The History of the Blue Mass

The Blue Mass is a cherished tradition that honors the brave men and women who serve as police officers, firefighters, and first responders. Its origins trace back to September 29, 1934, when Father Thomas Dade celebrated the first Blue Mass at St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Washington, D.C., though he was based in Baltimore, Maryland.

Father Dade, a visionary priest and founder of the Catholic Police and Firemen's Society, recognized the need to spiritually support those who risk their lives daily to protect others. The name "Blue Mass" comes from the color of the uniforms traditionally worn by police and emergency personnel—a symbol of service, sacrifice, and steadfast duty.

In the wake of September 11, 2001, the Blue Mass took on even deeper significance. Communities across the nation began to gather with renewed reverence, praying not only for the souls lost but for the continued safety of those who stand on the front lines. During the Mass, special prayers are offered for these heroes and their families, invoking the protection of Saint Michael the Archangel, Patron Saint of Police and First Responders, and Saint Florian, Patron Saint of Firefighters.

In every prayer at the Blue Mass, we offer not just gratitude, but a promise: that their sacrifices will never be forgotten, and their families will always be held in the embrace of our community and our faith.
