

Tradition holds that October has been celebrated as the month of the rosary since 1571, and the victory of the Catholic League (an alliance of Spain, Venice, the Papal States, Genoa, Savoy, and Malta) over the forces of the Ottoman Empire who were seeking to take over Italy in an effort to move into the heart of Europe. It was October 7, 1571 when the battle was fought and the Catholic



League was able to overcome the Ottoman forces.

Prior to the ships sailing off towards battle, Pope Pius V prayed the rosary, asking for Our Lady's intercession in victory, and every man on board carried a rosary. For this reason, as soon as the men returned from the battle, the good pope declared a feast day for Our Lady of Victory. A rosary procession was offered in St. Peter's square after the victory and in time the whole month became associated with the rosary, rather than just one day. Pope Leo XIII officially established October as the Month of the Rosary in 1884. That year, he published *Superiore Anno*, an encyclical which was focused on recitation of the holy rosary. In it, he called for the entire Church to dedicate the whole of the month to the rosary and pray it daily:

"Last year, as each of you is aware, We decreed by an Encyclical Letter that, to win the help of Heaven for the Church in her trials, the great Mother of God should be honored by the means of the most holy Rosary during the whole of the month of October. In this We followed both Our own impulse and the example of Our predecessors, who in times of difficulty were wont to have recourse with increased fervor to the Blessed Virgin, and to seek her aid with special prayers. . .

... We therefore decree and make order that from the 1st of October to the 2nd of November following in all the parish churches, in all public churches dedicated to the Mother of God, or in such as are appointed by the Ordinary, five decades at least of the Rosary be recited, together with the Litany. If in the morning, the Holy Sacrifice will take place during these prayers; if in the evening, the Blessed Sacrament will be exposed for the adoration of the faithful; after which those present will receive the customary Benediction. We desire that, wherever it be lawful, the local confraternity of the Rosary should make a solemn procession through the streets as a public manifestation of religious devotion."

The encyclical referenced churches named for the Blessed Virgin, especially, and was written in response to an illness that was spreading in Europe, emphasizing that Europe's need for intercession was particularly great. Still, the decree was meant for all of the Catholic Church and the practice continued for most of the next century.





Evangelizing this Halloween

It's that time of year when the air gets crisp in the morning, and the leaves show us their canvas of colors before they settle into winter's cradle, except in Florida, where the bugs never die, and the only changing of colors are on the out of state license plates.



Lucky for many of us in Florida, the stores continue offering scents of Cinnamon Apples and pumpkin spice, while fake foliage and autumn display can make us forget the sweltering heat for a few seconds.

As we enter into October, we get closer to Advent and the High Feast Days, which kick off with every child's favorite holiday besides Christmas, Halloween!

Growing up, Halloween was always taboo, but once I was an adult, I researched it and found it to be a great day to evangelize (especially in costumes). Halloween is basically an abbreviated form of "The Evening before the Holy One's" or the Eventide before All Hallows—Hallow (Holy) Een (evening).

From our Irish ancestors who used to light turnips (Pumpkins when they came to America) to dressing up as Ghouls and Goblins (who were thought to walk the earth that night – therefore confusing them), you also gave out soul-cakes. Soul cakes are traditional old English cakes that are usually baked on Halloween. On this day of the year, in years gone past, children would go 'souling,' singing from house to house for some of these tasty cakes. This is where the tradition of Trick-or-treating came from.

As Catholics, we love our Vigils. These are times of prayer at dusk and night when we "keep vigil," remembering those who have gone before. This happened many times at Funerals where vigils were held to pray for the dead. Vigils sometimes occur when someone is sick and needs prayers. Vigils usually prepare the hearts of the faithful for a bigger feast for the next day. Thus, Halloween was a day of prayer before the great celebration of All Saints the next day. This was a day of great feasting and excitement. To honor our Brother's and Sister's in Christ who now stand in the presence of God.

As we approach Halloween, it can be done with great laughter and fun. Dressing up like the saints is a great way to evangelize about our Faith and friends in heaven. If you prefer the ghoulishness of Halloween, don't forget there is an entire martyrology of saints, those who died cruel and gruesome deaths for the sake of Jesus and his Church. Sometimes, people might want to be reminded how many literally walked in Jesus footsteps and carried their crosses with Christ: Sebastian (Arrows), Lucy (eyes plucked out), Agatha (breasts cut off), Lawrence (grilled to death), Joan of Arc (burned to death), Apollina (teeth pulled out), and many more.

So this October, remember the great Saints, our friends in heaven, and try to imitate them and their virtues in serving God and neighbor.

The fall 40 Days for Life campaign starts next Wednesday September 27th, the largest 40 Days



for Life campaign ever with 681 cities having vigils! In Sarasota we start with the Church of St Patrick covering the first day. Our kickoff event will be held the next day, Thursday September 28th in the parking lot of Community Pregnancy Clinic.

Church signups have gone very well and we already have 27 days of the 40 partially filled. This means we have 13 days with no coverage from 9am until 7pm (Barb and I are again taking 7am – 9am every day). We need your help to fill up the calendar. You

can sign up for hours at 4odaysforlife.com/Sarasota and click on the "Sign up for vigil hours" button.

In the fall of 2019, we had 100% coverage, filling all 480 hours of the vigil. Why is it important that we fill up the vigil calendar? Glad you asked.

Why 100% Coverage is Important


100% coverage is important as our primary audience is God. The first 40 Days for Life campaign was a sacrifice and show of dedication to God, and it went 24 hours-around-the-clock. It was a truly constant vigil and it places trust in Him to hear our prayers even when the facility is closed. Many locations still go around-the-clock. However, it's not always practical or safe to be out all night, as it is in Sarasota, so our vigil is 12 hours a day.

"Why do I have to go to the abortion center? Can't I pray at home or at church?"

We need to pray outside the abortion facility because our prayers there have an immediate impact on an urgent situation. Yes, God hears and answers prayers, no matter where they're said. But when women arriving for abortions see the public vigil, they know and understand that at the moment they need it most, someone is praying specifically for them. Our presence there is the last sign of hope before the abortion ... and the first sign of mercy after the abortion. Many of the moms who have chosen life ... and even former abortion workers ... say the prayer presence outside turned them away from abortion. They saw that someone was there, just for them.

Hi Brothers! Hope you are all, staying cool...

You know, probably one of the most misunderstood things in the world is life insurance.

Why is it important? How does it work? How much does it cost? Are there different types of insurance? How do I know if I need insurance and what kind and

how much do I need???

See what I mean...all fair questions. So today, we are going to try to simplify the meaning of insurance. Quickly taking the last question, first. You can only know if, how much and what kind of insurance you need by doing a complete review of your needs with your financial advisor. Everyone's situation is unique. That is what I do for my Brother Knights.

Basically, Life Insurance is the best and most efficient way to protect your family against financial loss to beneficiaries due to the death of the insured.

Some of the more common reasons for buying insurance are Final Expenses, Mortgage Protection, Debt Reduction and Future Income needs. More uncommon uses are for Tax Planning, Succession Planning for businesses and Charitable giving.

What type of insurance is right for you and your family? There are two basic types of insurance: Term and Whole Life (also called permanent)

Term Insurance

Term insurance is like renting a house vs. buying. Term insurance is less expensive, making it a good option for a young family or someone on a limited budget. It also can be designed to cover the family for a certain period, like while there is a mortgage loan on the home. However, over time, the premium does increase, and the policy eventually expires. This could put a person in a very precarious position. Term insurance builds no Cash Value (equity).

Whole life (Permanent Life Insurance)

Whole life is like owning your home vs. renting. It builds Cash Value (equity) that is your money and can be used at any time, for any reason. Initially, it will cost more than term insurance, but the premium will never increase. You can choose the dollar amount of insurance and the number of years to pay the premium. Your Whole Life policy not only builds Cash Value, but it may also earn dividends as well. Cash Value and Dividends earn interest that is tax deferred AND the death benefit on Life Insurance is TAX FREE! The death benefit may also increase. Some clients use Whole Life to supplement their retirement funds. Hopefully, this has helped you better understand Life Insurance. As your agent, I am a Brother Knight, here to serve my Brother Knights!
