Finding Lasting Peace

In today's secular world, finding true peace can feel like an impossible job. Real peace comes from a relationship with Christ; it's established in faith. This peace is a journey that involves understanding spiritual highs and lows, also known as desolation and consolation, through the teachings of St. Ignatius of Loyola. Now what is desolation and consolation? In St. Ignatius' Discernment of Spirits book, he defines desolation as feeling low, far away from God, or spiritually empty. Consolation, on the other hand, is the uplifting feeling of being close to God, bringing joy and spiritual clarity. This restores the soul and renews our connection with God.

Throughout this year, I've had a journey of my own, seeking peace in Christ, mostly in discerning my vocation. This process requires a heart at peace, which is only possible by trusting in God's will and plan. Now peace in Christ doesn't always mean everything is perfect but, rather, it's the deep understanding that God is with you through it all. In the discernment of the spirit, there are 14 rules that St. Ignatius helps guide one's spiritual life. Rule number 5 says: "In times of desolation never make a change." This means when you're feeling lost or confused, avoid making big changes. Stick to what you decided when you felt sure and connected to God. Even when your peace is shaken or disrupted, it's hard to keep the decision that you've made because influences from either family or close friends can affect it.

This can be hard because often those we love most family and friends can unintentionally disrupt that peace we have. Their well-meaning advice or expectations might conflict with our sense of internal peace. It's important to consider their opinions but eventually prioritize God's call above all trusting in His divine wisdom for your journey.

I keep a medal tag with me every day which is a memory for my younger brother, and on the tag there's a quote that I finally acknowledged recently for the first time. The quote says "Trust in the Lord Jesus, let this be your goal; you'll have peace in your heart, when He's in control." This is a moment when we can trust God to help, so we can reclaim that peace, especially in times when we feel spiritually desolate.

We have to remember that in our search for peace, we aren't alone. We have the saints to intercede for us, which also means we have access to our Blessed Mother. Mary plays an important role in leading us to her Son. Through the Rosary, Mary intercedes for us offering comfort and strength, with each Hail Mary we can pause and reflect on the mysteries of Christ's Life. Bringing our hearts into deeper communion with His peace. During the Rosary, Mary is gently walking us to her Son, while she is teaching us to completely surrender and trust.

Real peace isn't just the absence of worries but the presence of Christ within us. By first recognizing the presence of desolation and consolation and following the Ignatian spiritual guide, we find peace is not a one-time thing but an endless practice of placing your trust in God's hands and letting His love guide you. As you seek peace, remember to trust in the Lord deeply. Allow His grace to fill your heart so you can find true peace knowing He is in control.

A Knight's Service Comes in Many Forms

Recognizing the potential effect of the government shutdown has across our country and in particular the effect it may have on the government's ability to provide food for those in need, Fr. Zach asked parishioners to consider contributing to the Food Pantry to help head off the real possibility of shortfalls.

What Father is asking of us is to practice two of the Corporal Works of Mercy: **To feed the hungry and To give drink to the thirsty.** Perhaps we have not thought about the Spiritual and Corporal Works since childhood or conversion studies but they are still fully effective and affective in our lives, if we take the time to practice them. Additionally, as we have seen in the All Souls panel above, Father has given us the opportunity to practice a Spiritual Work: **To pray for the living and the dead**.

Mercy is said to be a virtue influencing one's will to have compassion for, and, if possible, to alleviate another's misfortune. It is the teaching of St. Thomas Aquinas that although mercy is as it were the spontaneous **product of charity**, yet it is to be reckoned a special virtue adequately distinguishable from this latter.¹

Here's a brief refresher -

The Corporal Works of Mercy

- To feed the hungry;
- To give drink to the thirsty;
- To clothe the naked;
- To house the homeless:
- To visit the sick;
- To ransom the captive;
- To bury the dead.

The Spiritual Works of Mercy

- To instruct the ignorant;
- To counsel the doubtful;
- To admonish sinners;
- To bear wrongs patiently;
- To forgive offences willingly;
- To comfort the afflicted;
- To pray for the living and the dead.

And so, Brothers, as we enter into the season of Advent later this month, please revisit the Works of Mercy and your own Knighthood promise of Service through Charity. Consider a giving a personal, special contribution to the St. Joseph Food Pantry and joining Father in a Spiritual Work in Praying for the Dead on All Souls Day.

Supreme Chaplain's Challenge

"For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted." (Gospel for Aug. 31, Lk 14:11)

ne lesson of this parable in Luke's Gospel is that when you exalt yourself, there's nowhere to go but down. In the life of a disciple of Christ, we are called to develop the virtue of humility. We are called to self-giving service to others, not selfserving advancement of ourselves. Let us strive not to seek worldly honors in an egotistical spirit, but rather to live as servants to others so that God may exalt us to eternal life.

Challenge by Supreme Chaptain Archbishop William E. Lori:

This month, in which we celebrate the feast of Blessed Michael McGivney on Aug. 13, I challenge you to pray each day the Litany of Blessed Michael McGivney or the prayer for his canonization — and take time to reflect on his humility in serving the people of God.

Questions for Reflection:

Do you sometimes struggle with the sin of pride? How can you be at once humble of heart and yet bold in living and proclaiming your faith? What living examples of humble service have you found in your own life?

Each assembly maintains a Fourth Degree Color Corps and Honor Guard. Uniformed members wearing the Official Uniform, and swords participate in special civic and religious ceremonies. For this reason, the Fourth Degree is often called the visible arm of the Knights of Columbus.
