Dear Brothers & Sister in Christ,

This month we will discuss the Heartbeat Protection Act, which went into effect on May, 1, 2024. This law protects unborn life by prohibiting abortions after six weeks gestation. I was at A Woman's Choice of Jacksonville on Monday, two days

before the law went into effect and there were approximately **57** women who came to the clinic to terminate, kill or murder their unborn child—whatever is easier to say or digest.

On Tuesday, the very next day, the women who came to the clinic numbered in the 60s. There were so many mom, they could not all fit in the waiting room. Many moms were told to wait in their car and they would get a text when they could enter! This just proves the Culture of Death that our society has adopted—not a thriving culture of life or any respect for life or love of God, the Creator of Life.

On Wednesday, May 1st, the whole atmosphere changed at A Woman's Choice of Jacksonville. There were few mothers at the clinic. Two of the eight mothers who came were eight weeks pregnant and did not know the law changed that day. They were turned away. The sympathy that the abortion industry tries to generate for the mothers is a lie and only motivated by greed. It's not just my opinion. It seems that the only allegiance they have is for the devil and their bank accounts.

CNN was present on the premises of the clinic all day on May 1st. Vice President Kamala Harris was scheduled to speak downtown. I was asked by CNN and an international news agency what that day's ruling meant to us. I said it was a victory for all women! To have a strange man rip a perfectly healthy baby from a woman's womb is a blow to motherhood and the dignity of women. Women deserve better. Just then, the big show was about to begin with the interview of the owner of *A Woman's Choice of Jacksonville* and several other murder mill employees. As I walked closer to be able to hear her interview, I could feel the wall of hatred towards me. The evil looks I received was as they wanted to rip me apart and dismember me alive like the abortionist does to defenseless, innocent unborn babies. The abortion industry is pure evil.

I do have a love for women. They are incredible and capable of miracles. However, the lies of people in the abortion industry will strip these women of dignity, respect and love. When these women clear their minds after the procedure, they are left with the guilt of knowing the truth and what they have done. My prayers go out to these women. They need to seek clergy for forgiveness for the act they have committed by killing their baby. Even babies who are born with some abnormalities, just need a little help from his mother. Please let us all never give us in this battle against evil and use all that the Lord has given us to ensure victory, especially in defeating the Amendment to Limit Government Interference with Abortion (#4) on the ballot in November.

Ultrasound Machines save lives by helping women choose life by giving them the opportunity to view their unborn children at pro-life pregnancy centers. This initiative is funded by Knights of Columbus state and local councils with matching grants from the Supreme Council's Culture of Life Fund.



The Knights of Columbus works together as an organization to purchase ultrasound machines for qualifying pregnancy centers. Discounted prices for select machines are offered through preferred pricing agreements arranged by the Supreme Council. The list of preferred machines is provided to sponsoring councils after the pregnancy center is approved for funding by the local diocese and the Supreme Council. After the state and/or local council raises 50% of the cost, the Knights of Columbus Supreme Council will provide the other 50% to complete funding for purchase of an ultrasound. Or, if the council raises 100% of the cost of a vehicle outfitted to serve as a mobile medical unit for a pregnancy center, the Supreme Council will provide 100% of the funds for an ultrasound machine to be used in that vehicle.





OUR HISTORY AND HERITAGE

McGivney, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Conn., and a group of parishioners. Their intent? To bring financial aid and assistance to the sick, disabled and needy members and their families. Today, Father McGivney is being considered for sainthood.

What Is It Like to Receive the Eucharist in Space? A Conversation With NASA Astronaut and Catholic Convert Mike Hopkins





Getting to live in space is a challenge and an honor only a very few people will ever enjoy (at least in our generation). Astronaut Mike Hopkins is one of those selected few. He spent six months on the International Space Station (ISS) in 2013. And though he was thrilled when he was chosen for a space mission, there was one Person he didn't want to leave behind: Jesus in the Eucharist.

Hopkins had been received into the Church less than a year before his launch. After a long wait, he was finally able to receive Our Lord at each Mass. Facing the prospect of being off the planet for half a year, he decided he had to find out if Jesus could travel with him. It turns out he could — and he did.

The Register spoke with Hopkins about his desire to have the Eucharist in space, how it worked out practically, and what led to his devotion to the Real Presence.

How is it that you ended up being the kind of astronaut who wants to take Jesus Into space?

Well, it's a bit of a long story. I grew up as a non-practicing Methodist. I met my wife, Julie, in college. She's Catholic, and we started dating and eventually ended up getting married. As part of that process of getting married in the Catholic Church, we agreed to raise our kids Catholic. I didn't have any intentions of becoming Catholic. I felt like it was important for our kids to realize that what was important was their relationship with God, not necessarily whether you're Methodist or Catholic or Protestant or whatever the case may be.

And so we went to church on a regular basis, to the Catholic church. Our kids were born and baptized Catholic, and we've been raising them in the Catholic Church.

Then I got — in 2009 — selected as an astronaut. And this had been a goal, a dream, an objective for much of my professional career. So everything was fantastic, right? We moved down to Houston and became members of Mary Queen Catholic Church here in Friendswood, one of the local parishes. I went through the basic [astronaut] training from 2009 to 2011. And as far as my religious practice, everything was still kind of the same. We were going to the Catholic church, the boys were going to the Catholic youth education programs and being raised Catholic, and yet, when we went to church, I didn't participate in Communion because I wasn't a Catholic.

And then, in 2011, I got assigned to a mission to the International Space Station. I was going to go up and spend six months in space, starting in 2013, so you'd think as far as career goals and family, everything was perfect. I'd become an astronaut. I'd been assigned to actually go into space. My family was doing fantastic. And so everything was good, but, for me personally, I felt like something was missing.

It was hard to put my finger on it, but I eventually decided that "I think maybe I need to become Catholic. I want to participate more in my family's — my wife and my kids' — religious life." I do believe that God has a way of putting people in your life that help you when you have the need. In this case, for me, it was Father Skip Negley, who was the priest at Mary Queen.

At this time, as I'd been assigned to a mission, I was training a lot, which meant I was spending a lot of time in Russia. Therefore, I wasn't able to attend the weekly RCIA classes. And so we [my wife and I] went and talked to Father Skip, and he said, "Look Mike, I'm willing — when you're here for the two- or three-week [intervals], we'll get together one-on-one as often as we can. And we'll do it in that fashion." So it would never have happened without Father Skip. Or it would have been, I guess, a much bigger struggle or a much longer process, if Father Skip hadn't taken me under his wing.

I remember one of the first meetings I had with him: [He asked], "Why do you want to be Catholic?" And I gave the response I mentioned earlier — about wanting to participate more in my family's religious life — and he said, "Mike, that's not a reason to be Catholic."

And so that whole process of these meetings with him was absolutely fantastic for me, because it answered a lot of questions that I had about the Catholic faith. Father Skip was just amazing. And at the end of the day, I realized it was something I needed to do for me.

I was able to get confirmed in the Catholic Church in December 2012, and I was launching in September 2013.

Once I got confirmed though, I have to admit, I still wasn't quite satisfied — because I knew I was going to be gone [in space] for six months.

So I started asking the question, "Is there any chance I can take the Eucharist up with me into space?"

Which isn't something that, you know, is normally done, since you don't self-administer Communion.

Again, God has a way of putting people in your life when there is a need. And Chuck Turner [a deacon as well as the parish facilities manager] and Father Jim [Kuczynski], who had taken over from Father Skip, started asking the questions of the archdiocese: "What would we need to do to allow Mike to take the Eucharist up?" So they really did a lot of the leg work to make it happen, and I was able to take a small pyx up with me that had six wafers divided into four each, so I had 24 opportunities to receive Communion on orbit.

They were able to work it all out with the church; and so, the weekend before I left for Russia — we launch on a Russian rocket from Kazakhstan — I went to Mass one last time, and [the priest] consecrated the wafers into the Body of Christ, and I was able to take the pyx with me.

Rest in Peace

Augustus W. Simms, 92 of Palm Coast, FL passed away March 24, 2024. Born in Havre de Grace, MD on February 29, 1932, "Gus" attended parochial schools and Howard University in DC, where he graduated with a Masters in Music Education.

Shortly after graduation, Gus entered the Air Force where he attained the rank of 1st Lt. He then joined the Air Force Reserves retiring with the rank of Major in 1979.


On release from active duty in 1957, Gus began teaching music at Howard University; and in 1961 married Yvonne Smith from Iowa. While at Howard, he played at several clubs around the DC area with notable local jazz musicians such as Dave Yarborough, Quentin Warren, Ben Secundy and Steve Novacel. In 1996, after retiring from Howard University, Gus and Yvonne moved to Palm Coast, FL. There he invited local musicians to perform at a jazz concert (An Evening of Jazz) to benefit scholarships to Black students so they could start or continue their Catholic education. Some of the early concerts were held in school cafeterias and featured singers Jan Crawford, niece of Clyde "Piano Man" Crawford (who also lived in Palm Coast until his death in 2005), and Brenda Pinkelton. Later, when the concerts were moved to Seton Hall, singers included Linda Coles (related to Nat), Denise Rose and Em Dinopol as well as perennial favorite Dan Burns. He also performed in various clubs throughout Florida and at the Europa Lounge in the European Village until failing health forced him to stop.

A faithful attendee of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Catholic church as long as he was able, Gus was a member of the Black Catholic Guild and their prayer group. He was also a member of the Knights of Columbus chapters in Korona and Flagler Beach.

Gus was preceded in death by his parents Philip Scott and Ruth Wilson, step-father John Simms and his wife of 46 years Yvonne (nee Smith). He is survived by Deanna Johnson (sister-in-law) of MD; long-time friends Rose Thurston (DC) and Carol Gaines (FL) several cousins, nieces and nephews, and many friends from Palm Coast.

The family wishes to thank the staff of Peaceful Home ALF and Gentiva Hospice for their care during Gus Simms's final days.

Funeral will be Friday, May 3, 2024 at 11 am at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church with Fr. Martin Ibeh officiating. Interment will be at Mt. Olivet Cemetery in DC at a later date. Reverend John W. McElroy Rest in Peace

Reverend John W. McElroy and his twin brother, Thomas were born in Norwood, MA, sons of the late Charles A. and Lillian D. McElroy, on November 29, 1930. After attending Boston College, he entered St. John's Seminary in Brighton, MA, and was ordained to the

priesthood on February 2nd, 1956. His first parish assignment was Sacred Heart Church, Newton Center, MA. In 1961, Fr. McElroy was commissioned into the United States Navy Chaplain Corps and was subsequently assigned to Marine Corps Recruit Depot (MCRD), San Diego, CA. In 1962, upon completion of his tour at MCRD, Fr. McElroy deployed aboard ship to the Western Pacific with PHIBRON 3. In 1963, he was released from the activeduty Navy and returned to the Archdiocese of Boston where he was assigned to St. Timothy's Church in Norwood, MA. In 1967, he was recalled to the active-duty Navy and immediately deployed for a 12-month tour with the 3rd Marine Division in the Republic of Vietnam. He subsequently spent the next 24 years of his activeduty Navy career in various assignments ministering to the spiritual needs of Navy and Marine Corps personnel. Among notable duty stations, he served aboard the last of the heavy cruisers in the Navy, the USS Newport News (CA-148) for three years which included a second tour in Vietnam. He was the first Force Chaplain for the Submarine Force, Atlantic Fleet, and his final tour of duty was as Command Chaplain, Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, FL, where he retired as a Captain in July of 1991. Returning to the Archdiocese of Boston, Fr. McElroy served on the Emergency Response Team until 1995, when he was assigned as pastor of St. Michael's Church, Avon, MA. After five years at St. Michael's he retired in October of 2000 and relocated to Palm Coast, FL. There, he was assigned as a weekend associate at Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton Church as well as offering Mass as needed in various parishes throughout the Diocese of Saint Augustine.

During his military service, Fr. McElroy was the recipient of numerous awards and decorations, including the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star (with Combat V device), the Purple Heart, and the Combat Action Ribbon. Fr. McElroy has been predeceased by his parents Charles and Lillian McElroy as well as his older brother, Charles and twin brother, Thomas.
