a call not to

call stir the heart of every Knight—a call not to comfort, but to courage. The passing of Pope Francis reminds us that the Church advances not through grand displays of power, but through the quiet fidelity of those who serve in silence—undaunted, unseen, and unshaken.

St. Teresa of Ávila once wrote, "Let us be knights without pay, not looking for reward, but rather seeking to serve and suffer in the service of the King, helping Him carry the cross, and helping the Church by our prayers, our obedience, and our dedication—without turning back." These words feel especially urgent now. Pope Francis often echoed the same spirit—not with the language of knighthood, but through his tireless call to become "missionary disciples." He urged us to be people of prayer first, to love with boldness, and to step into the wounds of the world carrying healing in our hands. Let us begin again, as Pope Francis would say, "with the joy of the Gospel."

Daily prayer—short, honest, and faithful—is not a luxury. It is your armor. It is your sword.

This May, as we honor Mary, Queen of the Knights, pray the Rosary with renewed devotion. She, too, walked the road of the Cross. She, too, stood firm in silence and strength. Knighthood isn't earned through applause, but through quiet acts of mercy, steadfast brotherhood, and daily sacrifice. We help Jesus carry the Cross when

we serve the poor, support parish events, and even stand up for life in a culture that too often devalues it. As "knights without pay," we serve not for reward but out of love for Christ.

To support the Pope means to live the Gospel with clarity and conviction. Our fidelity and witness keep the mission of the Church alive—in our parish, our community, and our families. Pope Francis reminded us often that "the saints can be found next door." The Knight who quietly tends to his aging parent, the brother who still shows up to meetings despite pain, the man who gives instead of grasps—these are the ones who walk toward heaven with purpose.

Let us be like them. Let us be them.

This May, let your life be your prayer, your service be your song, and your courage be a testimony to the Church that Pope Francis so lovingly led. The call is Marian. The cross is Christ's. And the time is now.

### May 2025 Monthly Challenge:

He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" (Gospel for May 4, Jn 21:17a)

When, following the Resurrection, Jesus revealed himself to his disciples at the Sea of Tiberias, why did he ask Peter three times whether he loved him? It has often been seen as a penance for Peter's earlier threefold denial of Christ. But perhaps there's something more — perhaps Jesus was pushing Peter to reflect more deeply on what it means to love him. Sometimes, we speak the words "I love you" by rote, without grasping their true meaning. May we always be mindful of what it means to truly love someone and to love as Christ taught us.

### Challenge by Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori:

This month, I challenge you to identify one way you can demonstrate true love of God and neighbor. Then pray about how to concretely undertake that sacrificial act of love — and put it into action.

### **Questions for Reflection:**

What does it mean for you to truly love Jesus? Do you know anyone — or is there a particular saint — who has shown you what true love looks like? What are some specific ways you can grow in your ability to truly love?



# U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Update

WASHINGTON – Upon the news from the Holy See announcing the passing of Pope Francis on April 21, Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, issued the following statement in remembrance:

Pope Francis will long be remembered for his outreach to those on the margins of the Church and of society. He



renewed for us the mission to bring the Gospel out to the ends of the earth and offer divine mercy to all. He has also taken advantage of the present Jubilee to call us to a profound hope: one that is not an empty or naïve hope, but one grounded in the promise of Almighty God to be with us always. Even with his roots in the Piedmont region of Italy, the first Pope from our American Continent was marked by his experience as a Jesuit and a shepherd in Buenos Aires. He brought that experience and vision with him to his ministry for the universal Church.

Recently, he expressed anew prayerful hope in his <u>letter of support</u> to the Bishops of this country in our attempts to respond to the face of Christ in the migrant, poor, and unborn. In fact, he has always used the strongest and clearest expressions in the defense of the dignity of the human person from conception to natural death.

I last saw him at the Jubilee Mass for the Armed Forces, Police, and Security Personnel. Despite the challenges of his health, he was with us and even used a slight gesture to salute the group of bishops who concelebrated the Mass before he boarded the vehicle to return to Santa Marta.

The passage from this life of the Bishop of Rome calls us to pray for his eternal rest and to continue on our path to a deeper union with the Lord Jesus. We remember his leadership in inspiring nations, organizations, and individuals to a renewed commitment to care for each other and our common home.

The Bishops of the United States unite in prayer with Catholics here and around the world and all people of good will in gratitude for the life of our revered shepherd. We mourn the passing of our Holy Father and beg Saint Joseph to accompany him. Eternal rest grant unto him O Lord.

# Vatican Update

### Pope was a Pastor first, which is a lasting gift to the Catholic Church

Pope Francis was a pastor first, "so consistently, so spontaneously and with such deep conviction," that it will remain a gift to the Catholic Church, said Cardinal Michael Czerny. The cardinal, who served as prefect of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development, spoke with Catholic News Service April 22, the day after Pope Francis died at the age of 88.

Czerny, prefect of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development, reflected on the social teaching of Francis during a panel discussion March 13, 2023, hosted by Georgetown University's Initiative on Catholic Social Thought and Public Life to mark the pontiff's 10th anniversary.

"Pope Francis will be remembered as a pastoral pope," he said. "The word 'pastoral' is easy to use, and you can apply it to many things, but to see it lived consistently by the person with the highest responsibility in the church is a really important contribution." Cardinal Czerny, 78, said it is not that previous popes were not pastoral, but Pope Francis excelled at "showing how the church was first and foremost interested in the welfare, the salvation, the happiness, the development of people and ready to reach out as far as possible, to accompany people in their path of salvation and of development." Making the pastoral a priority — learning "to go out and bring the Gospel to reality, to all creation" — is something the church needs "to relearn" with every generation, the cardinal said. "And Pope Francis showed us how."

Cardinal Czerny, a Jesuit like Pope Francis, said the late pope clearly embodied the Jesuit ideal of "finding God in all things." "He was able to find God and to hope to meet God in every circumstance and in every person," the cardinal said. "He never gave up on 'these people' or on 'that situation,' and that's also a gift of our spirituality, which, in a sense, overcomes a false distinction between what's religious and what isn't." One of the aims of the spiritual exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Jesuit order, is to help believers focus on finding "the freedom to serve God and to serve people free from the forces, the powers, the confusions that

can lead us in the wrong way," the cardinal said. "I will personally remember him for his freedom," he said. "I found him so free in his attitudes, in his reactions and his responses."

Unlike his two predecessors, Saint Pope St. John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI, Pope Francis did not participate in the Second Vatican Council. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1969, four years after the council ended. But, Cardinal Czerny said, "his legacy to the church at large will be his renewal of the implementation of Vatican II, and precisely the implementation of Vatican II as a pastoral council. This is something that we urgently needed, and which he began wholeheartedly and developed in many interesting directions, but always very, very faithful to the council, always rooted in the council."

Pope Francis advocated tirelessly for the people and issues Cardinal Czerny's dicastery focuses on most: migrants, refugees, the poor, peace and the environment. Asked if people accepted the pope's teaching on the Christian requirement to "listen to the cry of the poor and the cry of the earth," the cardinal said, "In fact, the people have accepted it. The governments haven't."

"I think he has reached people — ordinary people, parishes, other communities, Christian movements, and also groupings and movements of people outside the church," the cardinal said. "He has reached them widely and deeply." "And it's a real pity that governments are opting for short term gain, populism, with their eye only on the next election and on the bottom line," Cardinal Czerny said. "It's up to people to correct their governments, and I really hope this will happen."

The cardinal said the migrants, refugees and poor people he works with have reacted to Pope Francis' death much like he has. "First of all, we're shocked because we didn't expect it; seeing the Holy Father on Sunday doesn't prepare you for hearing that he died on Monday morning," he said. But "at the same time, the real feeling is not the shock or even the sorrow, but gratitude," he said. "We can't help thinking of him without gratitude, without thanking God for this pastor, this pastor with the smell of the sheep, who has guided and encouraged the church so much over the past 12 years and who leaves us with hope and with a lot to do."

### Last words of Pope Francis: "Thank you"

Pope Francis' final moments were peaceful, and he managed to give one last farewell to his nurse, Massimiliano Strappetti, before slipping into a coma early April 21, Vatican News reported. Among his last words were his thanks to Strappetti late April 20 when he said, "Thank you for bringing me back to the square," referring to the pope's surprise appearance after giving his Easter blessing from the central balcony of St. Peter's Basilica.

Pope Francis, who was still recovering from pneumonia, did not attend the Easter Mass April 20, but he did appear shortly after noon to give the solemn blessing. "The pope wanted to make one last significant surprise by going to St. Peter's Square for a ride in the popemobile," Vatican News said in a report April 22. However, the pope was a little unsure and asked Strappetti, "Do you think I can do it?" The nurse reassured him that he could, Vatican News reported. (Article continues on the next page.)



The Knights of Columbus has a unique partnership with the Special Olympics and has helped disabled athletes train for and compete in games around the world. # **Pro-Life Legislative Update**

The 2025 Session of the Florida Legislature is drawing to a close on May 2 or when a state budget is passed. Several Bills are being considered by both the House and Senate that relate to the protection of life and may be of interest to our Knights of Columbus.

The <u>Unborn Child Parent's Survivor Act (SB 1284)</u> allows parents to file civil lawsuits for the wrongful death of an unborn child. It recognizes an



unborn child as a separate legal entity and extends legal protections to ensure accountability in cases of negligent or intentional harm. The legislation creates new avenues for parents to seek damages for emotional and financial loss resulting from the wrongful death of their unborn child, further humanizing the unborn in state statute. This bill passed the Judiciary Committee (6 to 4) on April 1, and the Appropriations Committee (5 to 3) on April 11. It is currently in the Rules Committee.

The <u>Initiative Petitions for Constitutional Amendments Reform Act (HB 1205)</u>, which strengthens signature verification, limits out-of-state petition influence, increases transparency to protect Florida's ballot process, and makes it much more difficult to amend the Florida Constitution by well-funded outside groups as almost happened with the recent pro-abortion and legalized marijuana amendments that were narrowly defeated in November. This bill passed its final committee and then the full House (76 to 31). It is awaiting Senate action.

The Office of Faith and Community Act (SB 820), which codifies the Office of Faith and Community within the Executive Office of the Governor to build collaborative relationships between faith-based organizations and state agencies. This bill passed the Government Oversight Committee (6 to 1) on April 1, the General Government Committee (9 to 3) on April 15, and the Appropriations Committee (14 to 4) on April 22. It passed the full Senate (27 to 9) on April 24 and is now in Messages to the House.


The <u>Fetal Development Educational Act (HB 1255)</u> revises multiple education policies to protect students and foster a more positive learning environment, including restricting the use of taxpayer funds for political activism and enhancing discipline standards. On April 23, the House passed this bill with an 86-27 vote. Most notably, the bill requires that 6th through 12th graders (with parental consent) receive comprehensive fetal development education through high-definition videos, helping students better understand and respect the miracle of human life. Despite intense opposition, the bill prevailed and now awaits a final vote in the Senate.




